HON, T. W. ANGLIN DEAD. The Ex-Spenker of the House of Comme sed Away Yesterday Morning
—Sketch of His Career. About 4 o'clock yesterday morning

the Hon. Timothy Warren Anglin passed peacefully away at his residence, Queen-street-avenue. The deceased had undergone a long and painful illness, but was apparently recovering, and on Saturday was sufficiently well to go out in a carriage for an airing. On his return he appeared much better and was quite cheerful. During the night, however, he suffered a relapse and the end came quite unexpectedly from heart failure. All day yesterday his bereaved widow and family were receiving the sympathy of the many friends of the family.

A Brief Biography.

Mr. Anglin was born at Otonakilly, Cork County, Ireland, Aug. 31, 1822. His father was an officer in the civil service of the East India Company. In 1849 he emigrated to St. John, New Brunswick, and established The Weekly Freeman, and subsequently The Morning Freeman. In 1860 he was elected one of the representatives of the City and County of St. John in the House of Assembly. He was the first Roman Catholic who represented that constituency. He strenuously opposed Confederation, which he thought would be prejudicial to New Brunswick. The cry of Fenian and ultramontane was raised against Mr. Anglin and in 1866 he lost his election in St. John. In 1867 he was re-elected and in 1874 returned without opposition. By pen and speech he denounced the New Brunswick School Act. Thoroughly in accord with the views of the Catholic Bishops and laity, he took strong ground on this question and was so far successful in his labors that in many parts of the Province a compromise was effected which gave to those of his faith permission to have their own schools and teachers and to give religious instruction before or after school hours. On the 26th March, 1874, Mr. Anglin was unanimously elected Speaker of the House of Commons. On the 7th of April, 1877, Mr. Mackenzie Bowell moved a resolution to the effect that the printing contract held by the Speaker with the Government was an infringement of the Independence of Parliament Act. An active debate followed, and the next day the motion was negatived by 111 to 72, when Mr. Casey moved that the question of Mr. Ang-

ment of the Independence of Tank ment Act. An active debate followed, and the next day the motion was negatived by 111 to 72, when Mr. Casey moved that the question of Mr. Anglin's printing contract be referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections. This committee did not report until the day of prorogation, at too late an hour for the House to take action on the question. The decision at which the committee arrived, however, was that the seat was voided, and during the recess which followed the Speaker resigned and was re-elected by his constituents. On Parliament assembling in 1878 he was again chosen Speaker. He filled this responsible office with dignity and ability. His rulings, involving research among
