



Wall-Street Stocks Quiet With the Tone CALIFORNIAN

The general report regarding femittances is that the improvement noted of late is maintained.

General wholesale trade at Toronto is fairly satisfactory. When weather conditions are taken into consideration, the movement is most encouraging. The steady demand on wholesalers for nearly all lines of merchandise is evidence of the comparitively light stocks held at country points and of returning confidence. Manufacturers are busy and in many cases mills are ruinning overtime. Prices continue very nrm, with an upward tendency. Colder weather would stimulate the demand for heavy drygoods, but the sorting up trade is reported good. Business is active in hardware and metals, the demand being good for seasoniable lines, and prices are firm. Groceries in fair demand with prospects bright. The tone of the leather and hide markets is firmer. Large quantities of wheat have gone for export of late, and prices rule steady, around 80c, at Ontario points. Coarse grains, however, are inclined to be heavy. Hogs are lower, while cured meats, which are in limited supply, are firm. Money markets unchanged, with prime commercial paper discounted at 6 per cent. and call loans 4 per cent. Speculation is fairly active on the stock exchange, and values continue to rule firm. The Bank of England discount rate is unchanged at 3 per cent.—Daily Bulletin.

Montreal, Oct. 21.—There were about 800 head of butchers' cattle, 30 calves and 1000 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the East End abattoir to-day. There was a large attendance of butchers and a good demand for pretty good cattle, but common and inferior stock, which constituted much the larger numbers, were very difficult to sell, even at the low rates going, and it is probable that a considerable number will not be sold to-day. There were 26 hard-looking bulls in one yard, and more than that number were scattered through the other yards, and it is probable that these bulls will be sold at less than 1½c per lb. on an average. Some of the leaner old cows will also have to be sold at about the same rate. A few of the best cattle were sold at about 4c per lb., with pretty good animals at from 3½c to 3c per lb. There is a good demand for stockers at from 2½c to 3c per lb. Calves sold at from \$2.50 to \$12 each. Shippers are paying 3c per lb. for good large sheep. Lambs sell at from 3½c to 4c per lb. and occasionally a little more. Fat hogs continue to decline in price. To-day about the highest price offered for hogs just off the cars was 5c per lb.


