## WHY DID HE KILL HIMSELF?

George L. Williams Threw Himself Into Bell's Lake Near Markdale and Died. Markdale, Ont., Oct. 21.—The body of George L. Williams, aged 21, son of George B. Williams, four miles north of here, was found to-day in Bell's Lake. The cause of his death was ascertained by the coroner. He was found in the water, and it was a case of suicide. He left his home on Monday at 11 o'clock in apparent good health. No cause is known why he should have committed suicide. His family is very highly respected in this neighborhood.

## Children's Aid Society.

The monthly meeting of the Board of the Children's Aid Society was held yesterday, when the officers reported a total of 111 cases, involving the interests of 140 children. Seventy-four of these were in the children's court; 9 children went to foster homes. At the shelter 34 children were received and 41 were discharged. Many little ones of the society will be held in a shelter, North York, at the residence of Mrs. Schuler, 20 Adelaide-street east. The cold weather is now approaching, and the need of plenty of warm clothing is, of course, beginning to be felt. Several boys have been brought to the shelter in such a condition of raggedness and vermin that all their clothing had to be burned. When such a thing happens—and it does very often—fresh outfits of clothing have to be found for them, and besides, many little ones come in very severely clothed, so that a constant supply has to be kept going. Clothing, shoes, stockings, hats and caps for boys and girls from 12 to 14 years of age are constantly needed, but of course, these need not be new, but should be in a fairly good state of repair.

## Who Hired Those Chinks?

Duluth, Minn., Oct. 21.—The Canadian steamer Monarch of the Beatty Line, which came in yesterday, had on board 24 Italians from the steamer, destined for this city. The customs inspector here challenged them, and after examination Deputy Collector Hudson refused to allow them to land on the ground that they came here in violation of the contract labor law. The customs authorities have not yet learned who hired the men.

## Going to Help the Yantic.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Oct. 21.—At the request of Lieut.-Com. Gilbert Wilkes of the Michigan State Naval Brigade the university agent has granted a leave of absence to Prof. Mortimer Cooley, that he may go to Montreal and help bring the Yantic to Detroit.

## Chased by a Filibuster Livery Man.

Lapeer, Mich., Oct. 21.—Elmore Chambers, alias John Curtis, who had 24 hours the start of H. J. Matthews, a livery man, was chased by him yesterday. He was captured here this morning. Chambers, it is alleged, left Canada with horses and other goods, and was chased by Matthews as a chattel mortgage for \$52, with Matthews as endorser.

## Peter Woods Hoves Quickly

Detective Verney and Policeman Sifton went to 165 Charlotte-st. yesterday to arrest Peter Woods, who is wanted on a charge of stealing carpet. Woods jumped over a window and fled with him, and Sifton followed and caught him. Woods was severely cut about the body and Sifton about the trousers.

### Regulation of Vice.

We have always stood solidly against any form of the regulation of social vice, and the recent developments in the British army in India have greatly pained us. We rejoice to know that Sir George White, commander-in-chief of the forces there, is opposed to regulation. He says in a general letter, dated July 14, 1897, that "the majority of cases are confined within a circle of men who are admitted to the hospital again and again, and thus the number of

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## THE ROLLER BOAT ROLLS

And Inventor Knapp Appears Greatly Ticked.

SAID HIS SCHEME WOULD GO

But Financier Goodwin Says He Wants To See a Little More Speed.

Shipbuilder Wanted His Money After the First "Roll," and He Now Has a Lead

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## CANADIAN GRAIN IN BONDS

New Rules Regarding Grading Recommended by the Managers of the Joint Traffic Association.

New York, Oct. 21.—New rules regarding the grading of Canadian grain in bond for export via New York, Philadelphia or Baltimore, effective Oct. 25, have been recommended by the managers of the Joint Traffic Association. The first of the new rules provides that all grain exported from the above ports shall be handled according to the grades established by the Board of Trade of Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg, and grain so graded will be placed in bonded warehouses or on the docks of the trunk lines in New York, Philadelphia or Baltimore, with other Canadian grain of like quality and grades, as per the duplicate certificate of the Government inspector of the Dominion of Canada.

Duties on Canadian grain is divided into ten grades and Manitoba grain into three grades.

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## THE CHILKOOT PASS.

Harold Ebbes Canavan, a Young Canadian, Describes His Trip—A Perilous Journey in Summer Season.

Mr. Paul G. Wickson of Paris has received from his cousin, Harold Ebbes Canavan, a letter posted at Lake Linderman on Aug. 31, 1897, in which he describes the trip through the pass. Mr. Canavan is the prospector of the Brant-Yukon Company of Paris, Ont., and was sent there to keep his weather eye open on their behalf. In his letter, dated Lake Linderman, Mr. Canavan says:

"The Truqui Pass is bad, very bad, and one wonders to see women crossing with their husbands. No one but one who has seen it can imagine the great amount of energy required to make this trip. The awful desolation of the pass strikes one most forcibly—nothing but rock, glacier and snow for several miles, and even here the traveler is very small and these boats are making boats to see the planks out of logs and carry them three miles on their shoulders. There are some thirty boats built here, and it looks like a shipyard. Nothing can be bought here at any price. I paid 10 cents a pound to get my stuff over, but had I waited longer I would have had to pay 20. The trail was open, and the weather was fine. I have some five pounds of butter, and so far it has cost me 10 cents a pound. You cannot imagine the great amount of money there is being spent here and carried over. There are thousands of people camped on the Skegway and this trail, and they mostly have money, but money won't do everything, and their friends outside must wait and I am afraid many will never reach Dawson. In fact, many have already sold out and gone back—afraid to face it. So far I am in good health and spirits, and the day before yesterday one of my packers broke down and took his pack weighing 90 pounds and carried it three miles over the trail, most of the time in mud up to my knees. Good thing I had the experience in that line, not that I care for it, though."

"I was offered \$3 for a paper last night. Money all along the trail is of no value. They ask and give anything for what they want. I could sell my camera for \$500."

In a postscript to his letter dated at Lake Linderman, Mr. Canavan says:

"I am now ready to leave by the first favorable wind, and I am likely to get off on my long journey to-morrow. I finished making the frame of my canoe to-day. I bought 40 feet of lumber at a saw-mill here at a cost of \$6. Then I got it as a favor. There are different reports as to condition of affairs at Dawson. Some say flour will be \$150 a sack this winter."

"To-night we had a fine supper. First some porridge, then beans, with a few compressed vegetables mixed in with hard tack and cheese. What a banquet, eh?"

"Sandy! Still raining, and the wind blowing the wrong way. What a cheerful country this is, anyway! A newspaper man paid \$800 just now for a boat that six weeks ago he could have bought here for \$100."

"There will be many a poor devil leave his bones on the trail this winter. I have just heard that they are paying as high as 50 cents and 60 cents a pound for packing on the Skegway trail, and very few can afford to pay that price, and consequently will have to remain where they are. Since I came out it has been one continual spend money for everything I need. But, had I not paid it I could never have reached here so soon, if at all. I don't think it will take long before the trail will get to Dawson."

"I was talking to a man yesterday who told me he had come on the trail and had a short of grub. He only had two biscuits, and he stopped at a man's camp. As the fellow was having breakfast he offered to pay half a dollar for a cup of coffee. The fellow looked at him and said he had no coffee, but he would make it for him. He handed it over, taking the money, and remarking that coffee was expensive in this country. The fellow was very glad to have a cup, as he wanted money as well. So it goes."

"I paid 50 cents for half a dozen quinine pills at Skegway. At Lake Linderman one cannot buy anything but the shops. Food there simply sells for any price."
