Continued From Page 1. The City Hall that a suit of this character is all that is required as a fitting climax to the market, and the many of the local wood and coal dealers in the present emergency.

It is reported from a number of sources that hard coal is being delivered to some residences after midnight in order not to attract attention of those who have paid money for this fuel, and are now unable to get it delivered on the theory that the dealers have none in stock.

While the dealers are now asserting that they have plenty of soft coal for sale at ten dollars per ton, a practical man sent around to the different yards by the Mayor was unable to find more than fifteen hundred tons. The dealers are said to be circulating the report of plenty of soft coal to deter the city from contracting for any further supply.

They realize that whether the strike is settled or not, if the city brings in a large quantity of fuel, it will increase the supply to such an extent that prices will be too low for the retailers in Toronto. It is the available supply that has a price.

complete charge of the receipts and distribution of the civic fuel, says: "While I cannot yet give the exact date of the arrival of the city fuel, here are the rules that will enable citizens to secure wood: The wood will be unloaded at the King-street yard, the Frederick-street yard and the one at North Toronto. A customer will call at any of those yards and take a look at the fuel, and will have the different qualities explained and their price. Then he can go into the office of the representative of the City Treasurer, one of which will be at each yard, pay for what he wants and get an order on the yard for the same. If he happens to have a delivery wagon which he prefers to use he can take his own fuel away and save the cost of delivery. If he has not the city has many vehicles, and I will undertake to deliver same for him, but cannot put it in his cellar or house. I have 150 teams, and with the others we can deliver coal each day, giving the customer two hundred cords of wood each day. The exact quantity will of course depend upon the size of the different deliveries. Most of these orders will be for a quarter and a half a cord. The limit is one cord. Thus the gross expense of delivering a cord of wood to three or four different places is greater than delivering the whole cord to one place. We think it can be sent to all, however, at not to exceed one dollar per cord. The person buying a quarter of a cord will, however, get the delivery proportionately as cheap as the man buying the full cord. I will keep a complete record of places to which all
