



## CHANGES IN SCHOOL CURRICULUM. Alterations Recommended in Jr. Leaving Examination,

Latin got another black eye on Saturlay, when the committee appointed by the Ontario Educational Association to prepare a report as to changes in the Public and High school curriculums recommended that Latin be no longer an obligatory subject of study for the junior leaving examinations, as to which it was decided that the subjects to which special prominence ought to be given were the English, mathematical and science subjects. Latin, it was decided, should be made optional instead of obligatory, as at present. Regarding foreign languages, generally, it was decided that the amount of work required ought to be materially reduced, and that the candidate should be allowed his choice of one of four languages, Latin, French, German or Greek. As a rider to this resolution, a clause was added recommending that the candidate must make 50 per cent. on the examination in the language chosen.

With regard to the relation of the Education Department to the commercial diploma, it was decided to recommend that the scope of the examination be enlarged so as to include such subjects as business practice, commercial law, commercial arithmetic and geography and other subjects.



Windsor, June 21.—What is believed to be the latest episode in a family feud extending back for years in Tecumseh Village resulted in an information laid before Magistrate Cheyne in Windsor by James W.
