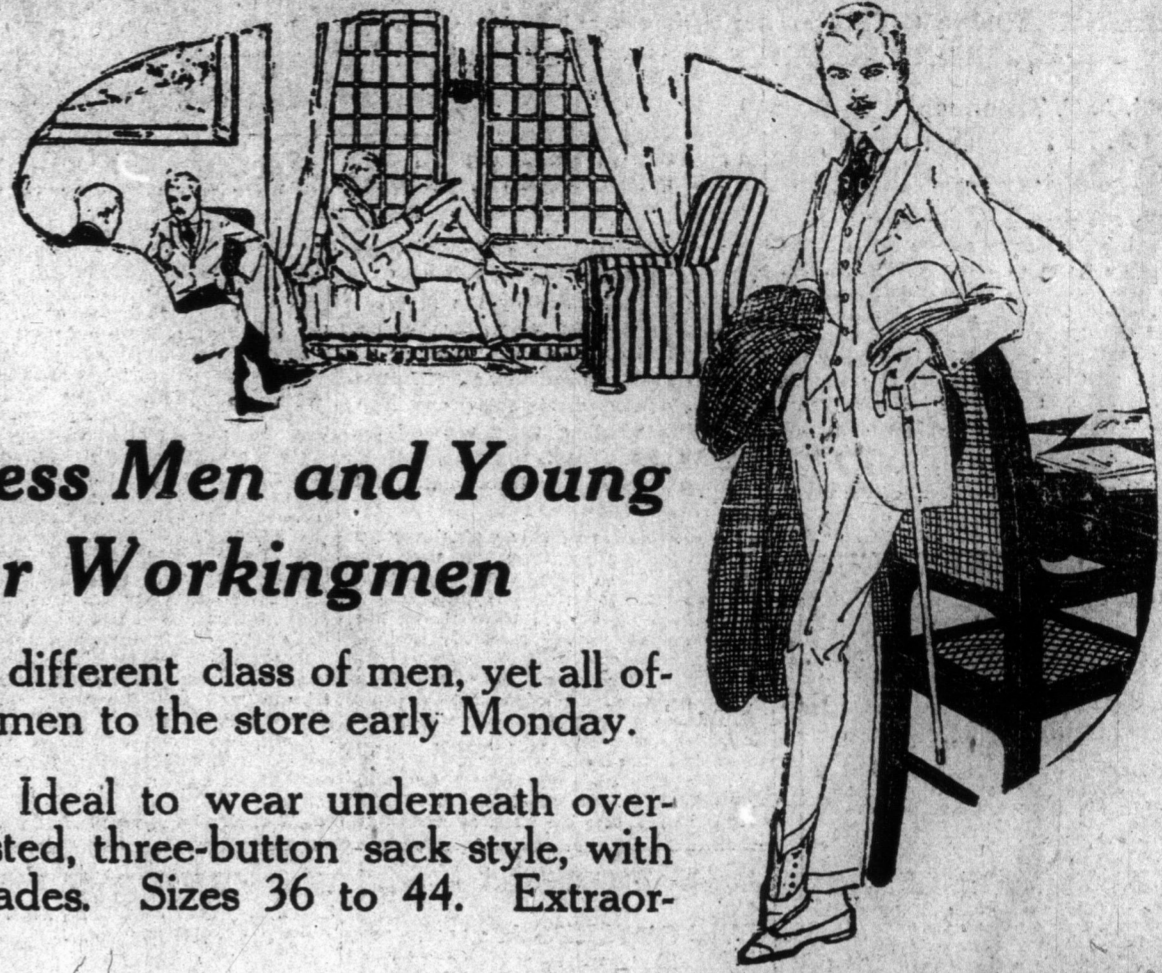

Beaver board is a wood fibre wall board that can be used instead of lath and plaster. It is wood in fibrous form, pressed into panels about 3-16 inch thick. It has a pebbled surface, which permits soft color effects and allows a variety of original and artistic methods of decoration. In new rooms beaver board is nailed to the studs and headers of walls and ceiling, the interstices between the panels being covered with decorative strips of wood. Beaver board can be used in homes, stores, offices, public buildings, factories, and it can be quickly and economically made into boots for Christmas bazaars, etc., and its possibilities are great when used as a window background or trim. Obtainable in sheets 32 and 48 inches wide and 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 feet long. —Fourth Floor.

They Put Their Hearts in It

Peace at the present time and peace after the war are two entirely different conceptions. That there should be misapprehension over the title of a lecture on universal peace, may be accepted as evidence that the nation is in mood to listen to theories which make a premature peace the basis of their development.

The women of Toronto, as the women of Canada everywhere, are intimately concerned with these terms of peace, and of the kind of world they will create after the war is over.

For years The World has stood alone as the only daily paper in Canada advocating woman suffrage. Now that the adoption of that measure is admitted by all the leading British statesmen to be a necessity of the case, we are glad to find so many of our contemporaries lining up alongside.

It is a mistake to underrate the energy or executive power of women in general. When they undertake any project it goes through with success equal to anything men can achieve.

Amsterdam, Holland, Dec. 1. via London.—A train traveling between Vienna and Budapest with a number of passengers who had attended the funeral of Emperor Francis Joseph, says a telegram received here today from Vienna, collided with another train at Herzochthal. Several cars of both trains were shattered and it is said that numerous passengers were killed or injured.

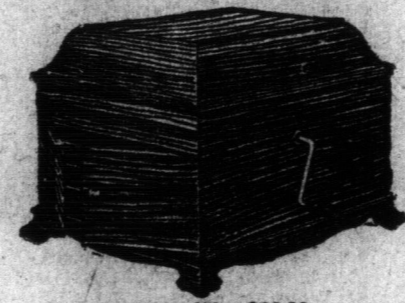

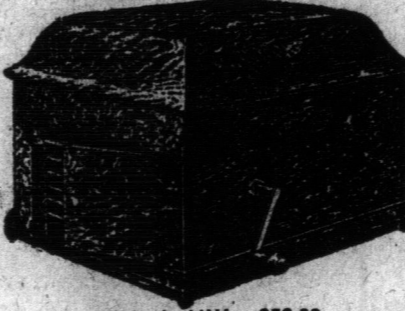

ALL BURNED ACRES SEEDED WITH HAY

Hon. G. H. Ferguson Announces Policy for Protection of North Country.

FOR FUTURE FODDER

May Give Municipalities Powers Over Forest Lands Near Limits.

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson announced that he intends next spring to seed with timothy and alsike clover every acre of burnt over government land in the northern districts of Ontario.

He explained that this would not only be of incalculable value in future years as pasture for cattle, but would also afford the best kind of check to the ravages of forest fires. He gave instances that he had noticed in the north this year where the fires had circled houses surrounded by green grass, had circled round them and gone on without damaging the house.

In amplification of his plans for fire protection outlined before the delegation which waited on him on Tuesday in this matter, the minister of lands, forest and mines said yesterday that he planned to appoint under E. J. Zavitz, who is to be given charge of the fire protection system, three men as superintendents of the three districts into which the minister intends to divide northern Ontario.

Under these three men will be a staff of chiefs and rangers. The minister purposes to keep these three superintendents constantly travelling throughout the extent of the territory assigned to them that they may be able to give direction for the construction of new telephone lines, rangers' trails and so on.

Provincial medical inspectors have visited West Toronto to investigate the abattoir smells and their report yesterday to Dr. Hastings concludes that the nuisance is a distinct menace to public health and should be removed.

CITY HALL NOTES

Up to the end of November, new buildings have been erected in Toronto in 1915 to the value of \$6,454,823.

The report of the medical officer of health for November, shows that the number of cases of measles in November was 34 as compared with 1084 in November last year.

UPPER CANADA'S PLANS REJECTED

Board Refuses Approval of Scheme for Continuation of Avenue Road.

PASSAGES AT ARMS

Neither City Nor College Was Inclined to Come to Terms.

The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board yesterday refused approval of the plan submitted by Upper Canada College for improvements to its property by the extension of Avenue road, after lively passages of arms had taken place between the chairman and J. S. Fairly, representing the city and later, between the chairman and Frank Arnold, K.C., who appeared for the college.

In giving the board's decision, the chairman first laid down the general rule that a city should have some jurisdiction over the lands immediately outside its own limits that wasteful replanning might be avoided. He expressed the opinion that the city was somewhat unreasonable in submitting the two alternative plans; one, that the continuation of Avenue road should be shown on the plans to go thru the college, after those buildings

should be removed; the other, that they should enclose that property.

He gave it as his opinion that Oriole Parkway might be widened to the extent of 86 feet as required by the city, instead of 97 feet, as shown on the plans of the college.

The board made a number of suggestions of modification on which a compromise between the city and college might be effected, but Mr. Arnold declined to show any inclination to retract from the position taken by the college.

A PLEA FOR SERBIANS WHO ARE SUFFERING

A Home-Loving People Who Are in Many Ways Like to Canadians.

The movement to assist the Serbian people in the tragic distresses which have come to this small nation is one that makes a special appeal to a country such as Canada. Both countries are vitally interested in agriculture and rural life. With an area less than that of one of our smaller provinces such as Nova Scotia, Serbia had a population of nearly three million people. In this mountainous inland country nearly half its area was unproductive and yet, owing to its community system, the passionate love of its people for the soil, and its intensive agriculture, Serbia possessed a greater number of sheep than are in the whole of Canada, and relative to its population a greater number of both sheep and swine than other countries in Europe. Corn was its principal crop and formed the chief diet of the country people. It exported a large amount of wheat, live stock and fruit.

We who in this war are devoted to the cause of small nationalities must peculiarly feel an appeal for the relief of the Serbians. Nobody can forget the insolent ultimatum which, if accepted in its entirety, would have meant the extinction of national honor and national life. No more tragic picture has been presented to the world than the retreat of the civil population of Serbia over the mountains in the wake of their army, women and children by the thousand perishing by the way. Today France is supporting thousands of the Serbian children, notwithstanding that she has between one and two million orphans of her own. Hundreds more are in England being cared for and educated.

NINE CASES LAST MONTH OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS

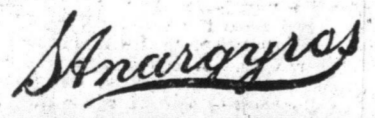

FORTY-TWO ON LIST

Two Are Stated Missing and Thirty Listed as Wounded.

There are a total of 42 names of men with Toronto units listed in the latest casualty reports. Three have been killed in action, five have died of wounds, two are missing and thirty are reported to be wounded.

Lance-Corp. W. J. Enright, 27 Fenning street, is reported killed on Nov. 19. There is a chance the report is untrue because the regimental number given is not correct. He enlisted in the 74th Battalion.

Pte. Charles Bates is reported to have died of wounds on Nov. 20. He is survived by his wife and four children. They reside at 23 Mulberry avenue. Pte. Bates went away with the 75th Battalion.

Pte. John Anderson has been killed in action while serving with the 75th Battalion. His relatives live at 56 Carleton street.

Pte. D. Greig on November 23, reported to have been killed in action. He formerly lived at 90 Deol avenue.

Mrs. Stewart, 95 Coxwell avenue, received word yesterday that her son, Pte. Peter Stewart, had been killed in action. After service with the machine gun section of the 84th Toronto Battalion, he was transferred to another unit. Before enlisting he was with the Grand Trunk Railway.

Pte. Ellwood Gardiner, 107 reported to have been killed in action in the 74th Battalion in Toronto. His next of kin is Mrs. E. M. Lloyd, Aurora, Ont.

Pte. J. H. Summerhill, 47 Lapping avenue, previously reported missing, is now reported dead, in a message received yesterday by his mother, Corp. A. Goodfellow has died of wounds. He went overseas with the 84th Toronto Battalion. His relatives are in England.

Pte. Harry Stewart, 14 Brant street, is in No. 5 Stationary Hospital, Rouen, with a compound fracture of the right hand and the left leg. Before enlisting with the 88th Battalion, he lived with his parents at 4 Curry place. He had been three months in the trenches.

Pte. A. H. Davis, 275 Brunswick avenue, has been wounded three times since September 13. Before the war he was superintendent of the Calgary Brick Supply Co. His wife resides in Toronto.

Pte. Smith Nisbett, son of Mrs. Nisbett, has died of wounds. He was a chiropractic doctor before enlisting with the 84th Battalion. His home was at 655 Lansdowne avenue.

Sapper W. Hatley is reported to have died on Nov. 28 at Bramshot camp. He was a member of the 10th Company, 4th Division, England.

He is survived by his wife and two daughters who reside at 24 Connaught avenue.

Pte. Abram Farmer is reported to have died of shrapnel wounds. He is a former member of St. Mark's Anglican Church.

Toronto District W. C. T. U. Works for Returned Men

Toronto District W. C. T. U., with the assistance of local unions and district Red Cross committees, are procuring comforts for returned soldiers. Up to date 10 cases of grapes, 7 gallons oysters, 5 barrels apples, 10 pounds sausage, 19 home-made cakes, with quantities of cream, pickles and jellies, have been distributed. The association regrets the loss of its very efficient secretary-treasurer, Miss W. M. Grant, who is taking over the secretaryship of the "Women's Union" Home in St. Catharines. Travelers' Aids report 1,831 persons assisted at its railway stations during the month.
