CONSTITUTION
OF THE
DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY
OF
PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

An Act to Incorporate the Diocesan Church
Society of *Prince Edward Island*.

[Passed April 3, 1852.]

BE it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows :

I. The persons hereinafter named, that is to say, the Bishop of the Diocese of *Nova Scotia*, for the time being, so long as he shall hold Episcopal Jurisdiction over this Island; the Reverend *Louis Charles Jenkins*, D. C. L., the Reverend *Charles Lloyd*, A. B., the Reverend *John Herbert Read*, the Reverend *William Henry Cooper*, A. B., the Reverend *David Fitz Gerald*, A. B., the Reverend *Henry Birchfield Swabey*, A. B., the Reverend *Robert T. Roach*, A. B.; the Honorables *Edward James Jarvis*, *John Myrie Holl*, *Charles Hensley*, *William Swabey*, *Robert Hodgson* and *Thomas Heath Haviland*; *Bentinck Harry Cumberland*, *John Orlebar*, *Henry Haszard*, *Theophilus Desbrisay*, *William Cundall*, and *James Douglas Haszard*, Esquires, and all such other persons as now are Members of the Society called "*The Diocesan Church Society of Prince Edward Island*," and their successors, shall be a Body Corporate, by the name of the "*Diocesan Church Society of Prince Edward Island*," of which Corporation, the Bishop of *Nova Scotia* for the time being, so long as he shall hold Episcopal Jurisdiction over this Island, shall be the President.

II. The Corporation may hold Real Estate not exceeding, at any one time, the annual value of One thousand Pounds of Lawful Money of this Island, and the Rents and Profits arising from such Real Estate shall be applied for the uses and purposes of the Church or Churches, or of Religious or Educational Institutions connected with the Church of England in this Island.

III. The Corporation shall have power from time to time to sell and exchange such Real Estate, and to purchase other Real Estate, not to exceed the value hereinbefore mentioned.

IV. All persons, when admitted pursuant to the Bye-Laws of the Corporation, shall be Members of the Society.

V. The Society shall be governed, and its Affairs managed by a Committee of not less than Fifteen Persons, comprising a President, Vice Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer—the Committee to be henceforth called the *Executive Committee*, and such other Officers as the Society may deem proper.

VI. The persons who now hold the Offices of Vice Presidents, Committee, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer, shall continue to hold such Offices, until their successors shall be elected under this Act.

VII. All Donations to the Society shall be invested or disposed of, under the directions of the Executive Committee, for the benefit of the Society; and the Executive Committee shall be bound to account to the Society for all their acts, receipts and expenditures, and to make annual Report to the Society, at its general Meeting, of the progress and state of the Society, and of its affairs generally.

VIII. A general Meeting of the Society shall be held once in each year, and as much oftener as may be directed by any Rule or Bye-Law of the Society; and every such general meeting shall have power to make Rules and Bye-Laws for the due government and management of the affairs of the Society, and from time to time to cancel, alter, change and vary the same.

IX. The Executive Committee shall be summoned to meet as often as the President or two of the Vice Presidents may deem it necessary, or as often as may hereafter be directed by any Rule or Bye-Law of the Society.

X. Nothing in this Act contained shall extend or be construed to extend to require the assent of the President for the time being to any act or acts of the Executive Committee, in their management of the affairs of the Society, or in the sale or purchase of Real Estate.

XI. Nothing in this Act contained shall affect, or be construed to affect, in any way or manner, the rights of Her Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors, or of any person or persons, or of any Body Corporate or Politic—such only as are herein mentioned.

BYE-LAWS,

Passed at the Ninth Annual Meeting of the Society, in Charlottetown, December 28th, 1852, and since amended.

1st. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for the time being, if a member of the United Church of England and Ireland, shall be respectfully requested to be joint Patron of this Society, as now Incorporated by Act of Colonial Parliament, with the Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel and for promoting Christian Knowledge.

2d. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society; and his approval shall be necessary for the confirmation, revocation and alteration of any of the Bye-Laws, and for making any addition to them.

3d. All members of the Church are invited to unite with this Society as Subscribers. Any sum, however small, paid in advance, shall qualify a person to be a member for a year; and Ten Pounds at one payment, shall entitle one to be a member for life.

4th. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall take place in Charlottetown, on the 4th Tuesday in January, when a Report of the proceedings of the past year, and the Treasurer's Account shall be presented, and all Officers chosen. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time, when the President,—or in his absence, two or more Vice Presidents,—or the Executive Committee, shall consider it desirable.

5th. The Committee Meetings shall be held on the 3d and 4th Tuesdays in January, and on the 3d Tuesdays in April, July and October,—seven members to constitute a Quorum; and Special Meetings on such other days as the President, or one of the Vice Presidents, and five members of the Com-

mittee may deem advisable; and all applications for Money Grants shall be in writing and sent to the Secretary a month previous to the Committee Meeting to be held on the 4th Tuesday in January, at which all appropriations shall be made.

6th. The Quarterly Meeting held in October, shall be open to the attendance of Two Committee members of each Country Association; at which Meeting all Resolutions will be framed, and all notices of motions, about to be brought forward at the General Meeting, sent in.

7th. All Meetings of the Society, or its Committees, shall be opened with the form of prayer at present used by the D. C. S. of Nova Scotia.

8th. There shall be two or more Vice Presidents, of whom the Ecclesiastical Commissary of the Island, for the time being, shall be the First; and the others, with such Officers as may be required, for the proper working of the Society, shall be nominated by the Executive Committee,—such nomination to be subject to the approval of the Annual General Meeting.

9th. That where District Committees are formed in Country parts of the Island, the Clergymen of those districts be requested to furnish to the Secretary of this Society, one month previous to the Quarterly Meeting in January, all such matters as they may think advisable to be embodied in the Annual Report,—a draft of which shall be laid before the Committee for its approval.

10th. The Accounts of the Society shall be closed on the 1st of January, and be audited previous to the Annual Meeting.

11th. No change in the Bye-Laws of this Society shall be proposed at a General Meeting, unless the proposed alteration shall have been previously fully canvassed (at least) at two Quarterly Meetings of the Committee.

12th. The principal objects which shall engage the attention of the Society, shall be as follows:

1. The employment of Missionary Clergymen in the Island;
2. Assistance to the Endowment of Parishes.
3. Assistance to the Erection or Enlargement of Churches or Chapels, or Parsonage Houses belonging to the United Church of England and Ireland.

4. Aid to Sunday, and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.
5. Aid to the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, such aid being afforded by persons contributing to that especial object.

To these purposes generally, the contributions will be applied ; while those, who desire it, may have their subscriptions appropriated to any one or more of these objects, as they think fit.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Sixteenth Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held in the Sunday School Room on Tuesday evening, the 24th January, 1860, and although the state of the roads prevented many from attending, yet the room was well filled.

The Chair was taken by the Rev. Dr. Read at 7 o'clock, who, after the meeting was opened by singing and prayer, made a few remarks as to the objects of the meeting.

The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, Capt. Orlebar, R. N., and a financial statement made by the Treasurer, Theophilus DesBrisay, Esq., both of which showed improvement and increased interest in the affairs of the Society.

The following Resolutions were then passed *nem. con.*, having been first ably spoken to by the various proposers and seconders.

1. Moved by Hon. Joseph Hensley, seconded by Rev D. Fitz Gerald,—

That the Report be adopted and printed, under direction of the Committee.

2. Moved by Rev. D. B. Parnter, seconded by W. Cundall, Esquire—

That this meeting recognizes with gratitude the many mercies vouchsafed to our church and country during the past year; and rejoices in the progress of that unity of spirit and bond of peace, so daily and earnestly prayed for by the members of the Church throughout the world.

3. Moved by Capt. Hancock, R. N., seconded by Hon. E. Palmer—

That the continued liberal assistance afforded the Church in this Island by the great Missionary Societies in the Mother Country, requires on the part of all members of the Church corresponding devotedness and liberality.

4. Moved by Hon. Thomas H. Haviland, seconded by H. Haszard, Esq.—

That this meeting acknowledges the efficient aid of the collectors for this Society in Town and Country.

5. Moved by Capt. Orlebar, R. N., seconded by Hon. John Longworth—

That the 5th Bye-Law stand thus:—The Committee Meetings shall be held on the 3d and 4th Tuesdays in January, and on the 3d Tuesdays in April, July and October; seven members to constitute a Quorum,—and special meetings on such other days as the President, or one of the Vice Presidents and five members of the Committee may deem advisable; and all applications for Money Grants shall be in writing, and sent to the Secretary a month previous to the Committee meeting to be held on the 4th Tuesday in January, at which all appropriations shall be made.

6. Moved by Thomas DesBrisay, Esq., R. N., seconded by W. Pethick, Esq.—

That His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor be Patron to this Society, and that the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for the ensuing year—Hons. J. Longworth, J. Aldous, Joseph Hensley; H. C. Green, D. Kaye, M. D., D. Palmer, G. W. DeBlois, G. T. Haszard, J. Easton, R. Haslam, J. Haszard, John Brecken, W. S. Clifton, John Holl, Esquires; Hon. G. R. Goodman; H. Haszard, T. Hunt, T. DesBrisay, J. Tweedie, W. Cousins, Wm. Cundall, T. B. Tremain, R. R. Hodgson, A. H. Yates, J. Hudson, J. Pidgeon, Esquires; Capt. Hancock, R. N.; Wm. Pethick, C. Palmer, Esquires.

The Rev. Chairman, in summing up, expressed his satisfaction with the proceedings of the evennig. He compared the present state of the Church's Missions with that of a few years ago, when there were only nine churches, and no parsonages on the Island; whereas there are now ten ministers, nineteen churches, and four parsonages, besides others in course of erection. He urged upon all the necessity to be up and doing while time and opportunity were given. A collection was then taken up, a few verses of the Missionary Hymn sung, and the meeting closed with the accustomed benediction.

REPORT.

Your Committee present this Sixteenth Report of the Diocesan Church Society of Prince Edward Island to their friends and subscribers. Another year of mercies has closed upon us, and we now bring under your notice a record of the Church's progress, in this Island, during that period. The balance of £103, in the Treasurer's hands at the last Anniversary, was speedily appropriated in grants for the liquidation of debts on Churches and Parsonages. Georgetown and Cherry Valley Mission received their respective shares of the £25 grant, and the sum of £20 was funded to aid in building Charlottetown parsonage.

This year, we are enabled to report that the subscriptions and donations amount to £126, being £36 in advance of last year, and showing that the thanksgiving for an abundant harvest has not been without thank-offering to the cause of God and his church. At the same time, we are conscious that far too little is given in town and country for the promotion of Christ's kingdom. It is so clearly a blessing to any people to give liberally, that as we wish our Church to prosper, and our Zion to extend her borders, we must urge upon our people more extended liberality to this and kindred Societies.

Two years ago, your Committee expressed their conviction, that a resident Bishop would do much to build up the walls of our Zion; that opinion remains unchanged, and we would urge upon our friends here the importance of taking early measures for raising an endowment for that purpose. The recent appointment of a Bishop to the new and distant Colony of Vancouver's Island, and the liberal endowment of the See by the unaided agency of one noble Christian lady in England, should stimulate us to exertion.

Our Island Church has many warm friends in England, and a liberal commencement made here towards the endowment fund would doubtless call forth a corresponding spirit in those who, possessing property in this Island, take deep interest in its good government, and earnestly desire its moral and religious improvement. During the past year, at the suggestion of Rev. Dr. Read, there have been instituted Quarterly Clerical meetings for conference and prayer. These meetings have been held, in rotation, at Charlottetown, Georgetown, and St. Eleanor's, and cannot fail to be useful in drawing the ministers and members of the Church into closer fellowship and sympathy.

Your Committee are glad to report that Kildare and Cascumpec have now the blessing of a stated ministry. The Rev. R. Dyer arrived from Newfoundland early in August, and speedily removing to Cascumpec, has continued there ever since, laboring with much success amongst the people.

Crapaud mission is, at present, unoccupied,—the health of the Rev. D. Parnter not being equal to the hardship and fatigue of country travelling, he has accepted the appointment of Assistant Minister in St. Paul's, Charlottetown. Mr. Parnter entered upon his duties on the 11th of last November. His appointment, which was largely assisted by the Colonial Church and School Society, has given very general satisfaction, and has afforded valuable relief to the overtaken strength of the Rector.

Your Committee now present an abstract of the reports received from the Clergy.

CHARLOTTETOWN.

The Rev. Mr. Fitz Gerald reports, that during the past year there have been 65 baptisms, 14 marriages, and 41 funerals; and that he has paid 510 pastoral visits. He also states that there has been no diminution in the congregations at the Sunday and week-day services, and that the Friday evening prayer meeting continues to be well attended, and to afford means of much spiritual enjoyment.

The number of communicants has steadily increased, and the offertory collections made for the poor, and other objects, amount to £140 16s., being £21 10s. above those

of the previous year; 115 volumes having been added to the Library,—it now contains 1105 volumes. The appointment of Rev. D. Parnter as Assistant Minister, has afforded valuable aid to the Rector in the performance of pastoral duties.

A few years ago, Lady Wood and Miss Fanning promised £50 towards a Parsonage, and the former has since given a site for the same. Eighty-five pounds have been granted by the Society, and other sums have been liberally promised, but as the site has not been definitively agreed upon, the building of the parsonage is still postponed. The Hon. Edward Haythorne, at his death, left a legacy of £50, to be funded for the poor of the English Church. The burying ground still remains in an unbecoming condition, and reflects much discredit on our community.

The collections amount to £58 8s.

ST. ELEANOR'S.

The Rev. Dr. Read, with a sense of gratitude to Almighty God, reports encouragingly of his Mission. Judging from the attendance and earnestness of the congregations at St. Eleanor's, Summerside, the Cross Roads, Richmond Village and Wilmot Creek, there is an increasing interest in the services of our beloved Church. At the same time, he feels conscious that success is not of him that planteth, nor of him that watereth, but of God that gives the increase; and he believes that in proportion as we humble human instrumentality, and exalt the Divine, so will beneficial results attend our work and labor of love. During the year, he has performed 243 religious services, made 592 pastoral visits, and travelled 2019 miles in his missionary duty.

The exterior of the Church at St. Eleanor's has been painted. The Church at the Cross Roads, aided by grants from our respected Diocesan and this Society, is progressing slowly, and he hopes, with the further aid of this Society, will be fit for permanent use this year.

Dr. Read also mentions the meeting of the clergy at St. Eleanor's, in September last, where special services were held, and the claims of this Society advocated in strong and effective speeches at a public meeting, well

and numerous attended. The collections amount to £23.

NEW LONDON.

The Rev. Wm. Meek reports that health and strength have been given to him to fulfil his engagements through another year, in visiting and preaching both on Sundays and week days. He has held 200 services in the several parts of his mission. The congregations at Irishtown and the Third Pond, much exceed the means of accommodation. The week day services at the Baltic and Fermoy have been well attended. Some small improvements have been made to the New London Church, but the one at Irishtown still remains in an unfinished state. The collections amount to £7 14s. 7½d, being an improvement on that of last year.

PORT HILL AND LOT 11.

The Rev. H. B. Swabey reports that the interest in the Society continues unabated. The Parsonage is gradually becoming more comfortable. During the summer a tea party was held, which realized £19, but a considerable sum is still required to complete it. A vestry is being added to the Church at Port Hill by the parishioners. The services at Port Hill, Bideford and Lot 11, have been regularly performed, as far as Mr. Swabey's health and the weather would permit. He recognizes a warmer feeling of attachment to the Church, and that some, while praying with a form, are able to worship the Father in spirit and in truth. The collections amount to £8 13s. 5½d.

GEORGETOWN, &c.

Rev. R. Roach reports that there are encouraging tokens of a deeper spiritual life in the congregations. Attendance upon public worship is regular and devout, and services of humiliation and prayer have been well attended. There are registered 27 baptisms, 5 marriages, 11 burials, and 51 communicants at the various stations; services 109. The weekly offertory has assumed the place of the subscription list, and so far has proved satisfactory. The

subscriptions, including Mount Stewart, amount to £6 7s. 8½d.

At Mount Stewart, nothing further has been done to the Church.

At Harts', St. Peter's Road, the building is still incomplete, but next summer he hopes to see it completed.

At Morell, further attempts, for the present, have been abandoned.

Murray Harbor Church, by permission of the Bishop, is temporarily occupied by the Free Church Congregation.

CRAPAUD AND SPRINGFIELD.

Rev. Mr. Parnter reports that a part of £18 collected for repairing the Church at Crapaud, has been expended. The services have been regularly performed at both churches. The Sunday Schools at Crapaud and Springfield—only open during the summer, have been well attended. At both missions, associations have been formed, libraries established, and lectures delivered. The Bible class at Springfield is attended by 26 young men. Prayer meetings have been held at the Westmorland Settlement, many of these, during the last few months, have been crowded. The removal of the Missionary to Charlotte-town, owing to failing health, will account for the smallness of the contributions from Crapaud. There has been collected at Springfield £3 17s. 3d.

CHERRY VALLEY, &c.

Rev. Wm. Stewart reports that his attention has been chiefly devoted to the churches at Cherry Valley and Bedford. With the kind assistance of the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, a service has been held every Sunday afternoon at Bedford, which has been the means of increasing the congregation very materially. A weekly prayer meeting has been commenced at Cherry Valley, and adjoining settlements, which, Mr. Stewart hopes, will be an encouragement to family prayer (too much neglected), and have a beneficial result. The collections amount to £5.

MILTON AND RUSTICO.

Rev. J. S. Smith reports that he has pursued his various duties to the best of his ability. Divine services, with few

exceptions, have been performed at both stations every Sunday. The congregations at Milton and Rustico average 50 and 60 each, but at Rustico not many of these are church people. During the summer, a series of week-day services was held, with much apparent benefit. The Sunday schools for the same period were also well sustained. The Parsonage has been improved, and a contract entered into for its completion by the 1st June next; towards the expense of which he hopes this Society will give its liberal aid. The collections amount to £5 1s. 6d.

CASCUMPEC, KILDARE, &c.

This mission, during the last few months, has been filled by the Rev. Mr. Dyer, lately from Newfoundland, who has not yet had time to urge upon his people the claims of this Society. Many, however, have expressed their willingness to subscribe, and, with praiseworthy punctuality, have already paid in advance half the annual sum promised towards Mr. Dyer's salary. The church at Kildare Capes is in progress, and it is the intention of the people to build a Parsonage at Cascumpec as soon as possible. Mr. Dyer holds services at Cascumpec Village and Cross Roads, at Tignish, and Kildare Cape and Bridge; and considering the distances many have to travel, they have always been well attended. Collections amount to £3 6s. 3d.

IN CONCLUSION,

Your Committee would remind you that as life,—active, stirring life, distinguishes the actions of the Church of England in every part of the earth, we must show ourselves worthy of our relation to her, by like zeal and faithfulness. Our Church, in her missionary efforts, spans the globe, and her influence mighty in the affections of the English people, is effecting much to elevate the tone of society, and to spread true religion throughout the world; let us who have so long been fostered by her generosity when young and feeble, now earnestly endeavor ourselves to follow her steps, and place the endowment of the Church on a firm basis.

The Church is a light set on a hill, the sober spirituality of our prayer book, the Scriptural character of our articles

and our services, our adhesion to all the time-honored and Scriptural practices of the early Apostolic Church, and our rejection of all that is superstitious and contrary to sound doctrine of Holy Scripture, marks our Church as an especial witness for Christ. Let us, then, so walk, that we bring no reproach upon the name which we bear. Let us see to it, that we be a peculiar people, zealous of good works, adding to godliness, brotherly kindness to all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity, and to brotherly kindness, charity to the world at large ; for if these things be in us, we cannot be unfruitful in the day of Christ. To whom be glory.
