

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SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

QUEBEC DIOCESAN COMMITTEE

OF THE

SOCIETY FOR PROMOTING CHRISTIAN KNOWLEDGE.

JANUARY, 1836.

THE two great objects of the Branch of the great Society instituted here, of which we form a part, are the Diffusion of Christian Knowledge, among all orders, and especially among the poorer classes of Society, and the education of the children of the labouring poor at our day schools.— No Society can embrace designs more important. The distribution of the Word of God, which is "able to make wise unto Salvation, through faith in Christ Jesus," is a work in which the Christian cannot but consider it a privilege to be engaged ; and the bringing up of the little ones of our own communion, in the principles of the Church of Christ, and imparting a portion of our wealth, to provide them with the means, not only of gaining an honest livelihood, but of themselves perusing the Word of God, must necessarily be an offering acceptable to the Most High.

The Managing Committee of every Charitable Society, it is believed, have cause to lament, that their exertions are not always attended with a like degree of success. Some years may be marked by a much greater progress in the good work, than others : again, in others the seed sown may have fallen apparently, by the way side.—But, perhaps, this is only in appearance, it may not be the case in reality; and seasons in which, to the external senses of men, there may appear almost nothing done, may yet through the blessing of God, have been times distinguished for important accessions of good. We are not always to found our judgment upon what meets the eye, or conceive, because the general aspect of a country is barren and unfruitful, that there are no spots which carefully cultivated, bring forth fruit an hundred fold.

The Committee to whom have been confided by you the affairs of the Branch of the Society, now for seventeen years established in this colony, do not preface their Annual Report with these observations, to mitigate the rigor of any remarks upon the small returns made for labours they may have expended. They are persuaded that the exertions made by them will be looked upon even with too favourable an eye: and that even more credit will be given to them than they are in justice entitled to receive. They find cause to confess, that in surrendering an account of their trust for the last twelve months; they might have engaged more zealously in the honorable task imposed upon them. They feel they might have investigated with a more scrutinizing eye the wants, and inquired into the spiritual condition of the different portions of the community; and have done more than they have done to dispel, by the introduction of the beams of gospel light, that ignorace which in the streets of this metropolis, as in every other place, produces only profligacy, wretchedness, and misery.

The Committee think it of consequence to call the particular attention of this Meeting to a fact which operates greatly to the disadvantage of the Society, as far as the sales of works published by it are concerned. They allude to an opinion which they fear has gained more ground than it is entitled to; that the publications of the Society are deficient in spirituality and interest. It is very possible, that in some of the Tracts there may be found passages which need amendment. But the Committee are assured that, taking the publications of this Venerable Institution as a whole, they venture to say they will be found not unequal to those of any of the benevolent Societies of christians, who send forth these little messengers to awaken and convince.

In the Publications of the Society, are comprised the works of some of the brightest ornaments of the Protestant Church-as Bishops Bradford, Newton, Patrick, Secker, Jeremy Taylor, Wilson, Tillotson and a host of other bright and shining lights of the Church of England, who have long since gone to their rest : while of those of more modern times, the works of Porteous, Paley, Bloomfield, Faber, Mant, Basil Woodd, and Heber may be enumerated. It may be well to state here, that with the view of giving every satisfaction, and of answering the objections brought against them, the Parent Society in 1834, appointed a

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Standing Committee, whose business it should be to consider the objections made to any of their publications, and to report upon the same.

The following extract from a letter of the Committee, addressed to the Secretaries of District Committees, may serve to show, that with every disposition to remove all well founded objections, no change will be made, till after "You will readily perceive, by the tenor of these proceed-" ings, that although the Society is perfectly willing to " examine into the truth, of any charges which may be " brought against its publications ; it is not disposed to " yield to unreasonable objections, nor to give up those " principles of sound doctrine, which it has so long main-" tained. And the Members may be assured, that in " recommending any improvement which may be necessary, in order to adapt its operations to the circumstances " of the times, the Standing Committee will be most " anxious to maintain unchanged the character of the " Society, as an Institution formed for the purpose of " promoting sound religious knowledge, according to the " doctrine and discipline of the Church of England."

Previous to entering upon a detailed account of their proceedings, the Committee pursuing the course adopted on former occasions, will notice first the state of the Parent Society, which they rejoice in being able to say, is most flourishing, both in regard to the augmentation of its income, and the encreased circulation of its publications, from the account contained in the last Report received here, it appears that the annual income of the Society, exceeds £74,000, the increase for the year being £3000. books circulated, are stated to be, including the Saturday Magazine, 5,163,929, exclusive of the Saturday Magazine, the issues in Bibles, Testaments, Prayer, and other books, have been 2,161,193, which is an increase of 72,000, on the year preceding .- Such a statement, can hardly be read without exciting grateful feelings in the breasts of all who name the name of Christ, and are zealous for the advancement of true religion. It is the most convincing evidence, that the support experienced, is not that only which springs from an arm of flesh, but, that the unseen power of the Almighty, exerts itself in behalf of this great engine, for the diffusion of the Scriptures of truth, producing results,

the exalted nature of which, can only be fully appreciated by those who are led through the knowledge of the Word of Salvation, to rest their hope on Him to whom they point, who is the "Way, the Truth, and the Life." It is a statement highly satisfactory, in another point of view, because it proves that our beloved Church, with whose interests this Society is closely connected, even amidst its bitterest storms of persecution, raised by nominal professors, as well as by her avowed opponents, gains ground in the affections of the people presaging the truth, that the hour of trial will make no difference in the conduct of those who, at her fonts, have been enrolled under the banner of Christ; and that her sons will continue to come forth in her support, and with the blessing of God, uphold her among the nations as the guardian and dispenser of Gospel Truth.

The Committee have now to lay before the Meeting, an account of their proceedings since the date of the last And first, the actual state of the Branch Report. Repositories established in the summer of 1834, claim attention. It was in contemplation at one time to establish five of these depôts for books : one in the Upper Town, one in St. John Suburbs, one in St. Rochs, one in the Lower Town, and one at Pres-de-Ville .- Three only, however, have been put into operation : one in the Lower Town, at Mr. Wheatley's Book Store; one in St. Rochs, at Mrs. Marshall's; and one at Pres-de-Ville, in the School Room, under the Mariner's Chapel. It is the opinion of the Committee, that under present circumstances, this number will be sufficient. The Committee have reason to believe, that some good will be effected by these Branch Repositories, and will give every attention in their power to render them as efficient and advantageous as possible.

The following is a statement of the issues from the Central Repository, at the National School-house, from the 16th January, 1835, to the 15th January, in this year:-

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The amount of sales at the Branch Repository, at Mrs. Marshall's, St. Roch, is £2 17s. 5d., comprising

Bibles, Common Prayers,..... 16 Bound Books, 6 Total, 68

The amount of sales at the Repository during the above period, is £89 9s. $6\frac{1}{2}$ d.—The Bishop of Quebec, has as usual, been our largest purchaser, and is now in debt to the Committee, in the sum of £46 1s. $4\frac{1}{2}$ d.—It appears, that the sales for the year, have been £42 less than those of last year; and that a large decrease in the number of Books and Tracts sold, of nearly 2000 Books and Tracts, has taken place .---It would be difficult to account for this circumstance, which, in a certain degree, is discouraging ; it is a fact however, which, while it calls forth enquiry, should operate as a stimulous to exertion, on the part of all concerned in the welfare of the Institution.

The Resident Clergy have distributed Books (procured by a grant of the Committee,) to the poor and sick in the hospitals, gaol, and at their houses; and three special grants of Books have been made, one to the Rev. J. Cochran late of St. John's, for distribution; another to Mr. Turner, Catechist at Bourg Louis; and a third to the Orphan Asylum of the Chapel of the Holy Trinity; each however, to a very limited amount. By the Bishop's order some Books have been sent to the District of Gaspé, to two of the Catechists employed there, amount £3 12s. 111d. A large parcel to Williamsburg Upper Canada, amount £8 12s. 4d.; and a few to the Rev. Mr. Knight of the Township of Frampton. The National Schools have been supplied with such books as were required in those institutions, and also the Sunday Schools of the Cathedral, the Chapel of the Holy Trinity, and St. Peter's Chapel; also the Female Orphan Asylum, in connection with the Parish Church; it does not appear that the two other Sunday Schools in connection with the Church of England have obtained either Bibles, or other Books from us. The stock at present on hand is tolerably large, but as it appears that there is a deficiency of some of the Books

most in demand, it will be necessary shortly to send for a limited supply. In August last, two cases of Books were received at the Repository, from the Parent Society, value £97 11s. 9d. sterling, comprising 2133 Books and Tracts, amongst which are several added to the Catalogue of the Society within the last three years; and it appears that the Committee is now indebted for books, in the large sum of £289 19s. 5d. sterling—to meet which there is in the Treasurer's hands.....£218 5 7 Owing to the Committee by Treasurer of

Of the outstanding debts it is much to be feared that only a part will be obtained.

The Committee have very little to say respecting the National Schools, under their auspices. They have no reason to be dissatisfied with the progress of the children ; but regret much, that from one cause or another, there has been a diminution in the numbers in attendance. The admissions for the year, dating from the last Report, are 157-the number on the Books 207-and the average daily attendance 166. The number of children who have benefitted by the Establishment since 1819, is 6082 .--Mr. Dunbar Jameson, the last master of the National School, resigned his office on the 1st July last, when Mr. W. Morris, formerly master of the British and Canadian School, in St. Roch Suburbs, was engaged in his place .--Mr. Morris will receive a salary of £100 currency, a year, and in addition, the fuel necessary for his apartments, will be paid for, out of the funds of the School. The Committee are happy in being able to state, that they feel themselves fortunate in having secured the services of so experienced a teacher.

The difficulties which this Branch of the Institution has had to contend with, in consequence of the want of the usual allowance from Government, withheld from them for the last two years, have been of the most discouraging nature. There were no funds to make the necessary repairs to the building, and to procure fuel for the Schools; much less to pay the master and mistress the amount of what was justly due to them. Several

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expedients were tried, to procure an augmentation to the funds of the Institution, but little or nothing could be obtained by means of subscription; the only possible way of keeping up these Establishments was, that of borrowing money which would have been easy, provided the School funds could have paid the interest upon the sum borrowed. The Committee, under these circumstances, judged it expedient, to make two further loans to the School, of £64 17s. 5d.—and another loan has since been made, to pay the half years salaries due on the first of this month.

The Annual Public Examination of the two Schools, which generally takes place at Christmas, was not made as usual previous to the last vacation, owing to a fever of a malignant nature, having broken out among the inmates of the Female Orphan Asylum, who occupy the upper part of the School House. It was found necessary to remove the diseased children into the Girls School Room, in order to prevent risk to the rest of the orphans, to which otherwise they would have been imminently exposed. regret that the Committee learn that the matron and one It is with of the orphans have fallen victims to the disease. Annual Christmas Dinner was not given this year, owing to The the same distressing cause, but it is hoped that this interesting annual spectacle, so gratifying to the feelings of all, may yet be exhibited within the ensuing twelve months.

The Committee before they conclude, feel themselves called upon to notice the very kind manner in which the Resolution passed at the last Annual Meeting, requesting the Bishop of Vermont to preach the Annual Sermon, in aid of the Society, was immediately complied with; it is the first instance of a Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the neighbouring states, having officiated on a similar occasion. The appeal to the congregation both at the morning and evening services, was such, that a large and very seasonable collection was made, which in particular partially relieved the pressing wants of the School.

With this detailed account of their proceedings, the Committee close their Report. They call upon all to come forward, in the dissemination of the Scriptures, and in placing in the hands of the people, the materials of religious and useful knowledge, furnished in the publications of the Society. This Institution has claims particularly upon

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the members of the Church of England; let them not be backward in support of their own Institution. If there has been any lukewarmness, any want of exertion hitherto manifested, let it exist no longer, let the active personal exertions of the members be re-doubled, to procure for it the support it requires, and may the Giver of every perfect gift, shed down upon the Society his blessing, destitute of which, their labours will never be crowned with success.
