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CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT.

To the Vestry and Congregation of St. James' Cathedral:

When our last Easter Vestry was held, the Vacancy created in the Rectory by the lamented death of our much beloved Pastor the late Dean of Toronto had not been filled.

The Bishop, after consultation with the members of the congregation, having appointed the Rev. Canon DuMoulin, M.A., Rector of St. Martin's Church, Montreal, he was inducted into the Rectory on the 20th August last, and on the first day of October following, assumed charge of the Rectory and Parish Work.

In the meantime, advances were made to the Rev. Mr. Rainsford, which resulted in his accepting the call to the Rectory of St. George, in New York, for which he resigned his connection with our Church on the first of January last.

The interruption consequent upon the vacancy and changes to which we have referred, has had a perceptible effect upon our Congregation and its undertakings; but we look forward with confidence to vigorous prosecution of all branches of our work under the active and zealous supervision of our new Rector.

We would embrace this opportunity of assuring Canon DuMoulin that he has gained the confidence and esteem of his flock; and we would most earnestly exhort the Congregation to extend to him their most cordial support in all his work as well as their sympathy with him in all the difficulties which must inevitably be encountered by him in the management of so large a Parish. Thus may we, pastor and people, go forward united in the maintenance of our Cathedral

Church, and in the prosecution of our work, striving only in so doing for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom and Glory; and may the blessing of Heaven rest upon our united endeavours.

In presenting their accounts for the past year, the Church-wardens have to call attention to the fact that no provision has been made by the Vestry for the payment of the Assistant Clergy; and on account of the claim set up by the Clergy of the other city Churches to the income beyond \$5,000 derived from endowments heretofore received in connection with the Church, and out of which the Assistant Clergy have always been paid, the Churchwardens were called upon to pay their salaries during the year just ended.

In consequence of this it will be seen that the expenditure during the past year has largely exceeded the income, and it will be necessary to make provision for a like deficiency during the coming year.

It was found that the residence occupied as the Rectory required considerable alteration and improvements before the Rector could take possession, and at a Vestry specially called for consideration of the subject, the Churchwardens were instructed to have such alterations made. It will be necessary also to provide about \$4,000 for this purpose.

The congregation will readily see that claims are made upon them at this time for more liberal contributions on their part than have heretofore been required of them.

The appeal made to the congregation to augment their subscriptions on the envelope system has not met with that response which was looked for, and unless the voluntary contributions of the congregation are forthcoming, it will, we fear, be incumbent upon the Churchwardens for the ensuing year to increase the pew rents and ground rents so as to provide for the expenditure necessary in carrying on our work, or otherwise make provision for the same.

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As the claim made by the city clergy upon the income heretofore available for the support of the assistant clergy of this Church has sericusly effected the position of the Vestry, the Chrchwardens have felt it their duty to resist such claim.

For the information of such members of our Vestry as are not acquainted with the facts, it is perhaps fitting that we should state the issue which has been raised:—

In 1820, the block of land on which our Cathedral Church stands, was granted by the Crown to Trustees, "for the sole use and benefit of the parishioners and inhabitants of the town of York for ever as a churchyard and burying ground, for the inhabitants of the said town of York, and as appurtenant to the Church now built thereon."

St. James' Church was the Church then built thereon, and to it the said lands were declared appurtenant. In the letters patent granting the said land, it was provided that such part of the said land as was not required for the said purposes should be held by the Trustees "for the sole use and benefit of the Clergyman of the Church of England, then resident in the said town of York, and his successors being Clergymen of the Church of England, and having the cure of souls in the said town appointed, or to be appointed Rector of the Episcopal Church therein to which the said land is appurtenant." Under this provision the lands adjoining the Cathedral on King street were leased. This Vestry contends that the Rector of St. James' alone is the successor of the Clergyman then residing in the town of York: that our Rector is the only successor appointed to the Episcopal Church to which the land is appurtenant.

St. James' Church was entitled from the Crown to other lands in the town of York, adjoining the above parcel of land, but by an error in the grant from the Crown, such lands were lost to the Church. A claim was thereupon prepared to the Government, which claim was admitted, and the Crown

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determined to make a further grant to St. James', in lieu of those lands lost through the error of the Government.

In 1819, certain lands in the then town of York, were granted to Trustees to convey as they should be directed by order in Council.

By order in Council of December, 1824, the Trustees in the last mentioned grant were directed, and pursuant to such order in Council and direction, in 1825 such Trustees did convey to certain other Trustees for the Church land on the south side of King street, and on the north side of Adelaide street, upon similar trusts.

The lands embraced in this conveyance were taken in lieu of those lost through the error of the Government in the former grant from the Crown, and this Vestry claims the same rights to them and to the income therefrom.

Under the Act 31 Geo. 3, ch. 31, (an Act to make further provision for the Government of the then Province of Quebec,) it was provided that Rectories might be established, that lands might be appropriated for the endowment of every such Rectory, and that such endowment should be effected by an instrument under the Great Seal of the Province.

No Rectory was however established in the town or township of York until 1836, when by letters patent under the Great Seal of the Province, a Rectory was "erected and constituted" at the city of Toronto, within the township of York, "to be known, styled, and designated as the first parsonage or Rectory within the said township of York, otherwise known as the Parsonage or Rectory of St. James," and by the same letters patent 800 acres of land in the township of York (now known as the Glebe Lands, situate in and adjoining Yorkville,) were set apart as a Glebe and Endowment to be held appurtenant with the said Parsonage or Rectory.

In 1866, an Act was passed authorizing the Synod to sell and dispose of lands granted by the Crown, as a Glebe of or

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as appurtenant or belonging to or appropriated for a Rectory, and providing for the investment of the proceeds, and the application of the income therefrom, and under the provisions of that Act and of a subsequent Act, the Rector of St. James' is entitled to \$5,000 per annum out of the income arising from the invested funds derived from the sale of such lands.

Under the authority of these Acts sales have been made of a large part of the 800 acres described in the letters patent creating the Rectory, and over \$10,000 thus realized by such sales has been invested by the Synod.

This Vestry contends that the Act applies only to the 800 acres set apart and appropriated for the endowment of the Rectory by the letters patent establishing the Rectory, and the proceeds of sales thereof, and that the Act does not apply to the lands in Toronto, granted and conveyed to Trustees as a churchyard and burying ground and appurtenant to the church, which was erected long prior to the creation of a Rectory.

The city Clergy, however, assumed that they were entitled to the whole income arising from the whole endowment (except \$5,000), to be paid to our Rector out of the invested funds.

The present Rector having declared to us that all income to which he, as Rector or Incumbent of this Church, may be entitled, in excess of the \$5,000, shall be applied by him toward the enlargement and support of the Ministry of the Church, and in the promotion of the spiritual work in which the congregation, as such, may be engaged, it was deemed expedient to resist the claim made by the city Clergy, and to assert the rights of the Rector to the income in excess of \$5,000, which are now, in fact, the rights of the congregation; such income in excess to be used by him, as aforesaid, for the increase and support of the Ministry.

In June last instructions were given by the Synod to submit a special case, so that the opinion of the Court might be obtained upon the questions in dispute. In July, the Churchwardens met a committee representing the city Clergy, when, after discussion, it was apparent that there was no prospect of coming at any settlement of the question in dispute; and it was understood that the special case should be prepared and submitted to the Churchwardens.

In October the Churchwardens, by request of the Rector, again met a committee representing the city Clergy, without effecting any settlement of the differences, and it was then again understood that the special case should be immediately submitted.

The draft of the special case was not however sent to the the Churchwardens till the end of November, when it was placed in the hands of Messrs. Gamble & Gamble, as the solicitors for the Rector and Vestry.

Concurrently with the submission of the case, notice was given of an intention to apply for legislation (which had been more than once threatened) upon the subject, and it was not thought advisable or necessary to incur any expense in connection with the special case until it could be seen whether the legislation applied for would affect the question.

Upon the proposed bill being introduced to the Legislature, it was found that the first clause of the proposed Act would give the city Clergy all they were contending for in the special case, and other sections were calculated to prejudice the claim of the Cathedral.

By the instructions of a special Vestry, the bill was opposed and amendments were obtained in the bill to prevent its affecting the lands in dispute; when the promoters of the bill withdrew it.

Upon the withdrawal of the bill the Churchwardens arranged a consultation with their counsel, and by their advice their solicitors made requisitions upon the solicitors of the city Clergy for documents and other evidence establishing statements contained in the draft of the special case which they were asked to admit, and as soon as the papers

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and some of the evidence required were furnished another consultation was had with counsel, when the special case was settled in the form in which counsel advised it should be framed, having regard to the rights of this Vestry through their Rector.

The city Clergy, however, in the meantime, commenced an action asserting their rights, and that action is being defended.

In this suit the rights of the city Clergy and of the Rector of St. James', on behalf of the congregation, will be ascertained.

It remains for the Vestry to determine whether they wish the litigation further defended.

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Rector's Statement.

The present Rector entered upon his duties on the 1st October last, six months after the decease of the late lamented Dean. In the month of January the Rector lost the valuable help of his esteemed and beloved colleague, the Rev. W. S. Rainsford, and a month later the Rev. R. L. Brydges, one of the assistants, also removed to a like position in St. George's Church, New York, thus reducing the staff to nearly one-half of its former number. So many changes in the Clerical body of a Church in so short a time have a necessary tendency to disorganization and interruption of the work, and, therefore, the past year has been unusually trying and unsettling. The several institutions did not re-assemble for the winter work till late in the season, and, this combined with other causes, no doubt, retarded in some measure the full success of their operations. Notwithstanding their difficulties, a good winter's work has been done, as will appear from the several statements hereunte The Clergy report as follows: annexed.

The Rector begs to call particular attention to the following matters:—

THE CLERICAL STAFF

At present is insufficient to do the work of the Parish and the Cemetery duty. There always has been in the Cathedral a "First Assistant." This position has been for some time vacant; and the Rector desires to impress upon the Vestry the great and urgent need there is that it should be filled as efficiently and as speedily as possible.

THE SACRED EDIFICE.

The attention of the Congregation is called to the expediency of cleaning and lighting the Church. At evening service the light is insufficient. The colouring of walls and ceilings afresh and the introduction of additional gas standards would remedy this deficiency, and add greatly to the brightness and attractiveness of the Church.

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RECTOR'S BIBLE CLASSES.

The Rector felt it a great privilege to resume "The Ladies' Bible Class" conducted for so many years by the late Dean. The class re-assembled in November last, and has since met every Thursday afternoon. The book of "The Acts" has been studied as far as chap. 4. The attendance has been most encouraging, ranging from 80 to 100. The weekly hour with this class, and the time spent in preparation for it have been hours of great enjoyment to the teacher. The usual collection for some Missionary object will be made before the class closes for the season.

The Rector has conducted "The Church of England Class" in the Normal School since October last, and has lately held an "Occasional Bible Class" at Mrs. Neville's school, Rolleston House.

The Sunday School.

In presenting our Annual Report we very deeply regret the loss of our Superintendent Mr. John Gillespie, of the Rev. W. S. Rainsford, the Rev. Ralph Brydges, and other valuable teachers.

The Secretary's report shows a decrease in the average attendance of the scholars, but our Rector's earnest efforts have secured a number of teachers to replace those lost to us. We venture to hope that in our next return we will be able to report an increasing and prosperous school.

YOUNG MEN'S BIBLE CLASS.

Mr. HAGUE writes :-

"The average attendance is now about 30. I would like to impress upon all those who know or have influence with young men the importance of this class. In these days nothing can so successfully fortify a young man against the

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assaults of scepticism, as a thorough aquaintance with the word of God. My endeavour will be, if I am spared, to make this class a means of establishing and rooting in the faith those of maturer knowledge. I have been much struck, during the few times that I have had the priviledge of teaching, with the intelligence and spirituality of the members of the class. My hopes are strong, that in the future it will be, as it has been in the past, a source of great blessing and strength."

YOUNG LADIES' BIBLE CLASS.

MR. BLAKE writes :-

"The ordinary attendance when the schools in the city are in session exceeds 100. During the vacations, when many of the scholars are absent from the city, the number present does not average over 40. The amount subscribed by the class has been larger this year than ever, owing to a certain extent, no doubt, to the introduction and carrying out, by our zealous and punctual secretary, Miss Platt, of the envelope system. The opening meeting of this Association was held on the 11th December, 1882. It has taken the place of the former Young Men's Association. One object of this change was, to supply a means by which all the members of the congregation might meet from time to time in a social way, and thus become better known to each other. It was also thought that such an Association would be very valuable in reaching many who would otherwise remain strangers. With these objects in view the change was made. The result has been a marked success. The attendance has been very good, about 300 being the average. We have been fortunate in having during the winter addresses from the Rev. Canon DuMoulin and the Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, readings from the Hon. S. H. Blake and Mr. John Canavan, and an illustrated lecture by Mr. Bengough. Many ladies and gentlemen have also kindly furnished us with music from time to time. At each meeting a half an hour is allowed for conversation, which is regarded as a most important element in the meetings. The business of the Association is carried on entirely by the Executive Committee. Any member of the congregation may become a member upon payment of the annual fee of twenty-five cents. The meetings, however, are free to all, whether they are enrolled as members or not. We trust that, by the blessing of God, the Association has already done a good work, and that it may continue to do so; we invite the hearty co-operation of every member of the congregation.

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REPORT OF DEVOTIONAL WORK.

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This work which is carried on by members of the Devotional Committee of the Y. P. A., consists chiefly in the conducting of cottage meetings within the parish. It is a branch of parochial work, the importance of which cannot be over-estimated. As the meetings are held in the poorer districts, large numbers of those who do not habitually attend any place of worship have an opportunity of hearing the gospel, strangers are brought into the Church, who would otherwise be lost; children are collected into the Sunday School, and emigrants, and new comers find a Church home.

The work was begun this year under circumstances of exceptional difficulty and discouragements, many of the best workers having dropped out through sickness or other causes, but the results have far exceeded our anticipations. The four meetings held every week, directly in connection with the Cathedral, are all most successful, and accomplishing most certainly the objects which the cottage meetings are designed to attain. Two others which were formerly in connection with our work on King street east, and St. David street, have now been transferred to Christian workers, in the parishes of Trinity and St. Peter's.

The following is a list of the meetings:-

53 Queen street—Mr. A. Grasett and Mr. Bridgeman-Simpson. Average attendance, 27.

Sherbourne street — Mr. Helliwell and Mr. O'Meara. Average attendance, 30.

15 Duchess street - Mr. Shaw and Mr. Acheson. Average attendance, 39.

114 Duchess street—Mr. Wrong. Average attendance, 56. At the last meeting at 114 Duchess street, 87 were present.

It was thought that as a large number of those attending these meetings are unconnected with any Church, a social or tea meeting in the school-house, would be the means of attracting them to the Church, and make them take a deeper interest in its services. Accordingly, on Monday evening, February 26th, between four and five hundred of those attending cottage meetings were gathered together in the school-house. Addresses were delivered by the Rector and others, and tea and coffee and cakes, provided through the kindness of the ladies of the congregation, most thoroughly enjoyed. It was certainly as one said, "the most Christ-like and apostolic meeting which had been seen for some time." Its beneficial effects are already being seen. is proposed to hold another early in May, at the close of the meetings for the year. The expense of the meetings, about \$4 per month, are paid out of a fund subscribed for the purpose by members of the congregation.

We would, in concluding, convey to the ladies of the District Visitors' and Ladies' Aid Association our deep sense of gratitude for their valuable assistance in gathering in hearers, and their hearty self denial in attending the meetings to assist the singing, and for the encouragement of those whom they invited to go.

YOUNG WOMEN'S BOARDING HOUSE.

The devotional meeting of the Y. W. B. H. on the 1st Thursday of the month, is of a most interesting character, taking the form of a Bible reading interspersed, with hymns and prayer.

The Bible instruction is listened to with the deepest attention, and we trust that at the close of each gathering the feeling of the hearts of many of the young people is: "It was good tor us to have been here."

The Penny Savings Bank.

It having been decided to close the Bank for the reasons stated below, it was deemed advisable to omit publishing the usual report at the close of the calendar year; the present report is therefore for a period of nearly fifteen months.

The reasons which induced the management to close the Bank, were the following:

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1. The impossibility of obtaining a permanent office on King street, from being unable, on account of the expense, to lease for their exclusive use a building, in such a situation.

2. In May of last year when compelled to move for the second time, it was found impossible to obtain even temporary accommodation on King street, and the Bank was therefore removed to the School House; it thus becoming very distinctly a church institution, a very considerable class of our depositors at once closed their accounts, and the situation of the Bank in a comparatively unfrequented neighborhood prevented it from obtaining many new accounts.

3. An analysis of the deposit moreover shewed that there was an ever increasing proportion of the money received from depositors coming in, in sums of \$1 and upwards, a class of depositors for whom the Management felt no longer bound to provide banking facilities, the Government having within the last year opened three night banks where such sums could be placed.

After making every effort to reach our depositors by circulars sent to their addresses, and by advertising, there yet remain on the books 245 open accounts having at their credit \$40.88; 164 of these having balances of 10c. and under.

It is proposed to hand over this balance to the Vestry Clerk, who could then pay any who from time to time might be found to claim their balances.

In regard to the large balance at the credit of the interest account it is unknown exactly, how much will be required by the Secretary, (who is at present in England) to pay the running expenses, already incurred, but it is believed that after the payment of these, there will be a balance of at least \$80, and this it is proposed to hand over to the St. James' Cathedral Young People's Association, the successors of the C. Y. M. A., from whose funds the expenses of the

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The following officers were appointed: President, Mrs. DuMoulin; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Growski, Mrs. E. Blake, Lady Howland and Mrs. Gilmor; Secretary, Mrs. Greene; Treasurer, Mrs. Morgan Baldwin.

A Committee was formed to purchase material, cut out and arrange the work.

Canon DuMoulin suggested to the meeting that some struggling rural mission in the Diocese might receive from it a helping hand, mentioning the mission of Washago as one which being still in its infancy, would be glad of any help that the Society could give. He also named a large family in an outlying mission, to whom a box of useful clothing might be sent.

Before the regular meetings were begun, a small sale of work which had been left from a Bazaar of the previous year was held. \$218.40 was received, of this \$25 was paid, as formerly promised, to Mr. Geo. Gillespie, to assist with the refreshments at the opening of Wycliffe College, the remainder being the proceeds of work done originally for that College, also belonged to them, and so \$193.40 was sent to the Treasurer, Mr. W. H. Howland.

It was decided at a meeting held on Feb. 2nd not to hold any bazaar, the ladies agreeing to get what orders for work they could, and also to have the work done laid on the table at our weekly meetings, in the hope of finding purchasers amongst those present. Our financial condition is so modest, that the Treasurer thinks it unnecessary to send in a separate report. From members' fees and special donations \$90 have been received; work sold at the meeting (some small sums yet unpaid) \$20.55; total \$110.55.

\$51.50 of this was expended for material, \$20 was sent with the box to our clerical friend last week, leaving a balance on hand of \$39.05. This box (valued at \$75) was packed with all sorts of useful clothing, and all the ladies

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eting of ary, and cers, the of workagreed that they had never worked for anything that gave them so much real pleasure as the filling of this box.

If the family receiving it could know what a privilege it was regarded to be allowed to assist in some slight degree those who are bearing the burden and heat of the day, which we, in comfortable city Churches, have not the faintest idea of, they would enjoy the receiving nearly as much as the Cathedral Ladies' Aid did the sending of it. At present, we have 58 members with an average attendance of 35 at the meetings for work, which are held every Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, instead of on Friday afternoon as formerly. Compared with past years, our work seems very small, but when the many changes are taken into account, and the length of time in which the Society was virtually disbanded, we think we have reason to "thank God and take courage."

No work is allowed to leave the School till fully finished and paid for.

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The Rector has frequently visited the School, and addressed the children. He regards this as a most important and beneficial work, as tending to encourage habits of industry and self-reliance.

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THE DISTRICT VISITORS' SOCIETY.

During the past year the ladies of the District Visitors' Society paid 4,670 visits, distributed 6,572 tracts, brought 55 children to our Sunday School, got a promise from 38 adults that they would attend Divine Worship, and gave to those in need 164 Relief Tickets.

Besides this they were materially helped to make our Cottage Meetings the success they have been through the winter, by bringing them before the people in their districts, and urging them to attend.

During the year five of our visitors have been compelled to resign their districts from ill health, &c., but their places have been filled by others who volunteered their services, and if we had but four more visitors, each of the 30 districts would be supplied, though there are several new districts which there is an urgent necessity to open, had we but the ladies to undertake them.

The clergy have to thank the visitors for the complete lists furnished of their various districts, and by their means many poor have been relieved, and many sick cheered and comforted, who might otherwise have been left unvisited by their clergyman, at a time when such visits are sorely needed.

The monthly meetings, for report of work done, have been held regularly on the 1st Tuesday of each month, presided over by Mr. Greene, and always included prayer, reading of Scripture, and a short address, as a helpful beginning for the new month's work.

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During the early part of the year, the Society sent a contribution to the Bishop of Saskatchewan for the mission at the Cypress Hills.

As will be seen by the subscription list, donations have been given to Algoma, China, and other places as well as to Home Mission work.

Every giver is left free to send his money for whatever special mission he pleases; but if he names no other, Beaconsfield and Cypress Hills, are the missions the Society is now pledged to assist as far as possible. It is earnestly desired to increase this mission work. A few more ladies have kindly undertaken to assist in collecting.

It has been proposed that we should aid the great work going on in India. The Society hopes to be able to do something for it, in the near future, though at present it had to decline. Even so small a sum as \$50 per annum would pay for a native teacher. Surely this much might be done.

Meetings were held in several Parochial centres during the week, and the movement in this parish closed with a sermon on the evening of the second Sunday in Advent in the Cathedral by Canon The two pledges of the Society were largely DuMoulin. circulated on all occasions, and many were returned to the Cathedral clergy duly signed. It is proposed to call a special meeting of all those who have thus enrolled themselves, and so form the nucleus of what in this parish should be a Temperance body of great strength and influence.
