REPORT.

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The year 1866 will be distinguished in history for events of transcendent grandeur and importance which have occurred during it. These cannot fail to exercise a mighty influence upon the future destinies of mankind. Brief allusion to a few of them which have opened or may open "a great door and effectual" for the spread of "The Book" containing "the everlasting gospel," cannot be an unsuitable introduction to a Bible Society's Report.

"From the rising of the sun even unto the going down of the same, my name shall be great among the Gentiles, and in every place incense shall be offered unto my name, and a pure offering, for my name shall be great among the heathen, saith

the Lord of hosts."

The vast territorial and political changes effected in the map of Europe by war and diplomacy, by which the whole of Italy excepting Rome, is now harmoniously united under the government of King Victor Emmanuel; the States of Germany by the short and sanguinary but signally successful campaign of Prussia transferred from bigoted Roman Catholic, to liberal Protestant dominion; the Pope's temporal power, no longer propped up by foreign bayonets, rapidly tottering to its fall; the increasing favor shown to Protestant institutions where before they were repudiated and maligned:these signs of the times, to which ought to be added the wonderful triumph of science and art in laying the Atlantic telegraph, by which Europe and America can make their thoughts known to each other as if they were in close contact, are propitious, and demand the warmest thanks to Almighty God of every friend of Divine truth, as tending to advance the happy revolution in human affairs prophetically announced in the passage of Scripture above quoted. But are there no "signs of the times" less propitious, or even adverse, which ought to be taken into account in an endeavor rightly to estimate the present state of the civilized world in relation to the words of the Bible and the reception of them in their true spiritual

import?

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Your Committee cannot pass over in silence the portentous fact, that while the truth as it is in Jesus is wending its way slowly but gradually to the intellects and hearts of rude, uncultivated barbarians in almost all parts of the world, the Ritualistic party of the Church of England have in numbers gone over to Rome in affection, although many of them still linger within her fold, and indulge in strange vagaries, and delight in multiform rites and ceremonies, which true Protestants greatly dislike and shrink from. But it is not only Ritualism with the evils flowing from it which is to be guarded, prayed, and fought against with spiritual weapons. There is a vast array of monstrous indescribable forms of error rampant, including atheism, pantheism, rationalism, spiritualism, universalism, &c., threatening to destroy the foundations of our faith, and annihilate our hopes of immortality.

KINGSTON AUXILIARY.

We have this year imposed upon us the melancholy duty of recording the decease of the late Thomas Hendry, Esq., one of the Vice-Presidents of the Auxiliary. His illness was most painful, and deeply distressing to his sorrowing relatives; but after a few days' severe anguish, we have good reason to hope

that he departed to be for ever with the Lord.

The Rev. Thomas Nolan, who with the Rev. T. Phillips formed a deputation to the American Bible Society on the occasion of the Jubilee of that institution, visited Kingston and addressed a public meeting in the City Hall, June 4th. He communicated interesting intelligence, particularly relative to the history of the Arabic bible, and the generous gift of electrotype plates of it, by that great society to our still more distinguished parent.

COLPORTEUR'S REPORTS.

Your Colporteur, Mr. John Finlayson, has labored diligently in his field, and has proved himself deserving of the entire confidence of your Committee. There is no agency, it appears to your Committee, so well adapted for carrying "the Word of God" to distant settlements as this. A suggestion of this worthy servant is well deserving of being carefully and prayerfully considered. It is his conviction that great good might be effected if a meeting were held once a year (at least) in the schoolhouse of each township, at which one or two zealous ministers, with other friends of the cause, should be present and address it in an interesting manner upon the character and claims of the Bible Society to their support; after which addresses, collectors should be appointed to receive donations there and then, and to canvass the surrounding country for subscriptions. In this way he is of opinion that a knowledge of the blessings to be derived from the perusal of Holy Scripture would be acquired where there is now lamentable ignorance, and a great increase of funds might accrue. At present it would appear that holding meetings only in towns and villages, does not draw together many, who, if this plan were followed, might probably be induced to attend.

The following extracts from Mr. Finlayson's monthly reports will convey some idea of his mode of dealing with different classes of people under varying circumstances:—

Consolation to the Afflicted.—"Visited an aged man of 80 years—found him willing to be instructed—read a portion of the life-giving word with him, and while pleading with God on his behalf he called aloud for mercy, bathed in tears! I hope he is in earnest seeking salvation."

A young man on a sick bed said, "O, how glad I am you have come to see me, no man to care for my soul in this place or give a word of comfort." Mr. F. read and prayed with him, and gave him as much comfort as warranted by God's word. He thanked him and asked him to return.

On another occasion he says: "I heard the other day of a man who said that he spent the best night of his life with me in his own house, and was wishing much for my return."

SABBATH Schools, &c.—He has frequently visited Sabbath schools and Bible classes, and given them good advice. Having been long a teacher, and a successful one, his counsels must be valuable.

ROMAN CATHOLICS.—A married woman greatly delighted with the Bible, a portion of which she perused daily. Three Bibles sold to Roman Catholics.

Bible Destitution.—In a family of the upper class, with six children, no Bible or Testament—the little ones clustered round him, begging for a Testament. At last the old father yielded to their solicitations, and bought six Testaments for the children and a Bible of large type for himself. He owned that he had read but little of the Bible for twenty years.

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IRRELIGION AND DEPRAVITY.—In one of his reports he says: "The land through which I have passed is a good land, but many of the people very wicked. Conversed with a man the other day who said he had only heard one sermon for eight years, and that he did not believe in hell, and would do as well as those who spent time in going to church. When I asked him where he thought he would go after death, he said he could not tell, nor any other man. This is one of the many wild dreamers I meet with in this part of the country."

During the Fenian raid your Colporteur was employed distributing tracts and selling Bibles amongst the volunteers in the city for about a fortnight. He had leave of absence to visit his family for a fortnight at Christmas.

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

In common with our friends of the Upper Canada Bible Society and of the Parent Society, we have to lament the loss sustained by us all in the decease of the late J. S. Howard, Esq., for upwards of twenty years the zealous and most efficient Secretary of the Society with which we are now immediately connected.

The issues of this Society, according to last Report, have been of Bibles, 17,889; Testaments, 30,592; parts, 1,128; portions for the blind, 2; total, 49,591; being 14,360 more than the issues of the preceding year. Grand total of Scriptures issued by the Society since the commencement of its operations, 569,471. Five Colporteurs have been employed during 44 months and 22 days. Sold by them 7,824 Bibles and Testaments. Given away, 261. Families visited, 13,389. Miles travelled, 6,697. In all 41 new Branches have been formed, including those within the boundary of London and Kingston. Total receipts, \$25,951.30. Payments, \$25,443.45. Cash in Treasurer's hands, \$407.85.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The receipts of the year of the British and Foreign Bible Society from ordinary sources have amounted to £161,828 15s. 3d.; for special purposes the sum of £9,546 14s. 11d. have been contributed. Total, £171,375 10s. 2d. The amount applicable to the general purposes of the Society is £80,525 12s. 10d. The receipts in payment of Scripture have amounted to £81,303 2s. 5d., and have been received from the following sources:—

The total disbursements, £182,402 3s. 5d., being £12,658 9s. 7d. more than the previous year.

The donations have equalled in liberality those of former years, and show that the Society possesses the affections of the people. Legacies not so numerous or large, although by no means inconsiderable.

The benevolent fund has issued £365 3s. to Colporteurs and other faithful servants reduced to straitened circumstances, and no longer fit for active duties. One most deserving and long tried Agent of the Society in Greece, the Rev. J. Lowndes, has received £125.

The Financial Engagements of the Society amount to £109,121 5s. 7d. This sum includes £37,577, the estimated cost of editions of the Scriptures passing through the press in this country.

Issues.—The issues from the Depots at home and abroad have amounted to 2,296,130 copies. The total issues of the Society now amount to fifty million two hundred and eightyfive thousand seven hundred and nine copies.
