Greatest Battle In History of The World Now Impending

SOON, IS BELIEF OF MILITARY EXPERTS

General Staff of French Army Confident of Fighting Under Favorable Auspices

Antwerp Strongly Fortified and Will Put Up a Determined Resistance to German Advance -Seaports Damaged by Warships on Both Sides—Japan Making Active Preparations To Ostend during the past few days," says Move on Kiao Chow

"The most formidable shock in history," will occur on Belgian soil, accordfing to French military experts, when the great armies of Germans and Austrians on the one side, and the allied troops of Belgium, France and Britain on the other, come into close contact. No definite information is permitted to entry into Brussels was made yesterday by an advance guard of German cavalry, who, it was reported, were to be followed today by a strong column of German troops encamped in the vicinity. After the departure of the Belgian troops from the capital, communication was cut off between that city and other parts of Belgium, and abroad. The temporary capital of the country, Antwerp, whither the Belgians have retired, is understood to be very strongly fortified, and military correspondents declare that the preparations for its defence extend over an enormous area, while it has been provisioned for a long siege.

GERMAN CRUELTY


Military Men Characterize The German Force Moving Across Belgium as Overwhelming — It Stretches Out For Thirty Miles

London, Aug. 21-(8.20 a. m.)-"Brusels is filled with refugees from the sur bers who left the city for Ghent and the Daily Chronicle's Ghent correspondent

Many are camped in the public square whose homes in the suburbs have bee fired by the Prussians. The roads leading into Brussels have been crowded all day with all manner of conveyances, many drawn by dogs and others by girls, women and aged peasants.

"Most of these people have lost everything. Few of them have any money. The peasant is considered lucky who succeeded in saving a single horse or a cow. Most all of them tell of German barbarieies, but it is evident that a majority of these tales are somewhat exaggerated.

"Military men chartcterize the German force which is moving across Belgium as overwhelming, saying it consists of at least two or three army corps. The advance of this huge force is covered over the entire thirty mile front by a screen of cavalry. The Germans had no difficulty in taking Louvain, which was virtually undefended."

ALCOHOL AS MOTOR FUEL

(West India Committee Circular). The scarcity and consequent high price of petrol which has resulted from the growing wants of the motor industry has again brought forward the question of the value of alcohol as a source of power, and a committee has been formed by the Royal Automobile Club for the purpose of enquiring into the matter. This committee, which is composed of experts of acknowledged standing, will investigate fully and independently the possibilities of the general and economic employment of alcohol as a fuel for internal combustion engines. That alcohol is quite suitable for the uurpose has been already demonstrated, and we understand that it will be the object of the committee to carry out experiments (for which a sum of £30,000 is needed), with the view of definitely ascertaining the most economical way of using the alcohol, as well as—and this is an important point—discovering a method of denaturing which will be acceptable to the government, cheap to the user, and harmless to the motor. The sources of cheap alcohol are numerous, but the one which specially concerns West Indian sugar producers is molasses. The markets for rum and cattle food being lim-

ited, there is a very large surplus supply of molasses which has at present little or no value, and if the use of alcohol became general for motor purposes, a cheap source of spirit would be found in the refuse molasses of cane sugar factories

els—making the third year of abundant wheat and the second in succession of recor rops.

The wheat crop this year is more than sufficient for the needs of the country and the surplus for export is a record one. Our domestic requirement for bread and seed is now 625,000,000, and ten years ago a crop of that proportion was regarded as a banner one.

It is singular that in the plenty of our winter wheat, in the excessive amount available for feeding other nations, the world's production of wheat has fallen off. In Russia where a billion bushel crop was gathered last year, the yield has fallen off 150,000,000. In the present war region of eastern Europe, the fertile Danube plains were burned by hot winds, and the yield there is smaller. In Argentina the big southern continent exporter, the yield was reduced almost half; even on our northern border—the western prairie provinces of Canada—not over two-thirds of last year's big crop has been gathered. The peoples of western Europe except France and Spain, are dependent upon the wheat fields of the world for bread; England, Holland, Belgium, Scandinavia, require 400,000,000 bushels added to their 110,000,000 bushels home raised crop. The war has removed Russia from the exporting field, and the Danubian regions have no outlet for their small surplus this year. The big crop in this country is providential to England, and contiguous nations; otherwise the difficulty of procuring sufficient food might have turned the tide of war sentiment in the administrative offices. The council knowing that over the sea was a supply of breadstuffs felt fortified to enter the war circle, and at the same time set apart a portion of her fleet to convoy our big surplus to her shores and to those of her allies whose dependence for bread is upon the outside.
