Heat the milk, then pour over the beaten eggs. Return to the double boller and cook till it adheres to the spoon. then add the gelatin that has been soaked in a little cold milk and strain when cold. Add the cream whip-ped stiff. When nearly frozen add the fruit. Turn a few times and pack well. Soak the cherries in the rum over night.
