N. B. MISSIONARY BANDITS' PRISONER

THRILLING TALE TOLD BY REV. W. B. WILLISTON

Wife and Boy Also Are in Attack and Robbery

FREED BY CHIEF BUT MONEY TAKEN

Graphic Tale Comes From China to Rev. R. T. McKim.

A thrilling encounter with Chinese bandits during which his party suffered a loss of more than \$800 is described by Rev. W. B. Williston in a letter dated February 13 last to Rev. R. Taylor McKim, rector of St. Mary's church here.

In the party were Mr. Williston, his wife and their young son, Walter, and all were handled roughly by the robbers until word was given by their chief to let them go.

Rev. Mr. Williston is well known here, having conducted missions in most of the Anglican churches here during his visit about three years ago. He is a native of Hardwick, Blue du Vin, and after graduating from the Moody Bible Institute, went to China as a missionary, being ordained to the ministry by Bishop Cassell. The loss sustained by Rev. Mr. Williston is a heavy one and any donations toward a fund to assist him should be made to Rev. Canon R. P. McKim or Rev. R. Taylor McKim.

TELUS GRAPHIC TALE. Rev. Mr. Williston's graphic account of the meeting with the bandits is as follows:

My dear Mr. McKim, I thought that this letter would have been written from Long An, but here we are yet. The reason being that we had rather a rough time with bandits and so I better start in where my last letter ended and tell you all about it. We left Chentu on 2nd of Feb. Mrs. Williston in her chair carried by three men, my young son in one carried by two, and because he is light, we put two red baskets on his chair, in one food and dishes needed on the way and in the other Walter's clothing and most of my wife's foreign clothes. We also had four men carrying loads for food and books and other school supplies while in Chentu.

SCANTY ESCORT. One of these men was carrying my black valise in which were my suit and other clothing, correspondence, etc. Acting under orders from the constabulary, the officials were informed of our departure and they sent one or two armed men as escort. These men are changed at every city. As I sold my horse I was walking to save money. The little dog was in Walter's chair and it was touching to see how they loved each other.

TOLD ROAD SAFE. We got into the city after an hour's delay and next morning, 4th, did not leave till eleven when we were told that the road was safe. We went on to Loh Chang, 17 miles, where there are a church and mission house with a Chinese evangelist in charge. Here too the gates were shut and soldiers and officials had all left.

AT TACKLED. When we were in the little valley, without five minutes warning from behind a little knoll our three men were leveled. Being within gunshot escape was impossible. I only could get one of our men to steal back and stop our loads from coming on. My horse boy shouted to them, telling them who we were, but they rushed on. I was seized and every thing I had on me taken.

TOOK BOYS DOG. As soon as I could recover away I rushed to where Walter and Mrs. Williston were. Walter had been thrown out and his dog and bed taken and two men were feeling him over to see if he had money on him. One was holding a gun at him. These I pushed

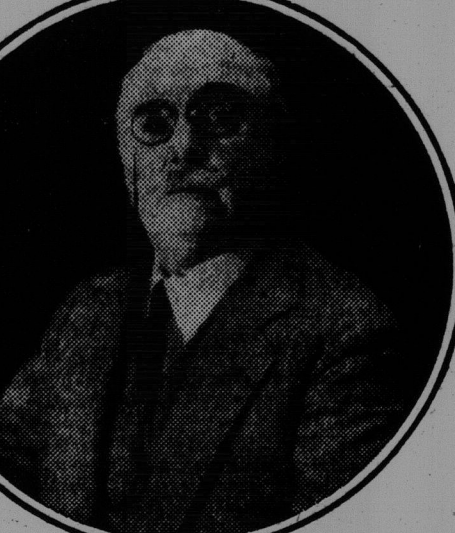

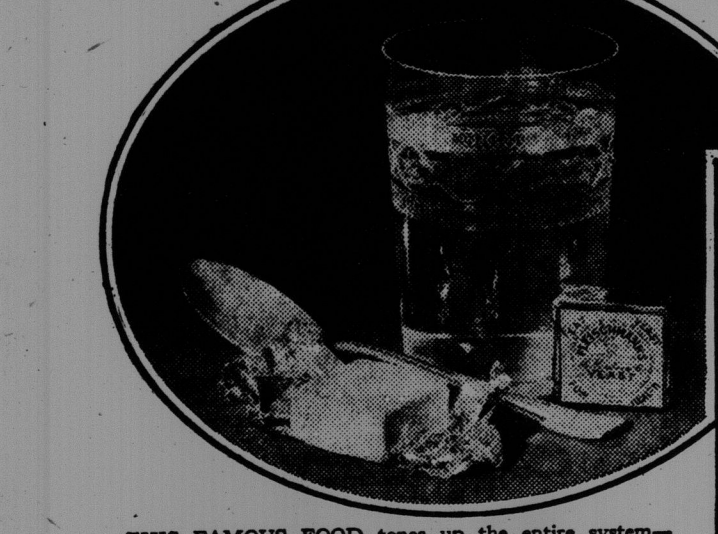

**SIR H. DRAYTON
FLAYS BUDGET,
HAS AMENDMENT**

Appealing for Protection,
Says Robb's Financing
Insult to People

**CLAIMS TARIFF OF
COUNTRY INADEQUATE**

Free Trade Is Advocated by
Liberal Member From
P. E. Island

THE AMENDMENT

OTTAWA, March 26—The Conservative amendment to the budget moved in the House by Sir Henry Drayton this afternoon reads as follows:

"That conditions in Canada urgently demand reduction of taxation, especially of the sales tax and other levies which have been increased by the present government and the House regrets that the financial statements now presented show no evidence of economy necessary to make such reductions possible but rather disclose an alarming increase in the public debt."

OTTAWA, March 26—Debate on the budget was continued in the house this afternoon by Sir Henry Drayton. He compared the financial statement of Hon. W. S. Fielding covering the year 1922-23 with that delivered by Mr. Robb on Tuesday last.

Mr. Fielding while showing ordinary revenue some \$50,000,000 greater than his ordinary expenditure, had admitted a deficit of \$31,000,000. This Government with revenue but \$34,000,000 greater than expenditure, claimed a surplus.

CALLED INSULT.

Such financing was "an insult to the intelligence of the country," Sir Henry asserted.

Sir Henry insisted that the solution for many of Canada's economic difficulties was a tariff which would afford protection to Canadian industries. He claimed that Canada had not had a high protective tariff for many years, nor had this country one today. Conditions in Canada had reached a point where in many lines of industry it was cheaper to manufacture in the United States and bring the manufactured product back to this country.

If the tariff was to high why did goods continue to come into Canada in such large quantities, Sir Henry asked.

\$700,000,000 SENT OUT.

The sum of \$700,000,000, the amount being sent out of Canada today for imports, could be kept in this country, providing work for the building up of Canadian industries and employment for hundreds of thousands of workers. Sir Henry stated that 60 per cent of the price to the consumer was looked upon today as representing the cost of labor for a product. It was quite easy to compute the number of men that would be given employment were these moneys kept in the country today. These workers were in the United States.

Surely the responsibility rested on the Government, and Canadian workers should have the benefit of their own market.

STATEMENT UNPALATABLE.

Sir Henry quoted from a publication of the United States Department of Commerce which stated that "economically and socially Canada may be considered a northern extension of the United States," and that trade might be considered more as domestic than foreign so far as the United States was concerned. Such statements were "unpalatable to any Canadian who thinks anything of his country," said Sir Henry, and to any Canadian who sees his country as a great nation of the future. Canada could only be great provided her resources were not exploited.

TERMED SHANDYGAFF.

"This country is simply a shandygaff today, so far as its finances are concerned," said Sir Henry. As a result of the years since 1883 when the United States had an excess balance of her world's trading of \$29,084,777,236, she received in payment of this balance excess gold to the amount of \$1,994,928,000. "My friends, the free traders, need not think the United States exporters are out that balance—not at all—it is covered at a good rate of interest by loans, and by the acquisition of business and other properties in countries subject to the industrial domination of the United States."

OPPOSES PROTECTION.

J. J. Hughes (Liberal, Kings, P. E. I.), said: "Protection never was, never will be, and never can be of any advantage to the farmers and fishermen of Prince Edward Island." He stated that Maritime Provinces fishermen could catch sufficient fish in two weeks to supply central Canada for 32 weeks.

Mr. Hughes stated that coal in the Maritime Provinces cost \$1.50 more per ton than in Montreal. "In other words, the other industries of the provinces, farmers, fishermen and lumbermen, will pay about \$1,500,000 a year for the support of the coal mines."

WOULD SLASH COAL DUTY.

As a free trader, Mr. Hughes would have preferred to have the duty of round coal reduced. He referred to a letter signed by Colonel Cantley, director of the British Empire Steel Corporation and former director of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company, in which the latter had stated that the

U. M. W. GENERAL STRIKE CALLED FOR APRIL 1

Miners Are Living in Barracks After Being Turned Out of Houses

INVESTIGATION SHOWS RIFLES PURCHASED

Survivors of Mine Disaster Believe Explosion Was Caused From Outside.

FAIRMONT, W. Va., March 27.—Is West Virginia again to witness a repetition of the mining war of 1921?

Is the explosion of the mine of the Bethlehem Mines Corporation mine at Barrackville, near Fairmont, where 94 men were entombed one of the first steps in the opening of such a war?

These are subjects on which your native West Virginian is loathe to talk. That they situation is grave they will admit, but beyond that they will not go.

Briefly the state faces this problem: General Strike.

The United Mine Workers have called a general strike for April 1.

The miners of the district in which Fairmont lies are living in barracks erected by the union after the ousting of the miners from the houses of the coal companies who opened up on the open shop basis.

Rumors flying around brought about an investigation which revealed that in one day a pawnbroker of Fairmont had sold \$1,400 worth of high-powered rifles to the ousted union miners.

Attempts are now being made to pass a law prohibiting the sale of such high-powered weapons without a permit.

Many Foreigners.

A survey of the union barracks at the Grantstown mine of the New England Fuel Co. showed that 97 per cent of the inmates are Russians, Slovaks and Italians.

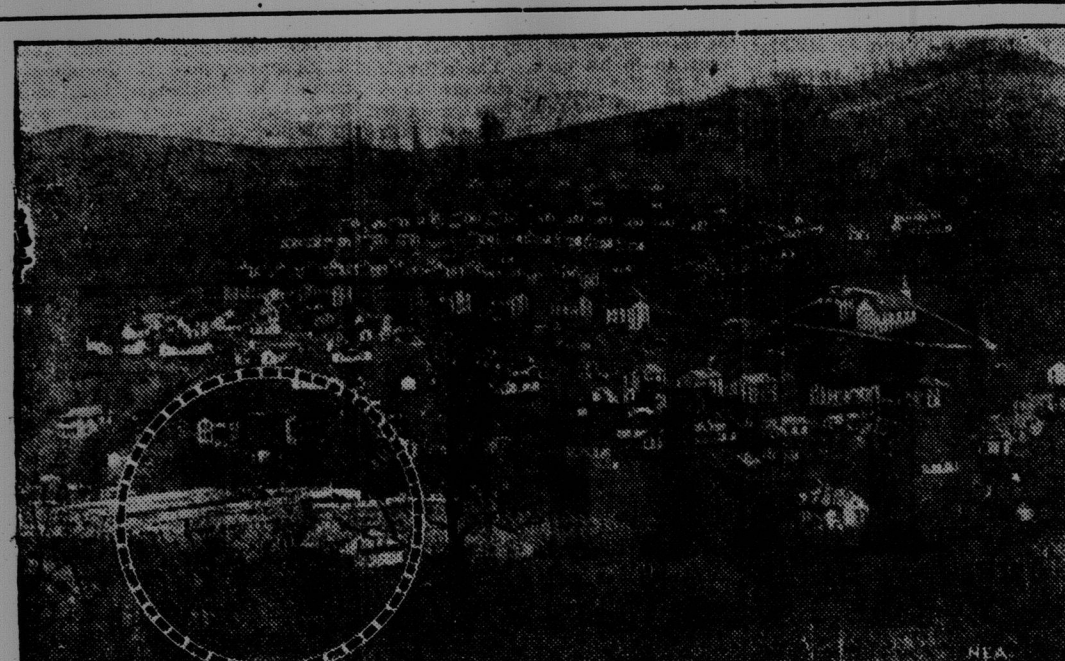
West Virginia state police claim that for the most part these men are members of the "Workers of the World," a communist organization.

Though no official explanation as yet has been made of the cause of the disaster at the Barrackville mine, the employees still alive are muttering to themselves that the explosion was from outside sources.

They point to the fact that as one gets away from the main shaft the damage grows less.

That if the explosion had occurred in the mine it would, in seeking an outlet, have sent its force almost equally

up the three shafts which reach the surface about 100 feet apart. Whereas only one of these shafts was damaged, and that one is almost a total wreck. They also call attention to the fact that the 80 horses killed in a stable near the bottom of the mine shaft were blown away from the shaft instead of toward it, as one would expect if the explosion had come from within.

These men, 92 per cent of whom are Americans, are very bitter.

EUROPE COMES FAST TO GRIPS WITH PROBLEM

Worry of France With Withdrawal of Troops From Rhine
TOPICS OF EMPIRE IN LONDON LETTER
Lord Lytton Is Spoken of as Viceroy in India.

Correspondence of The Times-Star. LONDON, March 22.—Downing street is much more alertly interested in Mr. Chamberlain's Paris visit than the British public shows the least sign of being. But while popular opinion is weary to death of abortive conferences and hopeless impasses, official London recognizes that at last the real crisis approaches. All through the tortuous post-war diplomacy only one thing has counted. All the side-issues about reparations, German disarmament, and what not have merely camouflaged the supreme question of security. France's nightmare has been the hour when the inevitable withdrawal from the Rhine must once more expose her twice-wounded eastern flank. Europe is at last coming to grips with that problem.

A REAL LEAGUE. Since the hectic days of Versailles, French opinion has moved all the way from Poincare to Cailaux, and Europe's salvation may yet be achieved by a big stroke of statesmanship. Such an Anglo-Franco-Belgian pact as Paris first mooted would simply menace Europe with a new Triple Alliance to which diplomacy would quickly furnish the requisite. But there is just a hope now that a larger pact, including Germany and all other States whose interests are affected by the chances of a European League, may be realized. Mr. Chamberlain's trump card is to emphasize that the French decision rests between a small pact leaving out Britain and a big one including Germany.

A DELPHIC ORACLE. Reginald McKenna's express expedition on the gold standard controversy is a real triumph. His expert auditors are almost precisely fifty-fifty, half of them firmly persuaded that Mr. McKenna made a masterly case for, and half of them just as sure that he utterly demolished the gold standard. London newspapers are as evenly divided. It reminds me of "A. J. B." After side-stepping the burning tariff issue for many moons, he was at last corralled at Sheffield, where he undertook to address the N. U. C. A. delegates on the subject, and did so, without digesting once, for over an hour. I had to finish off a sketch of the proceedings at the post office, but reached my hotel about half an hour later. There I was just in time to assist in keeping the peace between the N. U. C. A. delegates, who were also in a fifty-fifty state, and nearly came to blows on the question which side of the fence "A. J. B." had climbed down on.

POPLAR'S PATRON SAINT. George Lansbury's denunciation of the delo scandal, familiar to everyone who sees what is quietly but ruinously going on, was worthy of Mussolini. Under the post-war Fascist regime in Italy not one solitary lira has gone in dole, but hundreds of millions have been spent on works of national importance and utility. Mr. Lansbury is a queer composite. A devout High Churchman, a sentimental idealist, a practical slum worker, a bitter Communist, and a genial companion, he is really, with his baggy lounge suit and homely mutton-chop whiskers, the patron saint of Poplar. As Mayor of that submerged borough he lived its everyday life, and understands the problems of the poor. He was one of the parliamentary group who inspired Augustine Birrell's most about politicians who allow their bleeding hearts to run away with their sanguinary heads.

PRINCE'S LEVÉE. The Prince of Wales looked brilliantly handsome when he drove in his colonel's uniform of the Welsh Guards and with a royal escort of glittering Life Guards from York House to St. James' Palace for the levée. H. R. H. had a notable greeting from the well-dressed throng assembled en route, mainly composed of women, and the chance of seeing him as Viceroy gave zest to the interest alike of the outside

His Lordship, at present Governor of Bengal, is only 40, but has experience, and unites a handsome presence with a cultured intellect, as the grandson of one great literary figure and the son of another. For Lord Lytton had "Owen Meredith" as his father, as well as Bulwer-Lytton as his grandfater. He inherits the writing genius, and has some perfectly good verses to his credit. Born in Simla, educated at Eton and Cambridge, he married Pamela, the pretty daughter of Sir Trevor Chichele-Powden, and one of his sisters became Mrs. Gerald Balfour. His heir, Viscount Knebworth, was born in 1903.

Motion Pictures of Work of Shriners Hospital For Children Shown.

The annual reunion of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, which opened Wednesday evening, came to an end last night after a successful and well attended session. All the degrees from fourth to the fourteenth were exemplified. Rev. C. Gordon Lawrence, who gave the main address at the banquet last night, was heard with interest by a large number of members. Other speakers at the banquet were J. H. Winsford of Halifax; E. H. Cairns, James MacMurray, George D. Ellis and LeBaron Wilson. An orchestra furnished music during the evening and solos were given by H. Vincent, DeWitt Cairns and R. B. Murray.

The visitors were entertained at a brief showing of pictures at the Unique Theatre yesterday, through the courtesy of F. G. Spencer, proprietor of the theatre. The pictures showed the working of the first hospital established for crippled children by the Mystical Shriners of North America, the hospital being completed in Shreveport, Louisiana, in 1923. Speaking of the Atlantic City conference, held last Thursday and Friday, Mr. Simms said that, though there were more than 75 brush manufacturers there from all parts of the United States, he found that none of them were doing any better business at the present time than the Saint John firm was, conditions being quiet all over the continent.
