*Thursday, April 27th, 1882.*

SERVICE IN THE CATHEDRAL.

The Special Session of the UNITED CHURCH OF ENGLAND AND IRELAND in Canada met, in accordance with the notice given by the METROPOLITAN, on Thursday, 27th April, 1882, in the Synod Hall, Montreal, and proceeded to the Cathedral for Divine Service at 10.30 a.m.

The 189th Hymn (Church Hymnal) was sung as the BISHOPS and CLERICAL and LAY DELEGATES advanced up the Cathedral from the west door.

The Litany was chanted by the Right Rev. the COADJUTOR BISHOP OF FREDERICTON.

The Communion Service was said by the BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA. The Epistle was read by the BISHOP OF TORONTO, and the Gospel by the BISHOP OF HURON. The Sermon was preached by the BISHOP OF TORONTO.

The Holy Communion was administered by the BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, assisted by the METROPOLITAN and the BISHOPS OF HURON and TORONTO.

The offertory was devoted to the needs of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma.

#### RE-ASSEMBLING FOR BUSINESS.

At 2.30 the Synod re-assembled for business in the School House of St. George's Church.

The METROPOLITAN took the chair and, after prayers by the Clerical Secretary, read the following address:—

#### THE METROPOLITAN'S ADDRESS.

RIGHT REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN, REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN, DEAR BRETHREN OF THE LAITY,—Agreeably to the terms of section V. of the Eleventh Canon of our Provincial Synod, it has been my duty to summon you to meet for the purpose of nominating and electing a successor to the late esteemed and beloved Bishop of Algoma. Though I was not present, nor a member of the Synod, when the choice fell on my late brother, I shall, I think, be in entire harmony with the feelings of all here present, when I bear my testimony to the fidelity and self-denying earnestness with which he discharged the arduous duties of his office, and to the simplicity and sincerity of his character. In the government of a new See, various and unexpected difficulties are sure to arise; and in his case, these difficulties were of a peculiarly trying nature. The great distances by which the chief points in his diocese are separated from each other, the want of previous organization, the scanty and irregular supply of funds necessary for the gathering together of the members of the Church in buildings set apart for divine worship, the very limited number of clerical helpers, the want of laity accustomed to church-work

and church discipline, weighed heavily on many an hour of uneasy, anxious thought of weariness, the diocese included helpless souls, precious indeed in Redeemer of us all, but requiring prayer, almost unlimited faith and prayer repeatedly proclaimed the necessity of support from the Canadian Church (I know) complained of the failure of the office of a Bishop in the Church but he could not forget the want of the prosperity of his work.

Whether it be that the important work for a great missionary diocese was undertaken with or without systematic arrangement sufficiently seen and considered, that a limited number of years are not to the weight of so arduous an undertaking, as I was not present at the time and carried into effect.

Added to these sources of weariness, the diocese included a vast number of untutored, helpless souls, precious indeed in the eyes of the merciful Redeemer of us all, but requiring peculiar instruction, and above all, almost unlimited faith and patience. If he publicly and repeatedly proclaimed the necessity of more systematic and liberal support from the Canadian Church at large, he never (as far as I know) complained of the failure of what was manifestly due to the office of a Bishop in the Church of God. He forgot himself, but he could not forget the want of sympathy in the increase and prosperity of his work.

Whether it be that the important duty of making a provision for a great missionary diocese was undertaken somewhat hastily and without systematic arrangement; or whether it was not sufficiently seen and considered, that voluntary subscriptions for a limited number of years are not to be depended on for bearing the weight of so arduous an undertaking, I will not presume to say, as I was not present at the time when the plan was proposed and carried into effect.

It is well for us to call to mind, that when a provision was made for the priesthood of the old Covenant, the building of the Tabernacle and the Temple was left to the enthusiasm of voluntary donors, but the provision by which the system was to be made permanent was, in the wisdom of God, made a charge upon the whole body of Israelites. Acting upon this great principle, the rulers of our ancient English dioceses made permanent provision for the due observance of divine rites and sacraments, both by endowment and by assessment. And it may well be noted by us that in times within our own recollection, when a large body of Christian and earnest men deemed it to be their duty to forsake the communion in which they were born, and to form a religious body entirely separate from it, they at once, without the least delay, with the most intense earnestness, and with the most signal success, set about the formation of a permanent sustentation fund, for the support of their clergy, and the strengthening of their religion.

If we follow neither of such examples, the one dictated by

divine authority, and therefore certain to be wisest and best; the other the result of human foresight and experience, and therefore likely to be part of that wisdom which God imparts to thoughtful, sincere and considerate men, whether the object proposed be in all respects according to the mind of the Spirit or no; how can we hope to succeed in our great enterprise by gathering together the flimsy threads of a temporary enthusiasm?

Shall we, then, be so faint-hearted as to abandon this great work? Can we—dare we give a pledge to God and to the Christian Church by the ordination of a Bishop and the foundation of a See which we are now prepared to abandon? Can we look upon those poor Indians, for whom we have provided a sheltering home in the wild, and having gathered a number of them into the fold of Christ by Christian baptism, having strengthened them by confirmation, having made them partakers of the body and blood of Christ with ourselves, shall we now coldly tell them “Depart in peace,” be ye warmed, but not by our fire, be ye filled, but not by our charity? Shall we do this at the moment when the Canadian Church lifts up her head in primitive independence, convokes her Synods, assembles her Bishops, frames her Canons, and assumes all the attributes of a Church which was a missionary institution from the first, and was taught by her great Master to make disciples of all nations, to lay down no distinction of colour or caste, but to go into the wide world in His strength, proclaiming His message, teaching His truth, and, after His example, willing to spend and to be spent, willing to suffer and to die? Shall we haul down the flag emblazoned with the cross of our Master when every diocese throughout the length and breadth of Canada was assisted by the munificent support of her who has proved herself to be no “injusta noverca,” and who only curtails her beneficence that she may see in us sons worthy of her own prowess, Dioceses which may justify to the world the care and labour she has for so long bestowed upon them.

I will only add one more consideration, that the zeal and earnestness of these few faithful clergy in the Diocese of Algoma deserve a better recompense than to be called upon to surrender their trust, abandon the missions in which they have so patiently

laboured, and find among other branches we have neglected to give them.

You will, I trust, dear brethren, pardon these few earnest words, in consideration of the importance of the subject.

In limiting the summons to the requirements of the Canon, I was actuated by a fear that if a number of subjects for discussion were introduced, the interests of Algoma might be lost sight of, and having consulted a high legal authority, I am led to believe that everything necessary to the interests of that Diocese, and the appointment of a Bishop for the See, can be now legitimately considered. More than this I was unwilling to undertake, lest I should be thought to be going beyond the authority given me by the Canon. Less than this I could not do, being bound by the express order of the Canon to summon the present Synod.

I venture, therefore, earnestly to implore you not to abandon this great missionary outpost, not to leave those scattered settlers and those Christian Indians to be cared for by others, or not cared for at all; nor to throw a damper on the missionary zeal of the clergy ordained by our self-denying and beloved brother. Remember the words: "After my departure shall grievous wolves enter in among you." The gospel for to-day contains a sentence remarkably, I might almost say providentially important, "He leaveth the sheep and fleeth and the wolf cometh and scattereth the sheep."

Whatever difficulties may lie in the way, if an earnest, faithful, diligent Bishop be chosen, such pecuniary difficulties can be met. God hath prospered us so far, and will never desert us if we be faithful to Him. Oh! let not the spirit of our dear brother sigh over our want of faith, and say of us: "Demas hath forsaken me."

At the close of his address the METROPOLITAN announced to the Lower House that by the kindness of the authorities of St. George's Church, their place of meeting would be the School-room in which they were then assembled, and appointed the Rev. Dr. SULLIVAN to act as Chairman until a Prolocutor should be appointed.

The METROPOLITAN, followed by the Bishops, then withdrew to the chamber appointed for the use of the Upper House.

The PROLOCUTOR read the following message from the House of Bishops:—

The Metropolitan begs to send to the Prolocutor the following Resolutions on the subject of the Diocese of Algoma, which have been passed by the House of Bishops, and requests the concurrence of the Lower House.

JOHN FREDERICTON,  
Metropolitan.

*Resolved*, That this House do not think it expedient to proceed to an election of a Missionary Bishop of Algoma at this Session of the Provincial Synod, but that, instead, the election be postponed to the regular meeting next year, for the following reasons:—

First, that this House are not satisfied that the spirit of the requirements of the Canon of Missionary Bishops has been complied with, as they are not satisfied that adequate provision has been made for the support of a Missionary Bishop of Algoma.

Secondly, that when the late Bishop was elected, the several Dioceses had guaranteed his stipend for a term of five years, while on the present occasion no Diocese, so far as is known to this House, is pledged to contribute to the Bishop's stipend.

Thirdly, that it is expedient to await such action of the several Dioceses at the ensuing Session in June or July next as will secure an adequate stipend for the Missionary Bishop.

Fourthly, that an opportunity is now offered of applying to the S. P. C. K. and S. P. G. for grants towards the endowment of the See of Algoma, and that some organization be adopted at this Session to follow up this work of endowment either wholly or in part.

Fifthly, that the Diocese of Algoma need not be left without Episcopal ministrations during the ensuing year, as arrangements can be made by the Bishops of the neighbouring Dioceses, whereby Confirmations and other Episcopal services may be supplied.

Under a deeply humbled sense of the mysterious hand of God in thus suddenly depriving this work of its head, this Synod deplore the loss of so faithful and devoted a Missionary, and so honored and successful a Bishop.
