



a larger quantity, and this will apply to farm horses as well, although when the days are long they may have a small feed. Water should be given before feeding, when the horses can be induced to drink then, but sometimes they cannot after having been used with the contrary.

Much attention should be given to the shaking up of the bedding, that it may be aired. Horses should be groomed carefully; indeed, too much attention cannot be given to this particular. It is not commendable to clip horses on the approach of winter, as it is always attended with a goed deal of risk, without sufficiently corresponding advantages.



She lifts the butter out in the cloth, draining it and repeats the process until all traces of the attermilk disappear. Then the cloth containing the butter is spread out on hutter hoard or table the salt is sprinkled on, and then stirred in with a ladle, assisted by skilfully turning the mass by lifting first one side, and then the other of the cloth. In this way she gets an even distribution of the salt. There are many other ways by which the same end may be reached. They will suggest them-

selves to the thoughtful and ingenious. PILING DIRT AROUND TREES .- A tree naturally makes the best conditions for EXCURSION its own growth by the depth to which its roots enter the soil. If we change this uch, the tree suffers. But the effect is worse if a large amount of dirt is piled around trees, as is often done in making cellars. If the tree is at all valuable draw the dirt somewhere away from it. A depth of a foot subsoil spread over the surface under a tree has entirely killed it. the tree not being able to make new roots above in time, and those below being effectually shut out from light and air. It is not the poverty of the subsoil that does this. An equal thickness of rich soil would produce the same effect, and piles of stable manure around trees are even more fatal, because the leachings from fresh manure are too strong for the tender feeding roots to take up. - Ameri-
