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Death of Lord Herschell.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Baron Farrer Herschell, one of the commissioners of Great Britain on the High Commission, recently in session here, to adjust differences between the United States and Canada, died quite suddenly at 7:05 o'clock this morning at the Shoreham Hotel, where he had been confined to his bed for several weeks with a broken bone, caused by a fall on a slippery sidewalk.

Canadian and other Pulp.

Paper and Pulp, London, Eng., in a review of the British market conditions for 1898, says: 'Although, during the past year, pulp and paper manufacturers may have had some cause for grumbling at the state of trade, yet, on the whole, 1898 has been a fairly prosperous year for both. It is true that the imports of paper have increased and the exports decreased, but on the other hand it is quite evident that the production is increasing considerably, which may compensate to a certain extent for the low prices falling. The high prices obtained in 1897, for wood pulp were not maintained during 1898, and in chemical pulps there has been a fall in the price of from 10 to 15s. per ton. This has been partly caused by large shipments from the United States and Canada, some of which were sold at exceedingly low prices. The fact that a number of new mills were either being built or projected had also something to do with the low prices, but some of these schemes have been abandoned in the meantime, and most of the new Scandinavian mills will not start working till Spring. The development of the pulp trade in Canada has also been a factor to be reckoned with in the pulp market, and the number of pulp schemes financed by British capital is significant. Of these schemes we may mention The St. John Sulphite Pulp Co., The Dominion Pulp Co., The Cushing Sulphite Pulp Co., The Sturgeon Falls Pulp Co., The British Columbia Pulp and Paper Mills Co. In mechanical pulp, the fall in price was not so marked, although lower prices prevailed than in 1897.'

Death of Archdeacon Briggstock. The people of St. John, and indeed of the province, generally, were greatly surprised on Friday last by the announcement that the venerable Archdeacon Briggstock, Rector of Trinity Church, had died suddenly on that day at 11 a.m. Two weeks before on Sunday the venerable Archdeacon was stricken with inflammation of the lungs, but after a few days he was considered out of danger. Dr. Holden visited him Friday morning and found him making satisfactory progress towards recovery. Fifteen minutes after leaving the house he was called hurriedly back and found his patient prostrate. Death came in a few minutes. Dr. Holden resorted to thrombosis, or a heart shot, and his case resembled that of Lord Herschell. Deceased was born at Walsby Castle, Pembroke, Wales, in 1811. He worked in several parishes in the mother country, and in 1875 he came to St. John,

Anderson, of Chatham and Professor J. Frederick McCurdy of Toronto. Another of her sons was Dr. John McCurdy who died in 1888, and was remembered as a skillful practicing physician of the town.

The funeral services were by special request of the members of the congregation held in St. John's Church at three o'clock on Monday afternoon. Many friends visited the house, where there were numerous evidences of the high regard in which the deceased was held. The floral offerings were quite noticeable. A large wreath from Mrs. Snowball and a sheaf of wheat from Miss Shirreff were among the most prominent of these, while there was also a profusion of cut flowers. There was a brief private service at the house, which was conducted by Rev. Messrs. Murray and Hamilton, after which the funeral procession was formed under the direction of Mr. John McDonald. There were eight pall-bearers, viz., elders Alex. Dickson, R. Gordon, Wm. Gray and Alex. McKinnon, and Messrs. Ferguson, Duff, Percy, Jas. Firth and John Lobban. The funeral was very largely attended by all classes in the community, many being present from Newcastle, Douglastown, Nelson, Loggieville and other centers.

The service at the church was under the direction of Rev. Wm. Hamilton, who is at present supplying St. John's congregation; the clergy assisting being Rev. T. G. Johnston, D. Henderson, W. C. Calder, Wm. Atken, Geo. M. Young and J. E. Kirk, and in addition the Rev. Messrs. Murray and D. Macdonald were also present. Rev. Mr. Atken gave the address, in which he eulogized the leading features of Mr. McCurdy's life and character and made an earnest application of the appropriate lessons to those who were present. An excellent choir sang the funeral hymns very feelingly, Mrs. Alex. Brown presiding at the organ. The interment was in St. John's cemetery, where the services were concluded at the grave by Rev. Messrs. Hamilton and Macdonald.

Michigan Lumber Output. There was produced in the State of Michigan in 1898 a total of 2,158,342,122 feet of lumber and 1,683,205,000 shingles. The lumber product was about 200,000,000 feet less than in 1897, while the shingle output was about 400,000,000 more than that of the preceding year. At the close of the manufacturing season for 1898 there was in manufacturers' hands in the State 828,791,000 feet of lumber, about 100,000,000 feet less than the quantity on hand at the same time in 1897, and there was in the hands of shingle manufacturers at the close of last season 206,011,000 shingles, against 46,838,000 at the same date in 1897.
