MISSIONARY MEETING.
An Interesting Session in the Methodist Church.
Last Mnnday evening, March 6th inst, there was a missionary meeting held in the Methodist chureh, and was attended by a large number of people.
The meeting was opened at 7.30 by singing "The Morning Light is Breaking." Prayer was offered by Rev. W H. Spargo, and the Scripture lesson was read by Rev. D. B. Bayley, atter which the choir sang "The Gospel Bells are Ringing.' Rev. D. B. Bayley who occupied the chair, made a few remarks and then introduced Rev. H. D. Marr, who gave a pleasing address. In his opening remarks he said that it was one of the largest missionary meetings he had ever attended, and he was glad to say that the interest in the work was on the increase. He tonk up the subjeet of "The Great Fatherhood of 1 od and Brotherhood of Man. He said that God intended to have a kingdom. That the early day kingdom was a moral and spiritual one; then went on to show that all belonged to the kingdom. He said that the world did not yet fully grasp that it is its duty to spread the gospel. That the missionary work was the great means of opening up commerce with the heathen countries, aud from that point of view alone was a success, but the most impurtant work was to reach the souls of the heathen. He believed that the "Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man" was coming on apace. In closing the speaker said that we all could do something to forward the great cause and build up this kingdom, and that was by giving.
Then followed an appeal for help along Then followed an appeal for help along the financial line.

The choir sang "Speed Away," after which Rev. W. H. Spargo was called upon to address the meeting. He said that one of the great difficulties in the missionary work was selfishness. That missionaries had a great spirit of unselfishness, and that we should have the same spirit and give to their support as we could afford. He then gave a resume of tive addresses he had listened to given by Thomas Crosby, the great Nurth West missionary. Told how Mr. Crosby had formed a council with the worst characters among the Indians as officers; then of some of the evil practices of the "medicine man." How he had carried the work on until they had a church built, and of the readiness of the converted indians to give. He said that Thomas Crosby's work alone repaid us for our efforts. but that the Methodist church was not the only one that was doing such work. nor the North West the only place where such work was being done. He told in bringing his address to a close some incidents connected with Mrs. McFarland's, work, a Presbyterian missionary. His address was listened to with nueh interest.

The choir sang "Jesus Saves" while the collection was being taken up which amounted to $\$ 5.90$. The meeting was closed by singing the Dozology and Mr. Spargo pronouncing the benedition.

## Recent Inventions

For use in discharging puncture closing compounds into bicycle tires a new receptacle is fitted with a sliding bottom, which is pushed in after the nozzle is attached to the valve, thus forcing the heavy liquid into the tire.
A new mouse trap is made from a corucob, having a hole drilled through the centre, into which a bait holder extends to drop a spring bale over the entrance and catch the rodent as soon as he enters and touches the bait.

In a simple nut lock recently patented a spring steel coil is slipped over the end of the bolt after the nut is in place, one end of the coil overlapping the opposite end and causing it to grip the threads of the bolt to hold it in place.

## Moose Hunt in Water.

An Exciting Adventure of the Hon. John Costigan.

Hon. John ostigan, under Si John McDonald's regime was secratary of state and minister of customs. While the Hon. John Costigan occupies a foremost rank among Canadian politicians, he is equally at home trapping a bear or an otter in the depths of the New Brunswick wilderness, or guiding a bark canoe on the fretful surtace of the big forest lakes. When a young man he was noted for his stiength and today although 64 years old thinks nothing of carrying a 60 pound pack, with a birch eanoe on top of that over the carry from Mud to Trouser lake in the Tobique country. In his long experience Mr. Costigan has had several exciting adventures. He was once paddling up the east side of Island Lake accompanied by a friend, when a rifle was accidently discharged, the bulle ${ }_{t}$ narrowly missing Mr. ('ostigan and ploughing a big hole in the canoe. It was only by desperate exertions that they were able to reach the shore before the canoe sank beneath them On another oceasion he had walked on snowshoes many miles from camp when a snowstorm set in followed by a gale of wind and bitter cold. Thinking to shorten his return to camp Mr. Costigan struck out on a beeline across the iidges The travelling was very heavy and the falling snow so obscured the natural landmarks that he lost his way and found himself at nightfall totally exhausted and without food or fire. He was on the point of giving himself up for lost when he happened to find a sable bait in his pocket. This he ate, and it seemed to give him renewed strength and courage. He made another attempt to face the blast and was fortunate enough to strike a lumber road, by which he reached the camp. Mr. Costigan says that it was the sable bait that saved his life.
On another occasion he was paddling up Long Lake with an Indian named Tom Bear, when a large moose charged down on them and made for the canoe. The Indian became confused as the moose approached and jumped over the side of the canoe to swim across. The: moose secing this started after the Indian and was gaining rapid!y on the Redskin when Mr. Costigan fairly lifted the canoe out of the water and hastened to his rescue. When the moose was within a few feet of the Indian Mr. Costigan dealt it a blow over the head with his paddle Just then the animal struck bottom and Mr. Costigan fired. The animal was mortally wounded and fell dead on the shore. Mr. Bear as reason for his flight said: "By thunders, John, I' n not so good Cat'olic as you. Sartin, I t'ought if one got to go you was de bes' man." He had sev. eral other exciting experiences.-Ex
