

CANADA'S FUTURE.

Canada's Challenge to the World is ne title of an article by Mr. J. D. Thelpley in Collier's Weekly. It is instrated by excellent portraits of Sirviitrid Laurier, Cartwright, Mulock, fielding, Fitzpatrick, and the opposition leader, Mr. R. L. Borden. The shallenge of Canada, according to Mr. Whelpley, is for a battle to be fought at the customs houses, and the prize is the readlest access to the Canadian market. Hereafter it must be concession for concession, or tariff for tariff. Mr. Whelpley very cleverly sets forth the wonderful development of Canada and the vigor and independent spirit of her people, but like some other American writers, he cannot get away from the notion that annexation may be one of the possibilities of the future. It may be quite true, as Mr. Whelpley says, that when the Western part of Canada has further developed there will be differences of opinion between east and west on the subject of fiscal policy, but there is no reason whatever for the assumption that "to keep eastern and western Canada together is the great problem of government at Ottawa." There will be quite as much sympathy between east and west in this country as in the United States. The problems, and they will certainly be great, that will arise for solution in the next quarter of a century, may arouse deep feeling and some friction, but Canada is one and indivisible. Annexation would not solve a single problem to the satisfaction of the Canadan people. 





HALIFAX CARPENTERS MAY STRIKE.

says the Halifax Herald, some time ago, notified the employers that on June 1, 1903, they would want their pay increased to 25 cents per hour. At present the men receive 22c, per hour. About two years ago they made a request for 25c, an hour. They were then getting 18c. The matter was at that time submitted to arbitration, and the carpenters were awarded 22c. The men now claim that they are entitled to the full amount of their original request, namely, 25 cents per hour and have decided to put it into effect June 1st. The men also claim that there is no necessity for arbitration in the present case. They say the conditions which prevalled warrant their being paid the 25c.; and they have decided that there will be no compromise.

MACEDONIAN LEADER KILLED.

LONDON, May 26.—The Times correspondent at Sofia has received trustworthy information that Deltchieff, the famous chief of the Macedonian revolutionary movement, was killed in the destruction of the village of Banitzi, near Seres, by the Turks. His death, erroneously reported previously, says the correspondent, may temporarily paralyze the movement.

ANOTHER CLOUDBURST.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., May 26.—Twenty buildings were damaged here last night by a heavy wind storm, accompanied by rain which amounted practically to a cloud burst. The greatest damage was in south St. Joseph, where a dozen frame buildings were blown to pieces. No fatalities have been reported. The loss will probably reach \$150,-500.

SIOUX CITY, Iowa, May 26.—The Chicago and Northwestern passenger train due in this city at eleven p, m., was ditched at Onawa, thirty miler west of Sioux City last night.
