THE INTERCOLONIAL STATEMENT.

# ADVISES FARMERS TO GROW APPLES

Expert Tells Members of The Massachusetts Horticultural Society How Apple Culture is Profitably Conducted---Future of Industry Limitless---Suggestions for the Individual Grower-

Boston, Feb. 1.—"Apple Growing in New England as a Business," was the subject of the regular weekly lecture before the Massachusetts Horticultural Hall this morning. The speaker was E. Cyrus Miller, who conducts the Hillside Orchards of Haydenville, Mass., an extensive commercial establishment. Mr. Miller's address was as follows:

Perhaps no other phase-of agricultural effort has been so prominently before the people of New England for the past year as has the apple industry. Everyone has taken to talking, or writing on this subject, until it must seem that everyone must be at least reasonably well informed on the subject. While I have been talking for years about the great advantages which New England possesses for growing apples, both for home use and for commercial purposes, and while I have continued to plant new orchards and give better care to those already established, and while I am as optimistic as ever regarding the future of apple growing, I do believe the time has come to approach the subject in a most careful, sane and conservative state of mind. Much has been said and written that, while in a measure true, has been somewhat highly colored and sometimes exaggerated, so that many who might be interested in this line of thought might become somewhat deceived as to the true facts in the case.

Montreal, Que., Feb. 1.—There is considerable inquiry from Buropean sources for Manitoba spring wheat flour, but the bids in most cases are below millers views, and business is quiet. A fairly good local trade continues to be done and the undertone is firm. Prevailing prices are:—Manitoba spring wheat patents, seconds \$5.30; winter wheat patents, \$5.50 to \$6.09. Manitoba strong bakers \$5.10; straight rollers, \$5.10 to \$5.20; ordarion of the market for mill feed prices being firm under a good demand and smail supplies. Prevailing prices are: Ontario bran \$22.50 to \$23; pure grain moullile \$31 to \$33; mixed moullile \$27 to \$29.

The condition of the local market for baled hay is unchanged, prices being firm with a steady trade passing. Prevailing prices are: No. 1 hay \$14 to \$14.50; extra No. 2 hay \$13 to \$13.50; No. 2 hay \$12 to \$12.50; clover, mixed \$11 to \$11.50; clover \$10 to \$11.

There is no further change in the condition of the market for eggs, prices being steadier on account of the colder weather and the increased demand for local consumption. Sales of selected new laid are made at 36 cents to 33 cents and No. 1 candled at 25 cents to 27 cents per dozen.




