EARLY CLOSING LAW WILL BE RECOMMENDED TO COUNCIL

The chairman said that in Nova Scotia, and all the Maritime Provinces there was provincial legislation covering the question of early closing.

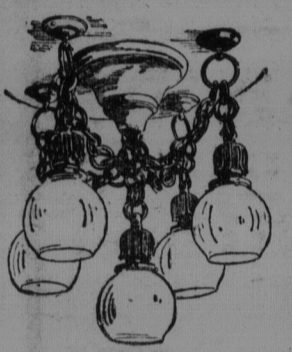

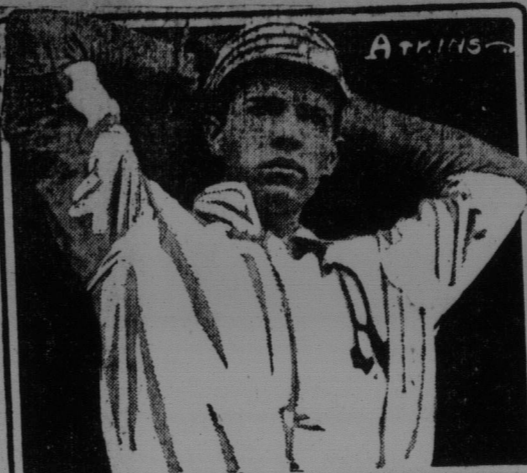
