Although the "beautiful quiet English of Sir Arthur Helps," to which fuskin admitted his obligation in the yorks of the soligation in the process generation, there are still many people who find pleasure and inspiration in the works of the philosophic moralist. A revival of interest in Sir Arthur may be expected as a result of the celebration in England today of the centerary of his birth. Arthur Helps was born in Surrey, Tuly 10, 1813, and was educated at a result of the celebration and Oxford.
