The prime minister received a tre-mendous welcome when he appeared at the Mansion Hall, with John E. Redmond, the Iriah Nationalist leader, and the Earl of Aberdeen, Lord Litu-tenant of Ireland, and his opening words aroused the greatest enthusi-asm. He went on to say that there had been wars with regard to which that was not the case today.
