12 KNOTS AN HOUR.

A First-Class Vessel That Will Carry 150 Passengers.

The steamship which has been built by Messrs. John Russell & Co. during the past few months, was launched at 10.15 Wednesday morning. The launch was a very successful one. The boat slid off the ways without a hitch, and rode upon the water in perfect trim.

There was no formal christening ceremony, but the boat is to be named "Dorothy N." She is named after little Miss Dorothy Nicholson, daughter of Dr. Nicholson, and Mr. Matthew Russell's eldest grand-

daughter.

The Dorothy N. is 72 feet over all 17 feet beam, and 5 feet hold. She s fitted with the most modern type of twin-screw engines, there being two pairs of fore-and-aft compound engines, with cylinders 6 x 12 x 8 inch stroke The engines drive two 3-feet propeller wheels, calculated to turn at the rate one of the Robb Engineering Co's. vertical type, tested to 125 pounds working pressure. The engines are as neat a piece of machinery as can be seen on the Miramichi. They are what one would expect to find on a fast private yacht, and Mr. Robertson, chief engineer of the steamer Bangor, who examined them carefully, said they were as fine a set as he had ever





The woman, who is of the same name and blood as the two criscaers, fell sick in the spring and became delirious. The Indians s med w sail sveited tointelle aids CHOICE LEARS' LINES sick person becomes delirious an evil spirit or wendigo has entered person dies naturally the wendigo escapes to the woods, pursues and frightens away the game and famine follows.

Therefore the band assembled and according to the custom, appointed their chief and med the mgu to the high honor of choking the sick squaw to death so that the spirit might not escape with the passing of breath, but might remain in prisoned in the dead body. in the presence of the whole tribe the all belongings. chief and medicine man carried out the instructions.

A piece of canvas was placed about the squaw's neck and then followed the noose of a rope. Tais being tightened by the two leaders of the band, the ravings of the woman stopped, the evil spirit was i prisoned and the game preserv-

The piece of barbarism was executed within 200 miles of Kenora. Word of it reached the authorities, and the arrests followed. The Fidlers asked the officials not to be too severe with them as they had no idea that they were doing wrong. They were merely doing their duty by the band and following the customs of their fathers. The execution of this duty was a high honor and according to customs the executioners were handsomely feed by the parents of the
