

They have also set up alliances with various small creatures for nuitual benefit. Some, like the green-fly, supply them with sweet food (all ants have a "swe tooth"); others, like certain beetles, become their domestic pets; others are scavengers, encouraged or tolerated in their nests because of their usefulness from a sanitary point of view.

Their findustry in construction shows a considerable amount of varied ingenuity. Some are miners in the earth, and tunnel wonderful galleries of great extent, whilst others tunnel in wood. Some construct papier-mache nests on the boughs of trees and pens for their domestic insects, whilst some, instead of isboring in these ways, frankly avail themselves of the provision made for them by plants.

There are ants that store grain; ants that grow mushrooms, and prepare suitable beds for their growth; ants that there dairies; ants that are mere nomad freebooters, sallying on eating all other insects in their thousands, and killing and eating all other insects in their

mere noman freebooters, sallying orth in their thousands, and killing and eating all other insects in their path, possessing no city of their own, but camping temporarily where their march of plage and conquest has brought them.


