European Intelligence.

We copy the following items of news received by the steamship Niagara, at New-York, from the Boston papers.

Spain.—Messrs. Baring, Brothers & Co. have lent Spain 57,000,000 reals, on the security of the national property.

Spain.—The Emperor's civil contract of matrimony will be signed with grand religious ceremony to-morrow, the 30th, at Notre-Dame.

Spain.—The Sardinian Government has adopted a law to suppress slave trading by the Sardinians.

Spain.—The Montenegrin war was progressing.

Spain.—A consignment of the Prince of Montenegro has arrived at Vienna, and demanded an audience of the Emperor.

Spain.—By the overland mail, anticipated by telegraph, we learn that General Goodwin had suffered a garrison of four hundred men in Pegu to be invested by a strong force of Burmese, and had to undergo some hard fighting to relieve them.

Spain.—The Golden Gate arrived at Panama on the 25th, with \$1,700,000 on freight and 600 passengers.

CALIFORNIA ITEMS.

The steamships Northern Light and Uncle Sam have arrived at New York, the former from San Juan, with 100 passengers...

The steamer Panama arrived at San Francisco on the 11th, and the California on the 16th. The former lost 8 passengers by death, the latter 7.

The steamship Corcoran, which arrived up on the 5th, lost 27 passengers on the trip from Panama.

The S. S. Lewis, from San Juan, arrived up on the 3d, having lost eleven passengers.

It was rumored that a boat containing thirteen passengers by the Golden Gate, was upset in the Chagres River and all but one drowned.

A bill has been brought before the California Legislature having for its object the prevention of monopolies in provisions, and the punishment of all combinations for raising the prices of articles of food...

A proposition is on foot to run a steamer to the head of navigation of the Colorado river, within 400 miles of Salt Lake City, and to which point the Mormons will undertake to build a railroad from their capital.

Eighty men arrived at Shasta, on the 5th of January, from Eureka, 30 of whom were more or less frozen. It is reported that snow is four or five feet deep at Trinity.

Advices from Tibbits are to the 15th Nov. The report of the revolt of the natives against the French is contradicted.

Dates from Oregon are to the 3d of January. The weather was very severe, and large quantities of snow had fallen. Many emigrant caravans were arriving in a very desolate condition.

Snow was reported to be ten feet deep on the Galapagos mountains.

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European Intelligence.

The steamship America arrived at Halifax on Thursday morning last, with 55 passengers, ten of whom landed at Halifax.

Mr. Cobden having in a speech declared that he would bet £10,000 against a shilling a week subscription to the Manchester Infirmary that the French would never attempt to invade Great Britain.

There is some talk of establishing a Naval Militia. Lord Melbourne died on the 29th ult., aged 70 years.

The loan guaranteed by Government for the West Indies, viz., £3000 for St. Lucia, £50,000 for Jamaica, £80,000 for Guiana, and £60,000 for Trinidad, has been taken up by the Atlas Insurance Company of London.

Pries, who committed extensive forgeries in the corn trade, is sentenced to transportation for life.

The sentence on Dr. Newman for his libel on Dr. Achilli, is a fine of £100 to the Queen. The fine has been paid.

The La Plata brings news that Vera Cruz is closed to commerce both foreign and domestic.

FRANCE.—The state ceremony of the marriage of Louis Napoleon and Eugenie de Montijo took place on Saturday evening the 30th ult., at the Tuilleries, about 8 o'clock.

The New York Courier and Enquirer learns by telegraph from Washington, that the democratic majority in Congress have determined to pass a bill granting to the Provincial vessels the privilege of fishing on the grounds of the United States.

A bill is pending in the Indiana Legislature to compel old bachelors of 30 years of age to marry or pay fifty dollars a year into the county treasury.

At New Orleans, February 5th, Lola Montez was arrested on the affidavit of her servant girl, charging her with assault and battery.

FROM BUENOS AYRES.—A letter from Buenos Ayres, of Dec. 4, states that the English war steamer Locust left that place the week previously for Paraguay.

We learn from Nova Scotia that the Railway Bills which were sent to a Committee of the whole House, by a majority of two, have been returned to the House with a recommendation to refer the Bills to a special committee.

The Emperor has bestowed a first class medal on Jess Bourne, of Newfoundland, for saving the lives of several French sailors.

A letter purporting to be from Changarnier, expressing his opinion that a European war is inevitable, has been circulated in legitimist circles.

FRANCE.—The London Morning Advertiser says that a packet of 80 letters has been stolen from the Emperor's private apartments.

AUSTRIA.—At Vienna, Napoleon's marriage announcing his marriage has caused offence, particularly that portion of it which refers to Austria's share in the marriage of Napoleon I.

RUSSIA.—Large bodies of Russian troops are moving towards the Turkish frontiers.

TURKEY.—Although the accounts are contradictory, enough has transpired to show that fighting is going on with the strictest Turkish warfare.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The House went into Committee on the Railway Bill, and the Hon. Provincial Secretary moved the first clause—a long debate ensued, in which the members of government seemed disposed to press their Bills.

Resolved, That it be recommended to the House to refer the bills to a select Committee together with all papers submitted to the House on the subject of Railways.

The House met at 10 o'clock and the following gentlemen were appointed a Railway Committee:—Hon. Provincial Secretary, Chairman—Hon. J. W. Johnston, Hon. James McLeod, Messrs. Chipman, Killam, Thos. Coffin, B. Smith, Holmes, and S. Campbell.

The House then adjourned, and the Committee went to work, and continued at it all day. The business consisted principally of the examination of Mr. Brookfield, of the firm of Sykes & Co., Mr. Sykes, Junr., and another gentleman, with the view of ascertaining, as nearly as possible, the rate per mile at which our Railroads can be constructed.

The House met at 10, and adjourned immediately to allow the Committee to resume its labours. Several more witnesses were examined, C. W. Fairbanks, James Forman, Junr., Esq., and others. The House stands adjourned till Thursday, at 2 o'clock.

UNITED STATES.

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MILDNESS OF THE WINTER IN SCOTLAND.

A late London paper states that in the garden of A. Ferguson, Melbourne place, Edinburgh, on a wall with a south east exposure, there is a plant of the highly perfumed, fan colored, tea scented Rose, Sohrau, which has been in bloom since the month of May last (about nine months).

Although most persons are aware of the great difference in the winter climate of the east side of North America and the west of Europe, in the same latitudes, few probably supposed the difference was as great as the above extract would indicate.

The latitude of Edinburgh is 56 degrees, or 13' north of Boston, and 9' north of Quebec, and it is a parallel in which in Labrador, even a hardy rose was probably never seen in bloom.

ECCLIESIASTICAL REFORM LEAGUE.

English papers contain an important notice of a movement connected with the affairs of the Established Church. A society has been formed consisting of an influential body of clergymen and laymen, for the purpose of effecting a reform in the government of that church.

THE CALORIC ENGINE.—The applications in the United States for rights to manufacture the new Caloric engine, have been so numerous that it is said the inventor has decided to allow any person to build engines on the payment of a mere nominal sum for each engine manufactured.

BOILER IRON.—The Secretary of the Treasury has issued an order, in conformity with a recent act of Congress, that all Boiler Iron shall hereafter be stamped in not less than three places on each sheet or plate as follows, viz:—at two diagonal corners, at a distance of about four inches from the edges, and also about the middle of each plate or sheet, with the name of the manufacturer and the name of the place where manufactured.

Opening of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island.—The Legislature of this island assembled on the 10th inst., when His Excellency Sir Alexander Bannerman opened the Session with a lengthy Speech.

RUSSIANS DEFEATED IN CIRCASSIA.—Our latest accounts from Circassia, state that the Russians have lately met with several severe checks at the hands of the Circassians, having been obliged to abandon many of the strong places in that country which they captured last year.

ANOTHER SUSPENSION BRIDGE.—We are informed that the Government have communicated (or are about to communicate) with Mr. Reynolds relative to building a Suspension Bridge over the Grand Falls. The span, we learn, will be about half that of our own Bridge, so that we suppose the cost would be in the same proportion—or £10,000.

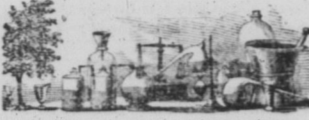

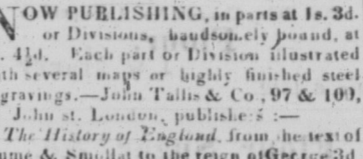
