TRIPOLI, Nov. 20.—The Turkish authorites recently informed the chiefs of the various Arab tribes that the Government proposed to form a corps of irregular troops to co-operate with the regulars, and ordered the chiefs to provide men and horses for that purpose. The chiefs were informed that 100,000 foot soldiers and 10,000 cavalrymen would be required for the new branch of the service. Koch for the cure of tuberculosis is Prof. Koch for the cure of tuberculosis is prepared in an incubating stove within a space that is hermetically sealed and sterilized and thereby rendered free from fungus. The interior of the airtight space is divided by an unglazed procelain diaphragm into an upper and lower section. In the upper section is placed a salted meat broth in a gelatinous state, containing colonies of the tuberous germ. This mass gradually liquifies and the gelatine liquid drops slowly through the porcelain plate into the lower section. The liquid then contains all the secretory products, but is free from all living or dead germs or reproductive spores, and is the lymph as used.

Found Guitty of Conspiracy.

Dublin, Nov. 20.—In the court at Clonmel yesterday a verdict of guitty was rendered against William O'Brien, John Dillon and Patrick O'Brien, members of Parliament; John Cullin, Thomas Walsh, Patrick Mockler and Mr. Bolton, who were indicted on charges of conspiracy to induce tenants on the Smith-Barry estate not to pay rent. William O'Brien and Dillon were each sentenced to two terms of imprisonment of six months each, but the sentences are to run concurrently. Patrick O'Brien and Sullivan were each sentenced to six months' imprisonment, and Walsh, Mockler and Bolton to four months each. All the sentences were without labor. Father Humphreys, Thomas J. Condon, M.P., Daniel Kelly and David Sheehy, M.P., who were indicted on the same charges, were found not guilty and discharged.



Mr. Joseph Kidd, of Goderich, and Mr. Joseph Williams, of Port Frank, two representative Canadian salt producers. Mr. Kidd is a Conservative, as was his father, who at one time contested South Perth in the interest of that party. Mr. Williams was well known as a lumber merchant before he went into the salt business. Both gentlemen acknowledge that at present there is a salt combine in Canada, and that it charges the consumer from 30 to 40 cents more per barrel than has to be paid in the United States. The combine, it is alleged, is the direct outcome of a war of prices arising out of the limited market, and under it the salt producers only work five months a year; a high price is deemed necessary to repay depreciation in the plant of the salt makers, resulting from the property remaining idle for seven months out of every twelve.

Both these makers of salt assert that they would gladly give up the combine and accept unrestricted reciprocity, thereby making a fair living for themselves, and onferring a benefit on many thousands of farmers by reducing the price of their salt to 65 cents a barrel, which is the average price of the United States product. DEBTS OF UNITED STATES CITIES. The latest bulletin of the United States census of 1890 supplies an interesting record of the financial condition of 858 cities and large towns in the republic. Statistics are given covering, for each city or town, the bonded debt, the floating debt and the total debt; the cash in the treasury and other available resources; the amount in sinking funds and the total available resources; the debt in excess of resources, resources in excess of debt and the annual interest charge. The general results for the 858 cities and towns considered are as follows: The bonded debt for 1890 shows an increase of 8 per cent., as compared with 1880; on the other hand, the floating debt has decreased 17 per cent . the total debt in the ten years is 7 per cent. The amount invested in sinking funds has increased 28 per cent., the cash in the treasury has increased 81 per cent., and the total available resources have in-50 per cent. since 1880. In 746 cities and towns, in which the debt is in excess of the resources, there has been a decrease of 6 per cent. in the debt since 1880; in 112 cities and towns, in which the resources are in excess of the debt, there has been an increase in resources of 1,184 per cent. in years. The annual interest charge in 1890 was 8 per cent. less in amount than it was in 1880. The exhibit is regarded as a most satisfactory one. During the last ten years the 858 cities and towns represented in the returns, by reducing their debts or increas-ing their resources, have bettered their condition financially to the amount of \$45,-777,019. The New-England cities and towns have reduced their debts \$2,439,539, and have increased their resources by \$118,-891, making a joint gain of \$2,558,430. The cities and towns in the Middle States, in-cluding Maryland and the District of Columbia, have reduced their debts \$46, 322,711 and have increased their assets by the sum of \$1,224,499, making the joint improvement in their financial condition \$47, 547,210. Brooklyn, with a population of about two-thirds as large, has only \$44, 503,204 debt. But the smaller cities carry even less debt than Canadian nunicipalities of similar size. Buffalo, for example, is a larger city than Toronto, yet its debt is less than \$12,000,000. Syracuse, with a population of about 90,000, has a indebtedness of only \$1,438,500; Yonkers, with between 20,000 and 30,000 inhabitants, has a debt of \$1,390,500; and Kingston, with 25,000, has but \$453,960. to the Brules.

Chamberlain, S. D., Nov. 20.—Deboze, a Yankton Reservation Indian, was in the city yesterday on his way to the Lower Brule agency. A party of fifteen or twenty teams loaded with his people accompanied him. These Indians are well educated and highly advanced, and it has been thought they would not be led away by the "Messiah craze," but a talk with them brought out the fact that they also believe in the coming of the Indians' Messiah, who will wipe the whites from the face of the earth. They are gradually being worked into a state of extreme excitement by the new craze. Emissaries of the "Messiah" are now working among the Sioux and Lower Brules, notwithstanding the vigilance of the cross-centralization.

The town is full of refugees from the Indian country. The entire country is thoroughly aroused and all who can get away are doing so. About 600 soldiers have reached Rushville.
