Mr. Hyman's position on the question of emperance when it was before the House of commons is unassailable, and no honest reader of the evidence will say that he has not kept every pledge he made to the temperance people of London. This was thoroughly proved by Mr. Hyman in his speech on Friday night. It has been proved from the public records in these columns. But it may do no harm, seeing the Free Press persistently attempts to misrepresent the matter, to publish the following letter on the subject from an independent Conservative. To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

In the issue of the Free Press of Feb. 9, under the heading "A Broken Pledge," an extract is given from the "Votes and Proceedings" of the House of Commons for 1891, showing the votes given by Mr. Hyman on the "prohibition" question. The conclusion at which the Free Press arrives, namely, that Mr. Hyman has broken his pledge given to the London Temperance Union, is a most extraordinary and unwarranted one, and can only have been reached by a careful avoidance of the means of knowledge on the subject, the published Hansard debates. Mr. Hyman's pledge, as correctly set out in the Free Press article, was that he would support the petitions which he understood were to be presented to Parliament requesting a reference of the question to a vote of the people by a plebiscite. It does not appear that Mr. Hyman was ever charged by the temperance people with the duty of bringing any such proposition before Farliament. On the contrary, Mr. Jamieson, the member for North Lanark, was, as usual, the regularly constituted Parliamentary mouthpiece of the Dominion Prohibition Alliance, and to him was entrusted the temperance proposals of that body. Nothing was expected or desired of Mr. Hyman, but that he should support a motion for a plebiscite if one should be made. No such motion was made.

My Experience With the Silo.

I know of no method by which the corn

Ik now of no method by which the corn crop can be so economically savey, as by putting it into a silo, and I have never been able to handle any other feed with so little waste as I can ensilage. My corn was the ripest this year that I ever put in the silo, nearly every ear being glazed, and I have the best ensilage that I ever saw. I have fed out about 75 tons, and I have yet to find any in the mangers that the cattle refused to eat, even from the large stalks of B. and W. corn.

I have fed ensilage with the best of results, to all kinds of stock, except hogs. Horses do well upon it in limited quantities, but fed exclusively upon it, it is liable to physic them and produce choic. Colts and calves thrive much better on ensilage and grain, than on hay and grain. For sheep there is nothing better, and for breeding ewes it is nearly equal to pasture grass. If I were going into the sheep business extensively, my silo should grow as fast as my herd. I have never been able to make hogs eat very much of it, beside the grain that is in it.

For milch cows I consider it the best and cheapest forage ration that can be produced on the farm, but I have never been able to get as good a flow of milk from the very best of corn fodder as I can from ensilage. There is considerable waste in feeding dry fodder, no matter how it is doctored up, that is entirely overcome by running it into the silo when green. I intend the coming season to allo my common field corn, after pleking off the ripest ears to the amount of about one-half of the grain. I expect to meet with some loss, but not so much as feeding it in a dry state.

My farm will carry one-third more stock now than it would five years ago, and I believe that it is possible to carry one head of stock for each acre of tillable land, and with soiling instead of pasture for summer, and the silo for storing winter feed, we may do even better than that.—C. R. BRIDGMAN, in Hoard's Dairyman.

True, piles of money are spent on some of them, for fancy and exhibition purposes but we never sat down to figure the cost of what such eat, that we did not find that they were like an unquestioned bond that is drawing a very high rate of interest. It this were not true, phenomenal cows would be financial frauds,—but they are no frauds.—

Is it not time that professing Christian men ceased to give support to the license policy—a policy that so far from suppressing the evils of strong drink has done nothing more than to perpetuate and strengthen these very evils?

The example set the moderate Conservatives of London by the moderate Liberals of Eighn should not be lost sight of. We are as-sured, from the best of authority that Mr. Hyman's pledged supporters already far exceed in number his supporters at the election eleven months ago. "WHAT IS THE DUTY ON MOLDERS?"

There is a strike of molders in Hamilton because the men in the foundries have refused to accept a reduction in their wages bringing their yearly remuneration down to less than it was thirteen years ago. There is a tax of \$13 per ton on stoves entering the country, or not less that 35 per cent. ad valorem. That practically cuts off all competition with the stove-makers in the United States, who are enabled, through possessing the wider market and free iron and coal, to pay their men higher through possessing the wider market and free iron and coal, to pay their men higher wages than are obtainable in Canada. But there is no duty on workmen, and while the ADVERTISER has no desire to side with either party in this dispute as to wages, it is our duty to point out that a tax on manufactures is no protection to the working man. The high duty on stoves has not provided steady work for the molders of Canada, and it has not assured them wages in accordance with the increase in their cost of living. And now in Hamilton, when the men take the stand that they cannot live and support their dependents cannot live and support their dependents at less wages than has been paid them in recent years, does the tariff come to their aid in preventing the influx of the foreigner? By no means. Here is the evidence from our "protectionist" contemporary the Ham-Empire, who is understood to write of that

"Seventeen molders from Salem, O., arrived here this morning to work for the E. & C. Gurney Company. They were met at the Stuart street station by representatives of the company and driven up town to boarding houses, where board and lodging had been procured for them."

As the object is to break down the union the men are promised higher wages than that offered to those on strike. The incident strikingly illustrates our point that while this wealthy firm, which was rolling in wealth making stoves before the "N.P." was thought of, is protected by law from all outside competition, their molders and fitters are exposed to the competition of the world. As a seller of stoves, Mr. Gurney is a "protectionist;" as a buyer of labor, Mr. Gurney is, like every "pro-tectionist" and monopolist that we know, a free trader.

The trouble with the stove manufacturers in Hamilton, as well as in other cities of the Dominion, is that their market is too limited. The duty on iron and coal and

the taxes on iron and coal. Then the duty peculation on stoves could be reduced, the finished on stove would be cheapened, and the demand largely increased. This reform would supply steadier work to the molders, at fair pay, than has been vouch safed in the majority of Canadian cities in recent years.

Trade freedom in any legitimate industry is bound to help the workingman as well as the progressive capitalist in the long run.

It is a fallacy to assert, it is a false thing te assert, that Unrestricted Reciprocity will have any injurious effect upon British connection. When Mr. Hyman stated at the Grand Opera House meeting on Friday night that an officer serving in the department controlled by Mr. Carling had been found guilty of torgery and theft, and that, contrary to the methods pursued in business life, Mr. Carling had taken no steps to secure his legal punishment, he stated what is borne out by the official report on the Tetu case, which lies before us.

Mr. Carling's newspaper advocate tells us that it is "a mean attack" to mention the facts of the case, and it essays a justification of the scandalous failure to see justice done.

The facts briefly are these: D. C. Woodman, an official subordinate to Mr. Tetu, made charges of embezzlement of public moneys against Tetu in February, 1890, and again formally on 8th May, 1890. When he did so the Deputy Minister when he did so the Deputy Minister warned him that it was dangerous to say anything against Tetu, because the accused man was connected with some of the best families in Quebec! Tetu is a nephew of Sir Adolphe Caron, and there was the trouble. Eight days afterwards, Tetu was informed by letter that he was charged with embezzlement. He asked for time to reply. But he neither replied nor was any further But he neither replied nor was any further inquiry made regarding the robberies till August, when the D puty Minister, hap-pening to be in Manitoba, visited the ac-cused, and found him sick. The superior official made no attempt to investigate the grave charges, but returned to Ottawa, and told Mr. Carling that Tetu was ill. Months were allowed to elapse, and still Tetu made no report regarding his embezzlements. On Nov. 27, 1890, however, he asked leave to come to Ottawa and explain. He was told, by order of Mr. Carling, not to come, but to write as soon as possible. The letter never came, and three weeks later he was asked again to say why he embezzled public money. A live business man would have put up with dalliance of this kind no longer. He would have suspected, in view

of the grave charges made, that something was wrong, and that the public interests demanded immediate protection. Not so, Mr. Carling. No further steps were taken by the department till the latter part of February, 1891, when the Deputy Minister, on visiting Manitoba, interviewed the defaulting official. Tetu, in conversation which was taken down and submitted to the Committee at Ottawa, confessed to Mr. Lowe that he had forged certain documents and had been guilty of several other grave irregu-larities in the conduct of the business of his office. This statement was sub-mitted to Mr. Carling, but, extraordin-ary to relate, though Mr. Tetu's con-fessions were made and reported in Febru ary, no further action was taken by M Carling and his associates till the scandal reached the ears of members of Parliament

and a parliamentary inquiry was talked of. Then on May 15—nearly three months after Mr. Tetu had confessed to forgery — Mr. Carling caused to be sent to the accused a memo containing the charges made by Woodman against him. Then and not till then was an accountant sent to examine Tetu's accounts. In August, eighteen months after the charges were first mooted, the account-ant reported that embezzlements and forgeries had taken place, and Tetu was punished by losing his job !




