

Neither Extreme in Wealth Or Poverty Begets Content

The philosophic Orillia Packet examines at some length a statement in these columns regarding the inadequate monetary returns to some professions. It says:

"The old fallacy that poverty is misery and disgrace, and that happiness dwells with wealth. The poverty of the classes mentioned is only relative, after all, and, at the worst, far from pitiful. Riches oring more discomfort than poverty, and the happiness to be extracted from worldly possessions is much more apparent than real. The lives of the multi-millionaires of this continent are one constant apology for their riches. Carnegie has spent years in an unsuccessful attempt to disencumber himself of his wealth. Rockefeller, in his nervous dread and manifest unhappiness, presents a picture truly "pitiful," since The Advertiser is looking for comething of that kind. Even Henry Ford, with all altruistic projects, is one of an unsympathetic world's jokes. To be "pitiful," poverty must be abject, and there is little abject poverty in Canada. Even in this favored land there is unhappiness. More or less, it is the common heritage. But there is unhappiness among the rich, as well as among the po with the balance fargely in favor of the poor. Paul knew the true philosophy of life. 'I have learned,' he said, 'in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be ontent.' last summer the announcement was made that he had earned his degree. His own description of life in a German prison camp gives some idea of the difficult conditions under which he undertook this gigantic task.

"When war broke out I had just arrived in Berlin from Paris for a week's visit," said the speaker. "And it seems I chose a most unfortunate week, for I remained there until a few months ago. Life in the civilian camp was most monotonous. It consisted of an incessant lining up for something or other. For breakfast we had soup—a queer sort of soup. For dinner we had soup and for supper we had soup. We also had some bread and water. For a time we were required to make night lights, which operation consisted of putting bits of taper into little pieces of wood. But, for the most part, we were left to occupy our time as we pleased.

"I spent most of my time in the great concentration camp near Berlin, which was established in a moderate sized race course, six men being housed in each horse box and others given lying room in the lofts.

"At first conditions were very difficult, but eventually we were able to make ourselves fairly comfortable. We were free from compulsory work and the military seemed to think that it was to their advantage to let us run things to sulf ourselves. After a time British money bought an open portion of the race course and we had excellent sports, largely contributing to our excellent state of health throughout our internment, the "flu' was practically the only serious epidemic which we had. However, when it was time for a sick convoy to go to Holland congratulations were bestowed upon any who were eligible."




