

RECIPROCITY TALK GOES ON SLOWLY

First Steps Toward an Amicable Arrangement Taken at Yesterday's Meeting.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 7.-The reciprocity commissioners representing the United States and Canada, in a two-hour session today, took the first steps towards formulating a scheme of tariff concessions, which, it is believed, will stimulate international commerce. While no announcement was made as to the course taken by the negotiations, there was an apparent feeling of satisfaction among the commissioners, and a belief that the work on reaching an amicable agree

ment will not prove difficult. It is understood that Canada made tentative suggestion of tariff reduction by the United States on the Dominion's natural products, at the same time offering concessions on some lines of manufactures, such as steel shapes and agricultural machinery.

of probation officers to make prelimnary examination in each case, and to watch over those put on probation.

3. There should be made in connection with the cases of young delin-quents; such examinations as will contribute to the fund of information on juvenile delinquency, and the results should be used whenever practicable to help in the disposition of the case. These examinations should be made only by physicians who have some special knowledge of the social and psychological sciences. The personal information obtained in these examin-

ations shall not be made public. 4. Whenever possible in the case of young delinquents, arrest should be avoided in bringing them before the authorities, and orders for arrest should be issued only in exceptional When necessary to detain young

delinquents, the detention should not be in quarters used for adults. 6. In those countries where a court is intrusted with the cognizance of the cases of young delinquents.

(a) Those cases should be heard at the same session with cases of adults,
