St. Thomas, Ont., Jan. 28.—The trial of Capt. John C. Tabb for illegally fishing in Canadian waters on Oct. 13 last, and whose fishing tug Star was seized by Capt. Dunn, of the revenue cutter Petrel, was concluded before His Honor Judge Ermatinger. The defense was that, while admitting being found several miles north of the international boundary line with wet nets and freshly taken fish on board, the American boat had lifted the nets in American waters, and then proceeded across the boundary line in search of some missing nets which Capt. Tabb claimed had been drifted by undercurrents across the boundary. 



BUILT MILLION DOLLAR PALACE

Story of the London and Globe Disaster - Leaves His Family Penniless.

London, Jan. 28.-Whitaker Wright's life reads like a romance with the beginning of it torn entirely away and intermediate chapters omitted. Where he was born, or just who he was, may always be a mystery. He is quoted as saying he was born in England and educated there. So far as can be asertained no one knows anything of his history beyond what he told of his own accord. In the world of money makers he had been known for good many years, appearing at different times in Australia, Canada, the United States, and in London,

The promoter spent his money freely and the millions he acquired did not always stick to his fingers. He hoardnothing and had no investments of a substantial nature.

During the high tide of his prosperity he built a palace in Surrey that cost more than a million dollars. It had huge artificial lakes and in one more than a million dollars. It of them was a conservatory under the surface of the water. He put in marble fountains, parts of which were so arge the railroads could not carry them, and special traction engines had to be secured to move them. The place at Lea Park was a grand
