MUCH DAMAGE DONE TO KRUPP WORKS WHEN RECENTLY BOMBED DIS

By Courier Leased Wire.

Amsterdam, July 10.—Les Nouvelles of Maestricht, Holland, reports that Dutch workmen laid off at the Krupp Works on account of the destruction of buildings in the recent French air raid, assert that a quarter of the Essen plant was destroyed. The material damage is placed at millions of francs, and it is said that 100 employees were killed and hundreds of others, including 45 French prisoners, wounded.

One, and possibly two, French airplanes dropped bombs on Essen last Friday. The official German report of the raid said only two bomb holes were found.
