A very handsome triumphal arch and some great columns in the precincts of the great mosque, and a portal, and part of its wall. are probably of Roman date, not older. The most splendid edifice, by far, that the city can now boast, is this great mosque of the Ommiades. It occupies the site of the Cathedral of St. John, which again was preceded by a magnificent temple on the same ground : so that it is most likely that in earliest ages the chief shrine of the inhabitants stood on this spot, and that Jupiter ejected Rimmon, and was himself dis-Possessed by St. John the Baptist. Then, when the Arabs were victorious, half the cathedral was given up to them, and half still guaranteed by treaty to the Christians, but ere many years elapsed the whole building was taken from them by the Caliph Walid, who lavished immense sums on its adornment. The arches were wreathed with gold vines, the niches inlaid with jewels, and from the roof hundreds of golden lamps were suspended by golden chains. The gold

and gems departed long ago, but the marble tesselated pavements, and the marble colonnades surrounding its vast courts, still remain. One of its three minarets was accidentally burnt Painful Missionary Intelligence during the Tartar conflagration, and afterwards rebuilt. Another, the "Minaret of Jesus," is 250 feet high. Close to this mosque is the tomb of the renowned Saladin. No Christian foot dares to enter the mausoleum of their deadliest but most chivalrous foe.

How to Destroy the Army Worm.—A correspondent of the St. John Morning News, who says he is acquainted with the habits of the army worm, thus speaks of the manner in which its desolating career may be arrested:—

Different expedients were adopted by the planters and farmers who suffered most from the evil; but the most valuable and simple remedy was at last found to be one that the habits of the worm suggested. It derives its name from the fact, that like soldiers drawn up in the order of battle, the forces march forward in a line against the opposing enemy. Thus the hosts of the army worm in an extended orderly line advance over a grass field or any crop of grain, as it were, shoulder to shoulder, and they cut down every object that lies in the course before them. This habit suggested the mode of their destruction.—
