The Naval Velocipede.

Every time the imperial yacht, Jerome Nacolson, arrives at Toulon, one may be sure that : will bring an innovation, always having for its object, however, the perfection or progress of all that pertains to the nautical art.

This is the yacht of the Prince Napoleon which, since then, has become the rule abroad to all vessels of war; and all the world knows what an invaluable service they have rendered in the embarkations of the last maritime ser-

Furthermore, this is the yacht which has inaugurated the employment of the electric light and dangerous quarters, which is to be an incontestible success.

To-day the yacht arrives with a novelty much ess important, but which has no less the eignet of utility, and especially of originalry, which inanrea it a brilliant future , it is the monal melaci-

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
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
