CAPE TOWN, UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA, JULY 22.—PREMIER BOTHA ARRIVED HERE TO-DAY FROM THE CAMPAIGN, WHICH ENDED ON JULY 9 WITH THE SURRENDER OF GERMAN SOUTHWEST AFRICA.

Ministers Will Enter Into Conferences With the Imperial Cabinet --- Borden's Presence in the Cabinet Was Not an Incident, but Part of Great New Scheme

LONDON, JULY 21.—REPLYING TO A DEBATE IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS TO-DAY ON THE SITUATION IN THE DOMINIONS AND COLONIES, ARTHUR H. STEEL MAITLAND, UNDER-SECRETARY FOR THE COLONIES, SAID IT WAS THE INTENTION TO TAKE THE RESPONSIBLE MINISTERS OF THE OVER-SEAS STATES INTO THE CONFIDENCE OF THE GOVERNMENT IN EVERY MATTER THAT MIGHT ARISE, NOT ONLY DURING THE WAR, BUT ALSO IN THE QUESTION OF THE SETTLEMENT OF PEACE.

NEW YORK, July 22.—Speaking of the American note to Berlin, the Tribune says editorially of settlement for the Lusitania outrage: "But there is no such prospect. The note that now goes forth is the last sacrifice of a great nation to the cause of international amity and pacific relations."

GRAND DUKE IS USING ONE OF THE OLDEST DEVICES OF STRATEGY

Seldom Has Any General Had a More Favorable Opportunity for Such Tactics and He Will Soon Be in a Position to Overwhelm Either of the German Armies.

LONDON, July 22.—A Petrograd despatch to the Morning Post says: "Grand Duke Nicholas has manoeuvred his armies so as to bring the enemy into positions which will enable him to throw superior forces upon either side. This is one of the oldest devices of strategy, known as the principle of partial defeat, and was first used by Epaminondas at the Battle of Leuctra, in which he defeated the Spartans."

London Times, in Remarkable Article, Says It Only Touches the Fringe of Matters in Dardanelles—Turks Had Time to Strengthen Defences—Public Kept in Dark.

London, July 22.—Dealing editorially with Sir Ian Hamilton's report on the fighting at the Dardanelles, the London Times says: "The long and vivid despatch which we publish to-day from Sir Ian Hamilton is the first really important official statement vouchsafed to the nation about the Dardanelles operations since that stupendous enterprise was begun last February."

STANDS SENTINEL. London, July 22.—Telegraphing from Petrograd the correspondent of The Times says: "The Novo Georgievsk, one of the greatest of the Russian fortresses is effectually standing sentinel for Warsaw from the northwest. The range of its guns attains the Bzura line and the German advanced columns on the Naraw. The fight for possession of the right bank of this river, is expected to occupy some time."

POSTAL STAFF WILL MAN GIFT GUN. Hon. Adam Brown, Postmaster of Hamilton who is young and active at 90 years of age recently successfully started the idea in the Ambitious City of a machine gun to be contributed by the Post Office staff and to be manned with a squad of nine men from among their number.

COMPLAINTS HEARD. London, July 22.—A despatch to The Daily Telegraph from Petrograd says: "Complaints are beginning to be heard that Russia is bearing practically the entire brunt of the war. These complaints are not confined to the mass of people, who are not in a position to judge what is really happening on any front."

Two new guns have arrived for the Thirty-second Battery here, also equipment for limbers and saddlery and accoutrements for upwards of sixty five men. The weapons are of the 1900 pattern, 12 pounder gun and limber and are fitted with the new 18 pounder sights and the providing of the latest directions for range-judging gives the men the opportunity of being up-to-date in all things that the increase of shell power and metal weight the eighteen pounders supplied the Expeditionary forces have.

SOME GLORIOUS FEATS. It may be thought that Sir Ian Hamilton's despatch is written almost too brilliantly for a military document, but he had a moving theme. No conflict in this or any other war has furnished more inspiring incidents than those of the Kings Own Scottish Borderers holding their own opposite Krithia against masses of Turks until they were almost overwhelmed; of the beaching of the transport River Clyde, and the advance of one company after another of the Munster Fusiliers to instant and wholesale death; of the brave Doughty-Wylie and Walford leading the shattered remnants of a landing force to the storming of Sedd-el-Bahr; of the wondrous daring of the Lancashire Fusiliers, whose assault of the Turkish trenches near Teke Burnt from open boats under a terrific fire is rightly described as the finest feat of arms ever achieved by British or any other soldiers; and perhaps most impressive of all the impetuous rush of the Australian infantry as they leaped ashore near Kaba Tepe and drove the Turks before them with cold steel.

Him was forfeited when disobedience came in. Since man's mind were torn in that condition which would not be pleasing to God, and since the Church are still in very much the same condition, why does the Father love those who have given themselves to Him in consecration? It is because from the Bible view point a very great change took place when they came into the family of God. There is only one way back into harmony and fellowship with the Father. Jesus is the way; for as the Bible points out, in harmony with the Father's Plan our Lord gave Himself sacrificially, with all the rights which He had as a man, and in due time the merit of His sacrifice is to be applicable to Adam and all his race.

Those disciples whom Jesus was addressing had come out of the world. They had left everything that they might be His pupils and do just the right thing, the right way. Thus to be children of God was their chief aim and ambition. The first step in this direction is justification—being made right. Justification is not a gift, it is a process; it means the change that is made in the heart of the sinner. It is the process of being made right with God before He will deal with us at all.

During man's Work Week the race has had a severe lesson in what sin is and what it will do. As we look over into Europe, we see what evil passions can accomplish. Yet the savagery there is only beginning. It is only the beginning of our preaching and teaching, with all our surgery and medicine, we have not bettered our race very much. When we perceive that sin has accomplished this evil work, we realize that it is the most terrible thing that can happen to any one. When the whole world comes to realize the true situation, men will know that the entrance of sin is the worst thing that can happen.

According to the Divine Program for human salvation, the Lord Jesus Christ was to do a sacrificial work for the race; next the Church was to be established out from amongst mankind, and then the Millennial Age was to begin. When our Lord Jesus gave His life freely and unreservedly to the Father in consecration at Jordan, God started a New Creation by baptizing the Son with the Holy Spirit to the Divine nature. As He was coming up out of the water, the Holy Spirit came upon Him, anointing Him to all the purposes of His life.

When the Father planned this New Creation in connection with human salvation, He gave to the New Creatures should be those who would give up all their own rights as men, laying everything at His feet, and desiring to know and do the Divine will. This was the beginning of the creation of God's Body (1 Peter 2:1). The Father wished Him to have the highest place in this New Creation. THE SITUATION

The Russians made a stand and the official German report tells of "stubborn resistance." The troops of the Czar at last reports were making fierce counter-attacks, and they are utilizing in that section the forts on the Narw River.

On the Western front there has been very little change, although the official French report states that on the Eastern border of the Argonne, the enemy has succeeded in gaining trench foothold in "a salient in front of our lines."

The report of Sir Ian Hamilton regarding the Dardanelles, affirms what has long since been generally recognized, that the opening operations in the Dardanelles were not efficiently conceived.

THE FEELING IN GERMANY. Reference has more than once been made in these columns to the fact that the German people firmly believe that they have a righteous cause in this war, and that they are confident of victory.

The New York Times not long ago sent a staff correspondent to Germany, and in writing from the German capital he says that the end of the war and the conditions of peace are frequent subjects for discussion among the people in Berlin; but there is no sign of quitting.

Watching Grand Duke Nicholas and His Brave Armies Stop the Huns.

London, July 22.—While prayers for victory were being said to-day throughout Russia, the Austrians and Germans continued their drive at Warsaw from the north, the west and the south.

WILL AMERICAN SHIPS DISAPPEAR FROM PACIFIC. In the five years that the Canadian League has held sway, there has never been such an uncertainty existing with reference to the pennant race as at present. Just now it is impossible to pick a winner, and sport writers are not saying much these days about it.

On account of the heavy condition of the ground yesterday, the game was not snappy like its predecessor of the day before. Both clubs had three errors chalked up. The Hams secured their three boos in the fourth frame, in the space of five minutes. If the Brants had not made one in the fifth, when the score was 2-1, the game would most probably have been Brantford's, and in place of being one point behind St. Thomas, the home team would have been in fourth position now.

The game was very uneventful on both sides up to the fourth and the batters were retired in order every frame. But in the fourth, with not even a single to aid them, the Warnerites scored two runs. This was done on the errors which the visitors made. With two out, Buster Burrill selected his wicked willow. He smashed the pill out to Linneborn who booted it and allowed Buster to make second. Then Matty made a wild peg to second and Burrill ambled around to third. Then Ivers walked and stole second, a very difficult thing to do when Bill Cristall is in the box. The portside starts his delivery facing first, and the baserunner cannot distinguish whether he intends to play to the plate or try to throw him out. "Billy" had to be careful with it too, for it was only two days ago that Arundel gave Pat Doherty a balk when he endeavored to throw out Gabby on first. Then Mullin went up and singled out a hot one to third which went right through McGroarty and allowed both Burrill and Ivers to score. Mullin did on second when Comstock was put out.

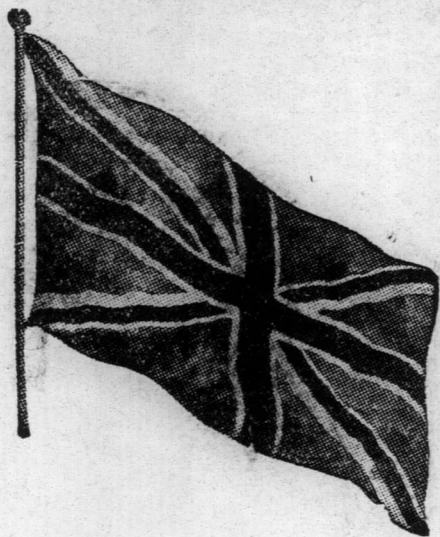

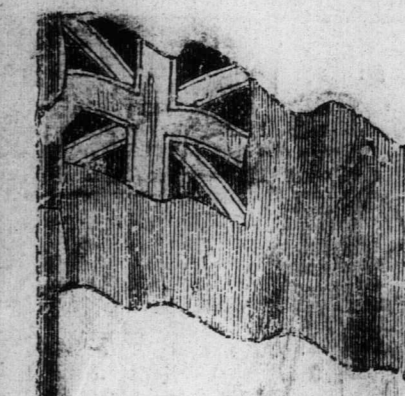

ENLIST NOW!

Here are the questions you would ask and their answers

- Q. I am a married man. Must I have the consent of my wife to enlist?
- A. Yes, the following must get proper consent in order to be able to enlist for active service: (a) Husbands, (b) men over 18 and under 21 years of age must get the consent of both parents, (c) sons who are the only support of a widowed mother or whose parents are dependent upon them for their support.
- Q. What are the rates of pay?
- A. The rate of pay is One Dollar per day before moving to camp. A further allowance of 75c a day is made to cover meals and lodging, making \$1.75 per day while in Brantford. When in camp and on active service a field allowance of 10c is made, making the total pay \$1.10 per day.
- Q. What examinations must a man pass in order to be accepted?
- A. The recruit must be over 18 and under 45 years of age. The minimum height is 5 ft. 3 in. and the minimum chest measurement 33 1/2 inches, with the chest normally expanded. The eyesight must be good, teeth in good condition. He must have free use of his limbs and not be flat footed. It is also necessary for the heart to be strong.
- Q. What is the reason in making a man assign at least one-half his pay?
- A. The Government believes that if they are willing to allow a separation the soldier should be equally willing to assign at least one-half the pay received. It is hoped the families of soldiers will have the foresight and common-sense to put in the bank all the assigned pay received, so that when the soldier returns there may be a nest egg to help the family along until he receives employment.
- Q. I am a married man. What provision will be made for my wife and family?
- A. It has been found that a woman requires an income of \$30.00 per month on her own account, \$7.50 for a child between the ages of 10 and 15, \$4.50 for a child between the ages of 5 and 10, and \$3.00 for a child under 5 years.
- Q. When does the separation allowance start?
- A. Immediately upon being sworn in and enlisted in Brantford, but the first installment will not be paid until after the final acceptance for overseas service.
- Q. To whom are Government Separation Allowances granted?
- A. Separation allowances are granted (a) wives, (b) children of a widower if they are in the care of a guardian. Girls over 15 and boys over 14 years of age are not eligible. (c) Widowed mothers, if the son is unmarried and her sole support.
- Q. What pensions are paid in case of the death of a soldier?
- A. The widow receives \$22.00 a month and \$5.00 a month for each child. In the case of a soldier leaving a wife and three children the pension would be \$37.00 a month or \$884 a year. It would require \$10,800 worth of Government Bonds, paying 4 1/2 per cent. interest, to give a pension of \$484 a year.



ENLIST NOW!

Here are the questions you would ask and their answers

- Q. How much pay must a soldier assign to his wife?
- A. Every man who receives a separation allowance for his wife must assign one-half his pay (\$16.50 per month) and may assign as much as \$25.00 per month, but not more.
- Q. Is the assigned pay figured as part of the income necessary to support a family?
- A. No. The assigned pay of the soldier is not taken into account by the Patriotic Fund in determining the amount to be paid to a depending family for support. In the case of the family described above, if the soldier assigned \$20.00 per month, the total income of the family would be \$69.50 per month.
- Q. Are the requirements with regard to teeth as strict as before?
- A. No. Arrangements have now been made at Niagara Camp to do the necessary work on teeth that are not in quite good enough state of preservation. Men are now being accepted with partial sets of false teeth, this being left to the discretion of the examining doctor. A great many men who were turned down for the first and second contingents may now join under the present regulations.
- Q. How is Government allowance paid?
- A. It is paid by check on the Bank of Montreal forwarded from Ottawa.
- Q. How is the assigned pay of a soldier forwarded?
- A. It is also paid by check from Ottawa.
- Q. How is the Patriotic Fund allowance paid?
- A. It is paid by the local branch of the Patriotic Fund.
- Q. My wife is in England. Will she receive a Government separation allowance?
- A. Yes, this will be forwarded from Ottawa regularly just as if the wife were living in Canada.

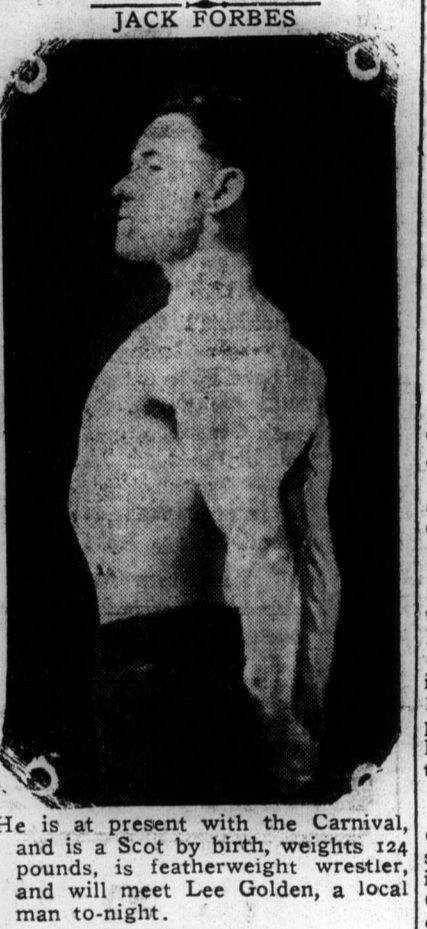
