

## Dr. Henry Chipman

An Address Delivered at the Unveiling of a Memorial Tablet in honor of the late Dr. Henry Chipman, in the Lower Horton Methodist Church on Sunday Morning, June 22nd, by Rev. William Brown.

To me it is a rare privilege and great honor to bring my little tribute of appreciation of the life and work of my countryman, Dr. Henry Chipman. A man of whose memory this tablet is unveiled today. My embarrassment is not from lack of outstanding features in the unique character and splendid life of a noble man, but rather, and chiefly, from the fact that I have to speak of a man whose life and work were so intimately connected with our own community, that it is difficult to separate the personal from the professional. I have, therefore, to speak of a man whose life was a life of service to his fellow-men, and whose death was a death of sacrifice for the good of his race.

Dr. Chipman was born in the quiet town of Horton, N. S., on the 15th of October, 1842. He was the second of four children of his parents. His father, Mr. James Chipman, was a farmer and a Methodist. His mother, Mrs. Mary Chipman, was a Quaker. Dr. Chipman was educated in the Horton Academy and at the Horton Normal School. He received his medical education at the University of Toronto, where he graduated with honors in 1868. He then returned to his native town and began the practice of medicine in 1870.



**News Notes**  
CLEANED FROM VARIOUS SOURCES.  
The five-day week in the Gloucester mines will begin August 2.  
The town of Windsor has purchased a White Triple Combination Fire Engine, costing \$13,000.  
The French had killed or missing in the war 1,166,906; and their mobilized army was 3,490,000.  
Within a year the British will have mobilized 1,200,000 men.  
The R-34 Dirigible cost \$1,250,000; so it will be some time yet before airships of this character become as common as automobiles.  
The new German colors are black, red and gold. Their walls will be judged by the conduct of the citizens over which they fly.  
Nineteen persons were sentenced to death for treason to Great Britain during the war. Of this number eight were found to have been of enemy origin.  
Oil will be the fuel used by the new Cunard liners now being constructed. The new liners will displace 30,000 tons and will carry passengers and freight.  
The body of Capt. Chas. Wyatt, who was virtually murdered by the Germans in 1916, has arrived in England and a memorial service was held in St. Paul's on the 8th.

**Watering Farm Horses.**  
Walter Moore, a well known writer says: "It is a common thing for farmers to work their horses in the hay-field from morning to night, watering them only at noon. This is done even on days of excessive heat. The driver usually has two or more refreshing drinks in the middle of the morning and again in the afternoon, but the horses do not equally so.
