



Lime As A Soil Builder

Fertlie soils contain sufficiency of he three most essential elements for growing plants, nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. Should any of these be lacking, plants cannot grow satisfactorily. The two latter elements are found in the mineral soil particles and also in the vegetable matter that is the soil. The former-nitrogen is found in the vegetable matter only. Thus it will be seen that a soil deficient in vegetable matter is lacking

in nitrogen. Nitrogen we find when buying commercial fertilizers is that most expensive plant food element costing at least 25 cents per pound. If the fertilizer contains 4 per cent of nitrogen the cost for this element in

one ton would be \$20.00 The legumes when fully established have the power to obtain nitrogen from the air through a soil organism which forms nodules on the roots of plants belonging to this order. The principal leguminous plants are the ommon red clover, alsike clover, alfalfa sweet clover, vetch and peas and of these the common red clover s probably of greatest importance. There are approvimately 70 pounds of nitrogen in 1% tons of clover hay and the production of this amount of top growth leaves a root system conaining at least 1200 pounds of vegetable matter, furnishing say, 30 pounds of nitrogen, in the soil. Of his 105 pounds of nitrogen in the entire plant it has been estimated that about 70 pounds comes from the air and 36 pounds from the soil provided that conditions favourable to the activites of the bacteria exist. It will be seen therefore that the 70 pounds of nitrogen at the lowest market value is worth \$17.50 or nearly as much as that 1% tons of clover extracts from the air nitrogen equal to that contained in one ton of our best fertilizers. True, some of this may be lost by careless handling of the manure from stock, but for the most part it should ultimately go

It has been found that the soil or ganism which furnishes the clover with nitrogen from the air does not thrive in an acid soil or on one lacking in lime, consequently if we wish to build up a soil through the clover plant it is necessary, where soil acidity is found, to correct this conditio by an application of lime in som form



Ground limestone is the most pop ular and effective form of lime. If applied at the rate of 2 tons per acre when seeding to grain, at which time the clover is usually sown, best results will be obtained. Subsequent applications of one ton every three years usually suffices to maintain freedom from acidity.

Among the many tests conducted at the Experimental Station, Kentville, N. S., the one carried on in half acre plots is of particular interest. There was little apparent difference in the crop of grain on the plots and the average of four half acre plots which were limed when seeding down at the rate of 2 tons per acre was 42 bushels and 15 pounds of oats, and on the two, half acre plots not limed, 39 bushels and 31 ounds per acre. After the oats were ut there was a noticeable difference in the clover growth in favour of the limed areas and the yield of hay the following year averaged 4560 pounds per acre from the four limed plots, and 2480 pounds per acre from the two plots not limed, a difference in favour of liming amounting to 2080 pounds of clover hay per acre. When this land was plowed there was a de cidedly marked difference in the amount of root development in favour of the limed areas thus greatly inreased store of vegetable matter nd nitrogen carrying materials. Lime, therefore, is most valuabl as a boil builder because it produces a suitable environment for the clow or plant through which farm soils can be built up most sconomically.

Life Imprisonment For George Drew

In the St. John Circuit Court, Wed nesday morning, with Mr. Justice Crocket presiding, sentences were pronounced upon George Drew and William Nairn.

Drew, who was found guilty by a jury, of criminal assault upon a little girl, last December, was sentenced to life imprisonment.

When asked by the Court if he had anything to say before the sentence was profiounced, he replied that he was innocent, and that he was not given a fair trial.

The prisoner was unmoved while the sentence was being pronounced. Mr. Justice Crocket, in imposing the sentence, reminded the prisoner that the crime of which he had, been found guilty was hideous and revolting. It was his opinion that the ac cused was the guilty one, and that the severest sentence should be given him. The law calls for in a case of this kind the penalty of death or life imprisonment, and after carefully considering the evidence submitted at the trial, and the finding of the jury, he decided that the sentence hould be life imprisonments

William Nairn was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary and one whipping, the least being eight strokes, and in the second charge was sentenced to two years, the terms to take effect one after the other.
