



Editorial

WHICH WILL BE THE BETTER

FOR NORTHUMBERLAND? What may Northumberland County expect if it elects Mr. W.B. Snowball, the Liberal candidate in the by-election on October 7th? This is the question the electors of this county should consider before depositing their ballots. In 1921 Prime Minister., MacKenzie the people of Northumberland and not one of them has vet been fulfilled. It is certain that not the fault of the late representative, who at all moment lost sight of the county he represented. Then whose fault was it? Certainly none other than the Prime Minister and his Government, who after getting the electors to vote for them, forgot all about the promises they made and in fact forgot that there even was a County of Northumberland.

The Liberal Government going to build a railway from Tracadie to Newcastle and even do better.-they were going to extend it to Redbank. Almost three years have passed since this promise was made and we have never even heard the Tracadie Railway menis elected to represent Northumber land for the next session, what more will he be in a position to do for the county than did the late representative? We fear, very little more, if as much.

Now what good would it do to elect C.P. Hickey, the Conservative candidate? He will be in opposition th the government and will only be the county's representative for the next session. This is quite true, but if he is elected over Mr. W.B. Snowball, the Liberal candidate, it will be a protest from Northumberland that this county is dissatisfied with the treatment it has been accorded by the King Govern ment in the past three years and it will make Mr. King and his Government sit up and take notice. that Northumberland resents the way it has been dealt with and possibly, during the next session our County will be considered by the government to some extent and we might be given at least some consideration by this Liberal government, which has ignored us

In conclusion—after considera-



tion of these two arguments, the question arises, of the two, which is the better for Northumberland? We have had almost three years of the King Government, with representative from this county supporting and we know what we got-nothing.

If we elect another representative supporting the liberal admiristration is there any proof that we will get any more than we got before? None: In such a case then, it would seem reasonable for Northumberland to clect a representative in opposition: with the possibility of arousing the government to action by our protest and thereby getting something, that we otherwise would not get, if we elected a supporter of the government and by so doing endorse the "don't care' attitude of the government in the past. "Of two evils we should choose the least." and it would seem logical that Northumberland stands to win more by electing an opposing representative, as a protest, rather than by electing a supporter as an endorsement of the treatment already accorded the county. It will be good politics on the part of Northumberland to elect Hickey and take our chances on getting anything from the Govern ment in the next twelve months. as it is a certainty that we will get

nothing if we elect a supporter.

The people of Northumberland County would like to know what Mr. Snowball means when says in his card: "If elected will use what ability I possess to assist in having full justice accorded the Maritime Provinces and in such legislation as will advance the material and other interests of our whole Dominion." The late member, Hon. John Morrissy M.P. was one who always looked after the interests of the Maritime provinces and particularly the county sented, but even he was unable to tacks on the exchange. see that full justice was accorded and Northumberland County electors are rather of the opinion. that if the late member for Northumber land was unable to secure Northumberland's rights, it is idle talk for Mr. Snowball to promise that he can or will do any better than his predecessor.
