

TO PURCHASE BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The San Francisco Call publishes a copy of a bill to be shortly introduced into congress by Hon. Horace F. Cutter, empowering the United States government to purchase the province of British Columbia from Great Britian for \$100,-000,000. Here is the bill:

"Be it enacted etc., that the president of the United States be and he hereby is authorized and empowered to enter into negotiations with the British government for the purpose of acquiring by purchase for the United States the ownership in entirety of the said now called British Columbia; and that the sum of one hundred millions of dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be placed at his disposal to effect the said purpose.
