

It is almost impossible to calculate correctly what the action of a rhino will be on becoming aware of danger No two of them seem to behave in the same way in similar circumstances. On the whole, it is safe to say that if only disturbed he will retreat, but should he be actually annoyed and see his enemy he will retaliate and charge Serious loss and delay are often caused by a rhino charging a caravan Yet this action is nearly always forced apon him and occurs through stupidity rather than premeditated malice The head of a caravan, say, of 300 porters, extending over two or three miles of country, passes to windward of a rhino. He gets the scent and moves up wind and perhaps nears the centre of the caravan, when, being thoroughly alarmed, he turns off a little, only to strike the tail end.

Being now puzzled and seeing at last, as he thinks, the original cause of his annoyance, he charges straight through, on his way horning a load or two hastily cast aside by the porters on his approach. He then passes on to leeward of the caravan and, being scent, moves on into more peaceful territory. Yet a person who had not watched his progress from the start would think that he had come from a nile or more away with the deliberate intention of exterminating the cara-

On the whole, it may be said that the disposition of the rhino is on a par with that of most animals and many human beings-they wish to be left alone, and unless worried they will not make trouble.-London Field.

The Situation at Home.

The second reading of the Finance Bill by the House of Commons makes it evident that the Asquith Government has steered clear of one of the shoals on which it was considered probable it would founder. Premier Asquith has displayed much skill in steering his Government in difficult waters and has added much to his reputation. He will probably succeed in making the Veto of the House of Lords the dominating, and may be the only great, issue of the General Elections which are bound to come in the near future. As no one expects the House of Lords to give way on the "Veto" question, and as it is understood the Nationalist party is determined to have this issue before Lords turn down the Veto question, there is no room for doubt that a General Election will be held shortly. The Nationalist attitude is based on the perception that the Veto of the se of Lords is the chief obstacle to Home Rule, and the only way to surmount it is to co-operate with the Asquith Government in its effort to take away from the House of Lords its power of absolute vote, or in other words, to take away from the House af Lords the power of perpetually pre-venting bills such as Home Rule from passing into law. The majori-ties with which the Budget resolutions have been passed and the second reading of the Finance Bil adopted are conclusive evidence of the alliance between the Liberals and the Nationalists. The latter prefer bearing a little evil to achieve a great

The Recital Last Night. Notes From ncluding His Excellency the Goverfor and Lady Williams and suite greeted Mr. Mark Hambourg at the College Hall last evening. The comng of this world-famed artist to this asurable anticipation, night's recital more than fulfilled the high expectations of our music-loving people. Mr. Hambourg opened his programme with that familiar Toccata and Fugue in D Minor by Bach, which we usually hear on the organ. The arrangement by Tausig adapts it to the capabilities of the piano, and the interpretation by Mr. Hambourg showed him to be a master of the plano as well as of the fugue. He awoke the sympathies of his audience once, and held them with increas ing tension to the close of the recital. The singing quality of his tone, especially in the softer passages, the elicacy of his touch, and, more than il, the appeal of the soul through the music, held his listeners in thrall Their appreciation, hearty and sincere, was given at the conclusion of number, while the absolute si-during the playing betokened their interest and enjoyment. In the 'ugue it was interesting to note how the different voices, as they entered in subject or answer, were given with clearness and definiteness, the accomanying voices being subservient in one; the episodes were full of life nd vigor. Beethoven's so-called Moonlight Sonata" was the second number. The Adagio, so easy and yet to difficult to play well, was rendered with smoothness and great expres sion; the Scherzo was given with brightness and the Finale with bril-liancy. The second part of the pro-gramme consisted of works by Chopn, which received most sympathetic reatment by Mr. Hambourg. The Nocturne in G Major was most beautifully interpreted, and the same may be said of the Study in E Flat Minor, and the Prelude in A Flat. These three showed the softer side of music and partook of the cantabile style. It was pleasing to note that

he audience gave intelligent apppreciation to them as well as to the rilliant Study in G Flat and Prelude in B Flat Minor. The two latter, with the Polonaise in E Flat, were most effectively interpreted, and Mr. Ham-bourg had to reappear again and again to acknowledge the loud and prolonged plaudits of his delighted isteners. The Polonaise, with the last number of Part III. of the programme, appealed most strongly to the audience. Into the former, with its Polish characteristics, the recitalist seemed to enter with all his soul and as his fingers swept the keys with astounding tempo, as he flung the harmonies forth broadcast, as he nassed chord upon chord, and, with utter abandon, worked up the movement to a glorious climax, the enthusiasm of his audience could not be restrained, but burst forth into applause that made the hall ring again. tery of the keyboard. My position is still unchanged and will not be changed hereafter.



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
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
