The Imperial Education Conference.

Among the conferences held this year was one of educational experts from different parts of the Empire. Among those who attended was Mr. Runciman, President of the Board of Education. In an address to the conference, he said:—
"We wish to bring into the common stock the intellectual forces of the whole Empire. Our Imperial strength is to be found in men. Well, the educator is producing men. The intelligence and the character of the Briton all over the world depend, in the first place, on the training he has received in his schools. . . . and, just as the main unity of our Empire depends on affection and interest and sentiment, so its strength depends on the intelligence which we can breed in our educational institutions." The Conference, he explained, was intended not mainly to foster the imperial sentiment, but to give practical effect to that imperial sentiment by bringing together the knowledge and experience of different parts of the British Empire. Still, its main justification, he recognized, was "its personal interest. We are not only here to discuss education, but to meet educationalists. We want to come face to face with men who are directing or actually using the methods which they are describing or have described for our benefit."
A permanent committee was agreed upon, consisting of representatives of the several governments concerned, together with representatives of the Colonial Office, the India Office, the English and Scotch Education Offices, and the Irish Office, with functions as follows:—
(a) To keep in touch with the Office of Special Inquiries and Reports in carrying out its work;
(b) To communicate with the several governments concerned;
(c) To consider the suggestions submitted by the several governments of the Empire as to subjects to be discussed at future conferences.

London, Aug. 3.—Dr. J. W. Robertson, chairman of the Canadian Technical Commission, says there is no need for the Englishman to be self-deprecatory; the commission has learnt more in England and Scotland than in all the other countries it has visited.

Roberts Joins the Insurgents.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day.—Premier Asquith was absent from the House of Commons on the advice of his physicians owing to an attack of laryngitis. Sir Edward Gray assumed the leadership of the Government forces. Lord Hugh Cecil started a repetition of the former uproar, but the Opposition did not appear to be anxious to follow his lead. He moved that the consideration of the bill be postponed for three months and said the Prime Minister ought to be subjected to the criminal law on a charge of high treason. This remark aroused the noisy protest from the ministerial benches, but the Speaker quelled the disorder. The bill, shorn of the vital amendments of the House of Lords, but with minor concessions added, will be presented to the House of Lords to-day. So many peers wish to take part in the debate that the vote on the bill is not likely to take place until Thursday. The Insurgents have obtained a weighty recruit in Lord Roberts, who has announced his intention to vote with the followers of Lord Salisbury against the measure. Lord Roberts contends that in politics as in war the path of duty is the path of safety.

That Naval Mutiny.

MADRID, To-Day.—No details of the execution of the 26 tars are known here. According to a letter from an officer the mutiny was purely political. He says sixty sailors revolted with cries of "Long Live the Republic," and tried to take possession of the warship, but were overpowered and placed in irons. The Government attributes the mutiny to the anti-military campaign which is being carried on by the Socialists and the labor Unions.

Home for Consumptives

COMMEMORABLE WORK OF THE DAUGHTERS OF EMPIRE.

The Daughters of Empire have undertaken the erection of a Home for Consumptives. The site of the Home is at the junction of Blackmarsh and Mundy Pond Roads. The Home consists of a bungalow and two sleeping houses. The bungalow consists of a dining room, kitchen and apartments for the nurse and servants. On the south of the bungalow is a large verandah, which is intended for the use of patients and will afford them plenty of fresh air and protection from the rain and sun. Each sleeping house will contain three beds and will be well ventilated, the windows being replaced by shutters, which will be closed on the windward side of the house only. The house is pleasantly situated, surrounded by trees, and commands a grand view of the surrounding landscape. Dr. Brehm is looking after the sanitation and Nurse Campbell has offered to take charge of the Home for three months. Linen, kitchen utensils, furniture, etc., are still needed, and those who wish to help should communicate with Mrs. Miller, 26 Power Street. 

The Trip of the Sheffield Choir was a Financial Failure. Toronto, August 3.—That Charles A. E. Harris, of Ottawa, who shouldered the burden of an Empire tour for the Sheffield Choir of England, will be \$50,000 out of pocket by the project, was the statement of Dr. Harris' business manager, W. J. Robinson, who has returned to Toronto. The choir is now on its way to South Africa from Australia, where immense audiences greeted the concert and civic receptions were offered on every hand. During some weeks of the Australian and New Zealand trip the receipts went as high as \$40,000 a week, and the average through the Canadian West was also very large. Such receipts, however, large as they were, have proved insufficient to meet the cost of the trip, which included such items as renting ten steamships and engaging hotels.

HOW "LLOYDS" BEGAN.

Founder of Enterprise Was Coffee House Keeper Whose Shop Vessel Owners Frequented.

Primarily "Lloyds" is a corporation employed in marine insurance and having a world wide agency for the collection of marine intelligence. Incidentally other insurance is taken. "Lloyds" had its origin in the enterprise of Edward Lloyd, a London coffee house keeper, whose place, opened in 1688, became a resort for ship-owners and ship captains. So much was learned of marine matters and so general became the interest in this information, that in 1692 an office was opened in Lombard Street, and shortly after "Lloyd's News," a paper issued three times a week and devoted to shipping news, made its appearance.

Adverse criticism of the paper by the British Government, coupled with a demand for an apology for an item of news which appeared in the paper, decided Mr. Lloyd to discontinue the publication. The insurance feature of "Lloyd's" originated from a method of mutually insuring of "underwriting" each other's shipping risks by the owners frequenting Lloyd's establishment. Their method of doing this of mutually insuring or "underwriting" their names to a document which stated the amounts that each was willing to give in the event of disaster to the risk.

The present system of "Lloyds" does not differ in any essential particular from the method employed at the beginning, but it is much better organized and the business has been vastly increased in volume. Its radius of operation now practically covers the whole world.

Canadian Navy Likely to be Built in St. John.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—Although it has been officially announced that tenders for the construction of the Canadian Navy would not be awarded until after the smoke of combat on the Dominion elections has cleared away, the Herald understands to-day, from excellent authority, that the tenders have received consideration, and have been figured upon.

The lowest tender was that of Campbell Laird Co., of England, who favor St. John, N.B., as a site for the major works to be required in the navy's construction.

The second lowest tender was that of the Swan & Hunter Company, also an English concern, who favored Halifax for their works.

The British Canadian Company, of which Sir Henry M. Pellatt was the head, and which was expected to establish large works at Sydney, submitted the third lowest tender, while the fourth tender considered was that of the Vickers Maxims Co., whose objective point in Canada had been Montreal.

There were eight tenders in all for the big works.

Tenders Not Dwait With. Ottawa, Aug. 3.—While the tenders for the Canadian naval vessels are under consideration they have not yet been formally dealt with by the Cabinet Council, and until that has been done no one here in authority will say for publication which firm's tender is the lowest.

His Worship Mayor Frink when informed of the contents of the above despatch said he was expected to establish large works at Sydney, submitted the third lowest tender, while the fourth tender considered was that of the Vickers Maxims Co., whose objective point in Canada had been Montreal.

While not privileged to publicly disclose the contents of the letters he had sent, His Worship said that they contained lengthy information regarding the advantages of St. John as a shipbuilding centre.

"There is an act already on the statutes of this province," he said, "empowering the city of St. John to give a bonus of \$100,000 to a shipbuilding and repair plant, and an additional \$100,000 provided this plant is fully equipped and meets all the requirements arising as a steel shipbuilding yard."

His Worship added that while this sum of \$200,000 was to be granted by the city, it was also thought that to secure the industry and the jobs the provincial government should lend assistance, as the establishment here would benefit the entire province. He also stated that the city was disposed to do everything within its power to have a shipbuilding plant established here. The firms he had mentioned to were Swan & Hunter, Vickers Sons & Maxims, Campbell, Laird & Co., and one other.

Naval Memorandum. London, Aug. 2.—The Birmingham Post complains that the principles of the naval memorandum are of an negative character. An arrangement is needed, it says, which would leave Great Britain in no possible doubt concerning the availability of the dominion navies in time of war, and the only way is to keep the Dominion Governments adequately informed of the British foreign policy.

LONDON, Aug. 8. The motion of Balfour to ensure the Government in the House of Commons was lost yesterday, with the result that the debate in the Lords' camp created little interest. The speeches of the Conservatives rang with a chorus of what the Government has prostituted as the prerogative of the Crown, for the purpose of carrying Home Rule for Ireland, without consulting the people.

Crews caused a sensation by admitting that the members of the Government were not all of one mind with respect of creating new peers. The King was regarded the plan with a legitimate reluctance that depended upon the action of the Lords, or whether the government would be compelled to create new peers.

Halshury has charged Asquith as being guilty of an atrocious breach of trust, and drew a parallel with the one urging an inexperienced King at the mercy of an astute lawyer, who told him that the creation of peers was the only way of solving the veto bill.

LONDON, Aug. 8. The carmen joined the other strikers at the docks to-day. Union officials claim that 70,000 men are interested. Work on south side of the Thames is at a standstill. Ships have arrived in large numbers with cargoes, but there is no one to unload them. Cargoes of meat in refrigerating chambers are still unspolled, but supplies of coal for operating freezing plants are rapidly disappearing, and strikers will not permit replenishing of the fuel supply.

MADRID, Aug. 8. A court martial at Cadiz to-day condemned to death twenty-six men who took part in the mutiny on board a Spanish battleship while the vessel was lying at Tangier. The men partook of the Sacraments of Penance and Communion, and execution followed.

Upton Sinclair is Out of Jail.

Wilmington, Aug. 2.—After 18 hours' imprisonment in the Newcastle county workhouse, where they were sent by a magistrate on a charge of violating the Sunday laws prohibiting the playing of sports on the first day of the week, Upton Sinclair, the writer, and one of his fellow members of the Single Tax colony at Ardern, near here, were given their liberty to-day.

All of the ten viewed their imprisonment as an "experience," although several of them nursed sore hands as the result of five hours' labour in the stone quarry of the workhouse. Sinclair said that the work on the "stone pile did not blister my hands, because I was used to playing baseball and tennis."

Professor Joseph Garrold of the Northeast Manual Training School, Philadelphia, one of those imprisoned, carried away with him the plug of tobacco which is allotted daily to prisoners, and he declared he "was going to frame it."

George Brown, the dissatisfied member of the colony, who brought the prosecutions, expressed himself tonight as satisfied with the entire proceedings.

Laurier Stands Alone.

Fisher and Botha Have Disavowed the Neutrality Idea.

London, Aug. 2.—The Leader states that Premier Fisher indignantly has denied the authenticity of the interview in the Review of Reviews charging him with disloyalty to the Motherland, and the strange view apparently held by Laurier that one part of the Empire might remain neutral in a quarrel in which the others were concerned, has been disavowed with equal emphasis by Gen. Botha in South Africa and by his own party in Canada. "These things surely show how monstrous are the accusations of disloyalty brought so freely against the colonies on the slightest pretence by the party which claims to be exclusively imperialistic."

The British Navy
READY FOR WAR.

Not since the Emperor of Germany's historical challenge to Paul Kruger, whilst the Boer war was in progress, has the friendly relationship between England and Germany approached the point of breaking point, as during this last few days, through a speech made by Mr. Lord George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in reference to the Moroccan complications.

Whether war or not will depend on the diplomatic handling of the situation, by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, Sir Edward Grey, and the British Cabinet, in the first case, and whether Germany is in a state of preparedness to come to grips with the only nation she is in the opinion of those best able to judge, even likely to have occasion to go to war with, in the second case.

The British Navy was made the battle cry of the Unionist Party in the election of 1909, and Lord Charles Balfour, candidate for Portsmouth, and F. E. Smith, a Liverpool Unionist candidate for Liverpool, unfolded some authenticated statistics regarding the strength of the British in comparison to that of the German navy, at the date given and the state of the two powers, when their respective estimates for the immediate future were concluded, and the battleships provided for in them were afloat and in commission.

The statistics showed that according to the programme laid down for the Navy estimates by the Liberal Government, the comparison was distinctly unfavourable to Great Britain, and that Germany was every year becoming a serious menace and contender to England for supremacy of the sea.

Caused a Sensation.

The inspired and authenticated figures submitted, caused a profound sensation throughout the British Empire, urgent representations being made to the Mother Country by her Dominions beyond the seas, as well as the deep thinking Imperialists within the confines of the British Isles.

Long and earnest consultation by the peace-at-any-price party, resulted in significant additions being made in the navy estimates, bringing the provision for the next three years, up to something like the standard, asked for by the Unionists.

Since that time work at the ship-building yards and on a scheme of land fortifications on the east coast of England and Scotland has proceeded with a feverish rapidity, very little publicity having been given to the former and absolute secrecy maintained regarding the latter, so far as this could be attained.

It is not generally known that a scheme of land forts is at present being hurriedly completed on the east coast of Scotland, in which will be mounted guns of a heavy calibre and



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too, excepting that Germany is a little more prepared, and the task would not be so easy now, as it was then.

War May Come Suddenly.

It is generally conceded, however, that to enter into a naval war, is like taking a leap into the unknown. No one can say for certain how the huge fighting machines and their crews will behave in the real thing. Conditions aboard a warship are so different to anything ever experienced before, and it is this uncertainty in connection with the prospect of a naval war, that overawes the deep thinking minds of those who would be engaged therein, but as a fairly high authority, aboard a line of battleships, said to the writer when discussing this phase of the situation, while manoeuvring in the "Channels."

"We know as much about it as Germany. It will come suddenly, when it does come, and we will go as far as they do. All we are waiting for is the word. It will come some day, and the sooner the better!"

In the opinion of the writer there still is no war resulting from the present Moroccan complications. Although it is wonderful how simple an act can precipitate war. When it does come, it will be with dramatic suddenness, and according to expert opinion, will end with equally dramatic suddenness, by one of the contesting powers' annihilation. Land will play an important part in the terrible contingency, and the defeated power will be a negligible quality in the world's naval forces for a century to come.

There will be no ultimatum issued, no Cabinet council meeting with the withdrawals of Ambassadors, the next and it is believed the final war, will begin and end in the North Sea, and that is the terrible contingency Great Britain never ceases to prepare for, but the first shot will never be fired by British guns, it is Germany, that is the menace to the world's peace.



Trials in Secret.

The writer has seen a barrel floating on the waters of the English Channel, undiscernable with the naked eye, blown to smithereens, flag staff as well, by an expert gunner of the British navy, and been wet to the skin on the deck of a torpedo destroyer reeling off her 30 odd knots an hour in an Admiralty trial. But fact was not mentioned next day, or the day after in the London Times or the aggressive Daily Mail. The Admiralty of Great Britain asks for a certain amount of money which in their wisdom and from experience of trials and manoeuvres is spent in a certain way. There is no press agent employed by the department, and an enquiry is conducted to investigate all cases of information, correct or incorrect, which appear other than that they give out themselves, when the navy estimates are being discussed on the floor of the British House of Commons. But they never stop spending, building and improving, and the result of their labour is eminently satisfactory.

The navy of Great Britain may not be numerically strong enough to fight with the combination of any two of the world's naval powers, but it is in the opinion of those who know, strong enough on paper to try conclusions with Germany, and there is not a man Jack aboard a British warship, who would not, metaphorically speaking, jump out of his skin at the prospect of a fight with Germany on sea. This was proved when the Flying Squadron was commissioned in 1900, to clear the air of that famous message to Kruger from the German Emperor, at the time of the Boer War.
