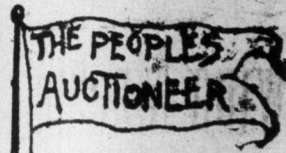

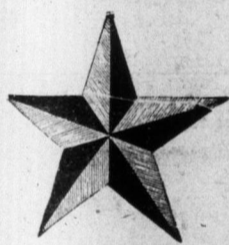

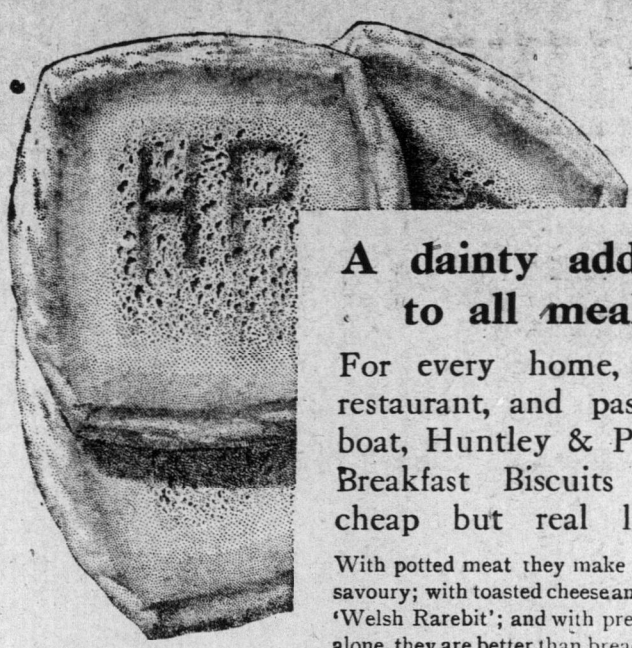

Cab Tariff.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Please give me space in your widely circulated journal to say a word or two with reference to the cab tariff lately drawn up and published by the Municipal Council. Some of the rates are excessive and more than the public are prepared to pay; whilst others are so low that no cabman can afford to drive for them. Now, Mr. Editor, this tariff is so complicated that I doubt if the Councilors themselves can make anything out of it; and how in common sense can they expect an "ignorant mob"—which somebody remarked some time ago when referring to our cabmen—to understand it? Why, you would want to take a 5 years' course in mathematics to try and make anything out of it, and then I doubt if you would be successful.

For example: if 4 persons hire a cab at the Post Office stand and drive to railway station, the charge under Council's tariff is 75 cents. If those people missed the train and wanted to drive to Dohovan's, the Council's tariff would allow the cabman 75 cents more, of a total of \$1.50. Now, Mr. Editor, the cabman that would drive for this fare would not be able to pay his wheelwright's bill nor feed himself and his horse. Three more items of Council's tariff reads thus: For any afternoon within 9 miles of city, \$4.00.

For any afternoon over 9 and not exceeding 12 \$5.00. Any deviation from direct route to a suburban resort that will cause an increase in the time under the afternoon rate will be considered extra and be charged for at the rate of 80 cents per hour. I would like to ask the Council as to the length of time they mean to embrace in the term of afternoon. I understand our solicitor has written them several letters about this afternoon term but received no information.

Another rate is: drive 3 to 4 persons to railway station, 75 cents. Now 4 persons hire a cab on the West End street the Council taxes them 75 cents to go to the station. If they change their minds and say, "I don't think we can catch that train, caddy; you'd better drive to Bally Halye golf grounds" when they get there the Council's tariff allows the cabman 75 cents for the drive; "Small, isn't it?"

Another rate for suburban driving is one dollar, first hour, 90 cents each and hour, 80 cents for third hour. This is considerably less than our present price and we cannot accept it. And still another item says ever licensed cab shall have its number painted in numerals not less than 1 1/2 inches with black paint upon side and front of lamps. Now, Mr. Editor, I would like to see Councilor M going over the old Petty Hr. road on a dark drizzle night with his lamps (sides and front) painted black. I guess you would have our city brigades out on the search for him, at night. I tell you, Mr. Editor, you lamps don't want to be dirty to go over some of our suburban roads at night, and another thing you don't want that your Maker gave you don't want to dim either. Now, in conclusion, the best thing the Council can do is to put our main streets in something like good condition before they draw up any scale to govern the cabmen. I think the cabmen's Union can look after any schedule relating to them. It's our business, anyhow. I hope I have not trespassed on your space too much. I remain,

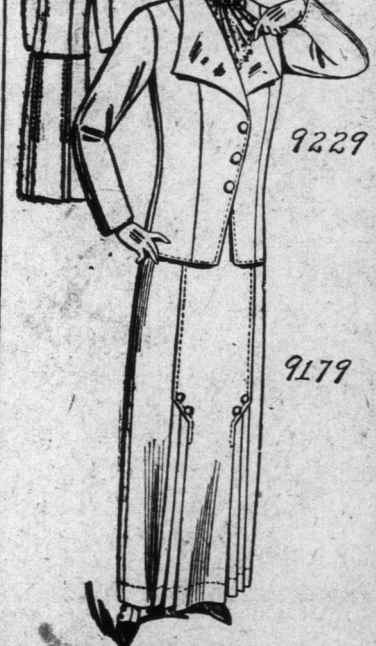

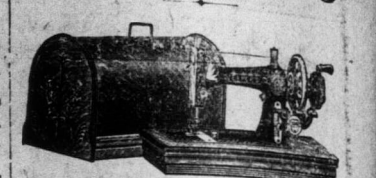

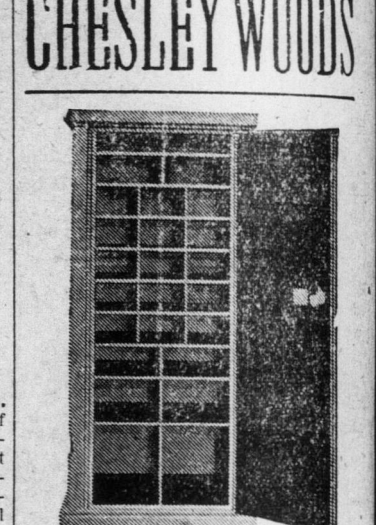

The Evening Chit-Chat
 By RUTH CAMERON



The best thing of an inexpensive kind is almost always better than a cheap thing of a more expensive class. Things which appear exactly the same on the surface are often entirely different when you look into them more closely. For instance, knowing how to spend money and knowing how to buy, might appear to be the same thing, but they are entirely different. Every woman knows how to do the first; one in a hundred, the second. And yet, knowing how to buy wisely is one of the most important divisions in woman's great science of home-making. I heard an investigator of financial conditions assert that women spend over three-fourths of all the money that is earned in the middle and lower classes. Think how important it is that they should know how to spend it wisely. Volumes might certainly be written on this subject, but I don't know enough to write them. I just want to bring home to you one principle of wise buying with which I have recently been impressed and which I have stated above, namely—the best thing of an inexpensive kind is almost always better than a cheap thing of a more expensive class.

Nine years ago two young girls who were chums were married at about the same time. These young couples had nearly the same amount of money to spend, and many of their household furnishings were similar. But in the matter of beds they disagreed. One girl was determined to have brass beds, and since she did not have enough money to buy a first class article, bought some attractive but cheap brass beds. The other girl said, "I would rather have a thoroughly good white bed than a cheap brass one," and forthwith, put about the same sum which her friend had invested, into the most attractive and well made white beds that could be bought. To-day one girl has dainty white beds which look as fresh and attractive as when she bought them, while the other has a pair of tarnished and tawdry brass beds which spoil the appearance of her whole chamber.

It is better to buy good oak than cheap mahogany; a first class cotton dress than a cheap silk one. Good muslin or scrim curtains are infinitely preferable to hangings of cheap lace. First class cretonne is better than fourth class tapestry. It is infinitely more satisfactory to pay fifty cents for the best of silk hosiery than for the cheap grade of silk hose. Good lamb will give you more nutriment and satisfaction for your money than cheap steak.

Indeed, in every department of buying the housewife will find this a safe principle, and will do well not to let herself be beguiled from it by the longing to have something of a better class and more showy than she can really afford. At first she may think she is getting a bargain in the cheap expensive thing. In the end she will find out her mistake.

Household Notes.

Brass, copper and tinware should be cleaned with turpentine. Wood ashes and soap are sometimes used for brightening zinc pans. A little white sugar in hot water, two lumps to a basinful, is sufficient stiffening for delicate laces. A few drops of turpentine in the water when clothes are put to soak will whiten them wonderfully. Starched clothes, shirts, collars, cuffs, etc., if dried before a bright fire after ironing, become beautifully stiff. To put a new wick in a lamp, push in through the top of burner, and it will go in much easier than through the bottom. Clean chip hats by brushing them freely with a stiff brush dipped in gasoline, or rub them thoroughly with dampened cornmeal. A thin coating of three parts lard melted with one part resin applied to stoves and grates will prevent the iron rusting in the summer. Use a wire-covered asbestos mat for your iron stand. A rub over the wire scourer the iron, while the asbestos protects the ironing board. A rocking chair that creeps on a thick-piled carpet can be made to remain stationary by winding a couple of inches of velvet around one rocker. To insure kerosene lamps giving a clear and bright light, boil the interior parts of the lamp in vinegar and soda at least once in two weeks. A safe place for matches is a glass jar which has a screw top. Unless you use safety matches, it is better not to leave them in the box in which they come from the store. If before grinding the morning coffee the beans are heated for four or five minutes, or until they take a darker shade of brown, the flavour of the coffee will be greatly improved. To clean cotton gowns, make a solution of soap and wash them in the usual way; but as green or reds may run add a little lemon juice or vinegar or oil of vitrol to the rinsing water. Printed pillow tops are greatly improved when being made up if they are covered with a washable bobbinet. Finish around the edge with a cord to harmonize with the colors in the pillow. Owing to the fact that water has a tendency to split them, combs should seldom be washed, but frequently brushed with a stiff toothbrush that has been dipped in a cleansing oil. Turpentine gives a fine polish to tinware and is efficacious in cleaning bath enamel which has become discolored. Dip a cloth in the turpentine, rub the stained parts and polish them afterward. Skimmed milk and water, with a bit of blue in it, made scalding hot, is excellent to restore old rusty black crapes; if well squeezed and pulped dry like muslin, it will look as well as or better than new. Fainting is caused by blood leaving the head, therefore an attack may often be prevented if, when the person first feels it coming on, she will drop her knees. Old bread browned to a crisp in the oven, then rolled fine or ground in a food grinder, mixed with equal parts of flour, is much better for croquettes, fried oysters, etc. than any "bought" cracker dust. If a thick cloth or piece of Turkish bath toweling is placed in the hot

Latest News Of the Appalling Marine Catastrophe.

The Titanic Was Warned on Friday Afternoon of the Presence of Huge Fields of Ice.

Bankers May Have Survivors.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, April 16. The French liner La Touraine, which arrived here last night, reports that at midnight on April 10th she encountered a huge field of ice with tops of bergs slightly above water. La Touraine slowed down and emerged from the icefield after hours of steaming. Next morning she passed other icebergs. La Touraine was in communication with the Titanic on Friday afternoon, April 12th. La Presse Nouvelle quotes the captain of La Touraine as saying he sent a wireless despatch reporting the presence of icebergs to the captain of the Titanic, who acknowledged his message with thanks.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day. President Taft has sent out two government cutters to meet the Cunarder, S. S. Carpathia, which is carrying the survivors of the S. S. Titanic to New York. Besides many leading Americans there was on board Major Archibald W. Butt, a special aide de camp of the President, who was returning from a special mission to His Holiness Pope Pius on behalf of the President of the United States.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-day. Two messages by Marconi Wireless Company from Company's stations at Cape Race and at Sable Island make it appear there are some of the Titanic's passengers, either on steamer Carpathia or Virginian. One message reads: Marconi Station, Sable Island has been in communication with the Carpathia and the ship has no passengers from Titanic, the other message reads: Marconi Station, Cape Race reports they had no communication with Virginian and does not believe any of Titanic's passengers are on the vessel.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-day. The final roll of rescued from the Titanic disaster had practically been made up was the impression that grew almost into conviction last night as the hours wore on without a revision of the lists adding measurably total known survivors. Carefully compiling the available lists the record of named survivors of the disaster stands thus: Men, 79; women, 233; children, 16; total 328. Of the remaining 540 known survivors it is estimated not more than 100 were seamen required to man the boats.

Special to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, To-day. The cable ship Minia arrived here from a cable repairing trip. She reports nothing whatever of the Titanic.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-day. There is the faintest touch with the wireless station at Sable Island. The Carpathia has 868 survivors.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The King sent the following message to the White Star Co.:—"Queen and I horrified at the appalling disaster to the Titanic and at the terrible loss of life; we deeply sympathize with the bereaved relatives and feel for them in their great sorrow with all hearts." The Queen Mother Alexandra sent this message:—"It is with feelings of deepest sorrow I hear of the terrible disaster to the Titanic and the awful loss of life; my heartfelt grief and sympathy goes out to the bereaved families of those who perished."

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-day. The hope that some passengers of the Titanic not taken on board the Carpathia have been saved is revived when Capt. Freighter of the Utonia which docked at midnight, reported that he passed along the route taken by the Titanic and that a number of fishing boats were in the vicinity of the disaster at the time. He said he thought it not improbable that many passengers had their secured life preservers and jumped in time to avoid being carried under by the suction of the liner; may have been rescued by the crews of fishing vessels. The Utonia is not equipped with wireless.

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The Titanic Disaster.

The Best Traditions of the Sea Observed. The First Chance Given to Women and Children.

Exclusive to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, Yesterday Afternoon. There is no further news of the disaster to the ill-fated White Star liner Titanic than was reported on Monday night. The Allan liner Virginian, which left here on Saturday night, is supposed to be on her way from the wreck to St. John's with some survivors. Only about a third of the two thousand five hundred souls on board were saved from an ocean grave.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, April 16. Premier Asquith in a brief statement in the House of Commons this afternoon gave public expression to Britain's sympathy in connection with the Titanic disaster. After reading to the members messages from the White Star Company, the Premier continued:—"Perhaps this House will allow me to add this—I am afraid we must have subsided in our kind one of those terrible events in the order of Providence, which appeal the imagination and make us realize the inadequacy of words to do justice to what we feel. We cannot say more at this moment than to give the necessarily imperfect expression of our sense of admiration that the best traditions of the sea seem to have been observed, that willing sacrifices were offered to give the first chance for safety to those who were least able to help themselves, and of the heart-felt sympathy of the whole nation for those who find themselves so suddenly bereaved of their nearest and dearest."

The Rt. Hon. Sydney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, was asked in the Commons this afternoon if he would take steps to prevent liners proceeding to New York from taking the northern route for the purpose of breaking records; and whether he could state the number of lifeboats carried on board the Titanic compared with the number of passengers. Mr. Buxton said that he must have notice of such questions.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, April 16. A quick report from the White Star Line of the number of lifeboats and life rafts carried by the Titanic has been telegraphed for by Supervising Inspector Lister of the Government Steamboat Inspection service.

Lloyd's is staggered by the news, but has declared that the insurance on the lost steamer is so evenly distributed that none of the underwriters are likely to be hard hit. Reassuring cable despatches received yesterday had sent the reinsurance rates down 25 guineas per cent, and the underwriters closed up at night hopeful that all was well. When they opened this morning a little business was done at 90 guineas, but the rate was quickly raised to 95, which is known as the "total loss" rate. The amount of property loss it is

hard to ascertain. To-day the underwriters stated that they could not say accurately what securities were on board the ship. It is generally estimated, however, that with her cargo the Titanic would represent approximately \$12,500,000. Of this total \$750,000 is carried by the White Star Company on owners' risk, the balance being placed on the insurance market.

S. S. Convention.

Yesterday's sessions comprising the following proved just as interesting as the previous meetings. At 2:30 p.m. Rev. C. Howse conducted the praise and prayer service, the chairman being Mr. A. W. Martin, who called upon Brigadier Storehan, S.A. to open with prayer. The Chairman made a few timely but inspiring remarks, after which Miss Rogers, the talented daughter of Rev. Dr. Rogers, addressed the meeting on the "Big Girl Problem." The manner in which the subject was handled showed remarkable insight of the question under discussion. Mrs. (Dea) Wakefield sang "Hold thou my hand, 'Fair Love' with great feeling and expression. Mr. H. E. Cowan followed with the "Big Boy Problem." In well chosen and masterly words he dwelt on this most important topic, showing a keen, up-to-date knowledge of the problem as we have it to-day. A most instructive and interesting discussion followed. Revs. Hackett, Fenwick, Matthews, Thackeray, Maddock and Messrs. Northfield, Pike, W. Peters and others taking part. Rev. Mr. Sutherland with prayer closed one of the most practical and useful sessions of the Convention.

At 7:30 the praise and prayer service was ably led by Rev. M. Fenwick. After the choir of young ladies, who had done meritorious service in connection with the Convention, sweetly sang the inspiring hymn "Christ is our Captain, see our foe." Mr. Edwin Murray, the chairman for the evening, spoke a few well chosen and fitting words, and under his leadership the programme was delightfully gone through, nothing marred by the inexpressiveness of the service. Rev. J. W. Bartlett was called upon to speak on the "First Factor in the S. S. Superintendent." In the course of his remarks he said the Superintendent ought to aim high, his duties being the proper equipment of all the branches of the Sunday School life. The goal of every Superintendent ought to be: Best Teachers, Best Discipline, Best Equipment, Best Scholars, Best School. The Superintendent should be tasteful, able and a Temperance and Missionary Advocate. He ought to secure Best Help, Best Atmosphere, and know his Scholar by name and repute. Miss Bradbury followed with "The Second Factor," The Scholar. In clear tones, in distinct, simple but beautiful language, she held the audience from beginning to end. She told the story of the Diamond Fields in South Africa, with boys playing with the precious stones thinking them only stones and the experts coming along recognizing them as jewels of great value, so we think some boys are only rough stones, but the expert Jesus Christ sees the glitter of the heavenly jewelled qualities and knows their true worth if only we could view the scholars thro' Jesus' Christ. We might with Ruskin see the beauty of the lives under our control, and like him as he walked on London streets see not the dust but the wealth that lay in the dust. Miss Bradbury told of the two Great Things in Life the "Human Life" and the "power of touching Human Life," showing how different scholars needed different methods. "Child Study" ought to be the "Teachers' Study." Rev. T. B. Darby, B. A. gave the third factor, "The Teacher." In his heart to heart talk he gave some common sense, practical advice to all Teachers. He urged a proper value be set upon his and her work as a teacher. Teachers must be on time, true and good tempered, and above all Christians. Rev. J. K. Currie followed with the three factors and "Their Relative Dependency." He is asked for more concentrated effort to win the scholar for God and the Church. Three out of every four S. S. Scholars drift back into the world. The stories were true from life, thrilled and inspired all present and cannot but result in good. The male quartette rendered by Messrs. Hatcher, Bowden, Haddon and Taylor, was faultlessly rendered and delighted all present. The meeting closed with the Benediction by the Rev. Thackeray and the Vesper Hymn by the Choir. E. V. W.

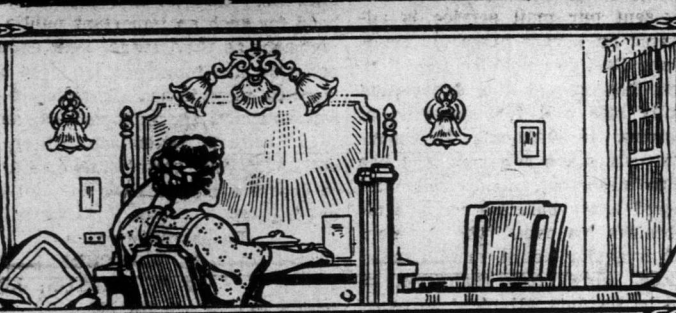


