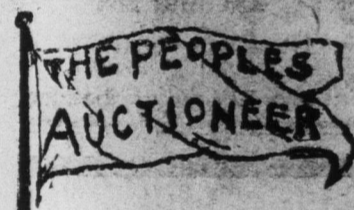

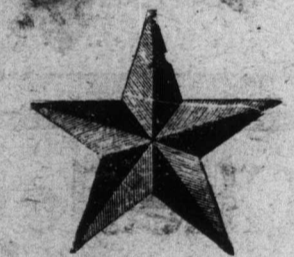

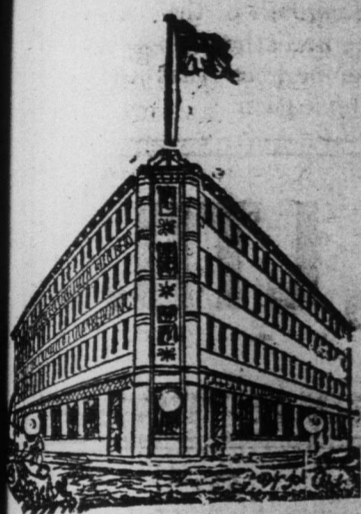

The weekly session of the Council Board was held yesterday afternoon.

R. Prowse, who represents the McLean estate, submitted plans of proposed streets on unoccupied property of the estate. Referred to the Engineer.

Water and sewerage pipes will be installed in Walsh's Square as asked for by T. Hallett.

An overhanging rock on Battery Road, reported by C. C. Taylor, was referred to the Engineer.

The retaining wall at the corner of John and Danford Streets, reported to be in bad condition by C. C. Taylor, will be attended to.

Applications of A. B. Walker, to buy a plank platform at the corner of R. Gillingham to make repairs to Golf Avenue, J. Halditch to repair house on Quidi Vidi Road and J. Carpenter to repair house in Dick's Square were referred to Engineer Ryan.

Permission was given J. P. McLaughlin to erect on houses 366 and 367 Duckworth Street, also to James Beck to raise kitchen, Flower Hill.

Plans of proposed buildings will have to be forwarded by P. McGrath and G. Gillingham.

The contract to Sudbury retaining wall (\$270), was awarded Spratt Bros. and the contract to repair Long's Hill wall (\$220) was awarded J. Hookins.

Tenders for installing sewerage systems were awarded to the lowest bidder, Conditon Martin, who was in the chair in place of the Mayor, who was out of town, was called away from the meeting. Councillor Mullaly made a motion that in the absence of Mayor Ellis no individual powers be granted and that no important work be transacted without the consent of the Board. The motion was seconded by Councillor Myrick provided it did not interfere with standing committees. Coun. Ryan refused to support the motion as he did not see the reason why Coun. Martin should be reflected upon.

The question of raising the Engineer's salary from \$1,200 to \$1,400 a year was then introduced by Coun. Mullaly. A heated debate followed. Coun. Mullaly, in making the proposition, regretted the absence of the Mayor and Deputy, but said that the matter was long enough in slings and should have been settled months ago.

Coun. Ryan contended that the proposer was taking advantage of the absence of some members of the Board. He asked that the matter be deferred for a full meeting to deal with it. Coun. Mullaly said there would never be a full meeting on your part to push this matter in the absence of other Councillors.

Further cross-firing followed between Councillors Ryan, Mullaly and Myrick, and the motion was left over until next week.

Wait and See.

The Government organs are exercised about what they call alliance rumours. The People's Party men are in a sad funk and keep awake at night wondering what is going to strike them next fall. Most of the rumours are self-contradictory. We are told on the one hand that Bond has made a direct offer to Coaker, and on the other that he has never been in direct communication at all. We are told that Mr. Coaker recognizes that he must withdraw from the Fogo candidacy and on the other hand that he wants a safer seat and is going to Bonavista District to get it, and again that he is by some smartness on the part of somebody being sacrificed by being sent to lead a forlorn hope in the Bonavista District. It will be seen from these instances that the Tory

following are being given a wide choice of rumors to select from. The choice afforded is most amusing and show conclusively that the guessers who are responsible for the circulation of them are at sea without a doubt. We learn too Dr. Lloyd is going to contest Trinity with two Union colleagues. We are much indebted to the Daily News for this intelligence and also for the information that this rumor has long been current. This probably accounts for the diligence of the Evening Herald in circulating the falsehood about disinfectants and sealers. Then we are told that if Bond wins and Coaker is returned he is to become Minister of Marine and Fisheries (an office which we believe he would fill with satisfaction to the great body of fishermen), and if Bond wins but Mr. Coaker does not he is to be made a Commissioner of Agriculture. (Well, if his remarkable successes with his other projects are any guarantee of ability, which they undoubtedly are, he would do infinitely more for Agriculture than the two placemen the last four years or more). The compliment to Mr. Coaker is undoubtedly high but we are under the impression that Mr. Coaker considers his energies can best be devoted to the work he is doing for the fishermen in the office he is filling at present, and that he is not hankering after any government preferment. The whole of these stories show how disturbed the People's Party are at the prospect before them this fall. IN CRITICAL CONDITION.—The little boy Dunn, the victim of a burning accident at Renewa, is still in a critical condition at the General Hospital. He is suffering great pain and grave fears are entertained for his recovery. New Pulp Mills. Mr. W. H. Horwood, of the Horwood Lumber Co., who has been down at the new mills, exclusively referred to by the Telegram, returned this morning by a belated train. Mr. Horwood brought with him interesting photos of the mills and property generally. They will be finished by October and the first gridding of pulp will occur in November. They have a sufficient supply of pulp wood cut to keep the mills going for the rest of the year. It is interesting to see the details Mr. Horwood has of the place. Reinforced concrete figured in almost every erection. A conduit pipe of that material is 10 feet in diameter, 300 feet long, and the dam is 1,070 feet long. To give an idea of the works and material used to date, we may say 6,000 barrels of cement have been used in them, 18,000 barrels of sand, 24,000 barrels of crushed stone, which in the aggregate gives a total of 48,000 barrels of material. Mr. Horwood says that the aggregate quantity of steel used in the construction to date is over 150 tons. Mrs. E. Wah Sing Passes.

Famous British Columbia Chinaman
Goes to Join His Fathers.

The Province of British Columbia, though it is one of the newest settlements on the earth, is mellow with historic places, and her story is replete with fascinating romance and tragedy. Every village has a trail of years crammed with incident. The land is full of wild tales of the grim early days when the people of the province counted themselves in dozens and the natural enemies of the pioneer, the Indian and the wilderness, were very real and near. Into the names of her civic centres, into the rivers and lakes and mountain she has woven a commemorations of her time of travail. To the newcomers, the "Chechakos," the quaint musical names of British Columbia mean nothing except a troubled pronunciation. To the old-timer they are fraught with memories, some happy, even as the Long Sault of the Ottawa, or the Lost Channel of the St. Lawrence, or the Plains of Abraham have historic significance to the easterner. The difference, however, lies in the fact there are many long-bearded, taciturn old-timers still alive who remember intimately all the gold rushes of the early days which first attracted the eyes of the world to this far away land.

Among the names which history has given on the tablets of British Columbia is that of Wah Sing. In this vast new land, where the melting-pot of nations forever seethes and boils, there is nothing extraordinary in the name of a Chinaman linked with the cosmopolitan horde which makes up the motley of people herding in this quarter of the globe. The name of Wah Sing for nearly forty years has allied with the gold activities of the famous Tulameen district. At the age of 110 years he stretched out his withered yellow frame and died in the little log house where he had lived ever since the gold rush of '85. Itinerant Chinese gathered silently from remote parts of the valley. They lighted the little red tapers at head and feet, placed a bottle and two cups on the grave, and then the inscrutable mourners dispersed and left the tiny mound of Wah Sing to level itself on the gigantic slope of the mountain face. The grass has not yet pushed a green blade through the raw soil, for the grave is not old.

"Only a chinaman," you say. Just so, but the life story of Wah Sing, the little market-gardner of Granite Creek, is filled with the glittering romance of the China Seas; it is clothed in a barbaric splendor peculiar to the East; it echoes to the swift thunder of sea battles. For those lowly-burning candles gutter by the barren of a Chinese viking, they flash the inadequate signal of the death of an Eastern sea-king. Once upon a time this Wah Sing stood upon the rocking deck of his own ship. He flung his arduous taunt at the crusted cogles of the Dragon Throne, took heavy toll of the commerce of the seas and sent his fleet way with a treasure-packed bull. Wah Sing was a buccaneer, a Chinese Morgan, with a war junk of his own and a murderous crew, who bent their evil wills to none but his. What ships he robbed and foundered off the China coast, what men he slew, what desperate ventures he led, he alone knew, and now no one will ever know, for Wah Sing was the last of his pirate crew. If you read the log of H. M. S. Terror of fifty years ago you will learn of the sinking of Wah Sing's junk. It will tell how the crafty pirate escaped ashore and how his men were taken in irons to Honk Kong and hanged.

So here, in the last west, came Wah Sing to live the balance of a life already old. Through the moulding period of the bad days of the west he pushed his unobtrusive way, a miner and latterly a market-gardener of the Tulameen. Educated far beyond the humble knowledge which is the lot of the ordinary Chinese, Wah Sing was known as "Franchy," because he spoke that tongue. In fact he had been known to use the language of five peoples—English, French, German, Chinook and Siwash, in addition to his native tongue.

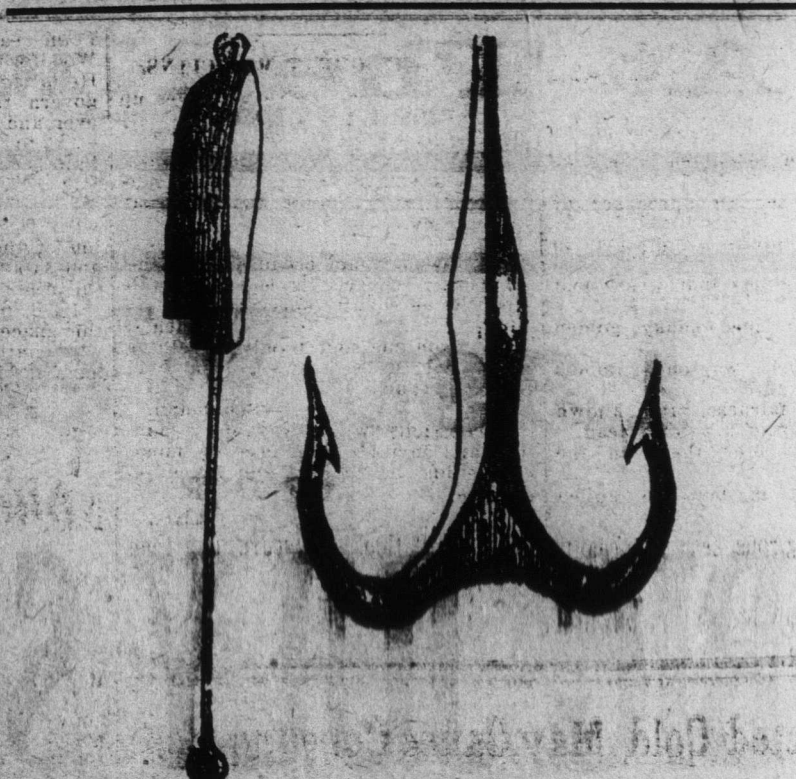
