





In an interesting speech he referred to Mr. Longley's visit here, a the invitation of the Commission whose attention had been directed to the need of improvement of the City's water supply since their appointment. The inefficiency of the existing system was only too apparent, and the City Engineer had continually showed the necessity of improvement To do this effectively it was necessary to secure the services of a consulting engineer to make a thorough examination of he whole system and report on it. The Board was particularly fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Longley. His work had been done thoroughly, and the report of his investigation will be published in due course. The system outlined by Mr. Longley will meet every requirement of the city, including complete fire protection. The installation of the proposed system will entail an ex-penditure of \$168,000. and will provide for a 20-inch main to Rawlins' Cross, down King's Road to Duckworth St. and on to George's Pond, which will act as a reservoir for any extra demand that may be made upon the wat-

The pipes in many parts of the city have become corroded, and there is little space for the water to flow through, hence the low pressure.

Mr. Longley had also discovered that about 80 per cent. of the present supply is being wasted through defective pipes and other causes.

The report has not yet received due consideration, but the Chairman felt that the city would not hesitate to have the water srvice placed on a satisfactory basis. Another matter reported on was the possibility of the city working its own electrical system. It was thought that a system can be introduced which would cut the present cost in half and still be profitable to the city. The question of sewerage was also dealt with, and many of the sewers in use to-day are a menace to the health of the city. In conclusion Mr. Gosling wished to express his appreciation of the thoroughness with which Mr. Longley had performed his

Mr. Longley, in replying, thanked mission for the many courtesies extended to him since his arrival He pointed out the necessity of adequate fire protection for the city, and llustrated his remarks by referring to the great Salem fire, a few months ago. With regard to the electrical system, he thought that from what he had seen the city had a good proposition if they wished to take up the matter.
Mr. J. M. Kent expressed his plea

sure at being present, and said that the first essential in civic improvements was the rousing of citizens to a sense of their responsibilities. Since the new water supply would entail a large expenditure, and the money market was rather tight just now, he thought there might be some improvement by a conservation of the existing services. His attitude could we afford to make these improvements, but could we af-

ford to do without them.

Hon. J. R. Bennett also expresse his pleasure at being present. He had been a member of the Council which had previously striven for an improv ment of the water supply, and wnich had installed a service that was guaranteed to be adequate for fifty years. He felt that the time was rip for the city to have a full charter of

incorporation, and to be given the power to do its own financing. The report was an eye-opener. It showed the city had been living in a fool's

Hon. P. T. McGrath assured the Commission of the support of the press in any move for the improvement of civic conditions. He also believed that the Legislature would also do its share in facilitating the work of these

Mr. J. W, Withers thought the question of better water supply an absolute necessity, both from the standpoint of health and as a protection to property. He was keenly interested in the work, He was keenly interested in the work, and thought that though the new system might mean more taxation, the cost would be offset in other ways.

Mr. Higgins proposed the health of the Chairman, expressed appreciation of the work done, and assured the Commission of the support of citizens generally. The Chairman replied in suitable terms.

OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.

No controversial political questions will be delib-erated, but this does not mean that entire harmony will prevail, for the nisters will be asked som pertinent and uncomfortable quesions about their conduct of various hases of the war. The Labor Party eaders are especially primed with questions in regard to pay for solliers, allowances for their dependents and pensions, but criticism of the Government by the Opposition will probably be restrained. The Home Secretary is expected to make some report on the situation in regard to alien enemies in England and the extent of the spy peril, but no additional legislation in this direction is expected. The most immediate business before the Commons will be to provide the sinews of war in men and money. One hundred and five Unionists were missing from their seats, being absent in various capacities in nection with the war, while 32 Minsterialists are actually at the front and many others are absent on Gov ernment business.
