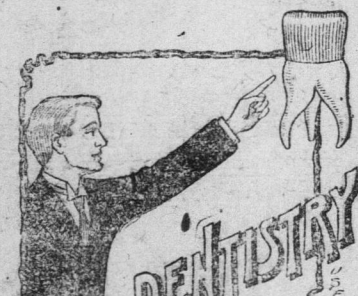

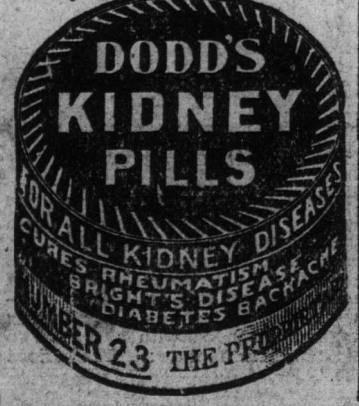

VOTES OF CREDIT. At the opening of the day, Premier Asquith expected votes of credit to be £420,000,000.

THE NEW WAR EXPENDITURE.

Premier Asquith said today His speech was entirely to the financial present situation, no reference made to military affairs. The first vote of credit supplementary estimates for the fiscal year, bringing the total expenditure for the end of the financial year, 1915-16, amounts to £2,300,000,000. Asquith told the House the expenditure from April 17th of last year to Sept. 30th, 1915, to Sept. 30th, 1916, was £2,300,000,000. Loans to British in the Dominions, to Nov. 7th and Feb. 19th, 1916, amounted to £28,300,000. Total £2,328,300,000.

FINANCING THE WAR.

Munitions for the Army from April 1st last to Feb. 28th, 1916, cost £204,800,000, the Premier said that loans to the Allies and the Dominions have amounted to £28,300,000. These by no means represent total advances from April 1st to Feb. 28th, 1916, simply represented advances of credit. In addition, advances there were made by the Bank of England in quest of the Government's signature under this head, probably to the extent of £242,000,000. The vote of credit for the financial year allowed margin for contingencies, and the vote of credit for the year 1916 raised the total vote of credit to £2,328,300,000. Mr. Asquith emphasized the steady secure economy in expenditure, financial committee of the House of Commons, and the business men to bring about efficiency. He did not say the system could be improved, war, said the Premier, conducted under rigorous conditions which prevented any other purpose than the prosecution of the war. 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War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

NOTES OF CREDIT.

LONDON, Feb. 21. Premier Asquith introduced the expected vote of credit aggregating £420,000,000.

THE NEW WAR CREDITS.

LONDON, Feb. 21. Premier Asquith introduced two votes of credit in the Commons today. His speech was confined entirely to the financial aspect of the present situation, no reference being made to military affairs in general. The first vote of credit was on the supplementary estimate for the current fiscal year, bringing up the total war expenditure for the year to £1,420,000,000. This appropriation was for £120,000,000. The second vote to provide funds for the first part of the financial year, beginning April 1st, amounts to £300,000,000. Mr. Asquith told the House that the daily expenditure from April 1st to July 17th of last year was £2,800,000; from July 18th to Sept. 11th, £3,500,000; from Sept. 12th to Nov. 6th, £4,200,000; and from Nov. 7th to Feb. 19th, between £4,300,000 and £4,400,000. Loans to Britain's Allies and to the Dominions, to November 6th last, amounted to £98,300,000. Between Nov. 7th and Feb. 19th, the amount loaned was £70,000,000, making a total of £168,300,000.

FINANCING THE WAR.

LONDON, Feb. 21. Manifesto for the Army and Navy from April 1st last to Feb. 19th, cost £34,800,000, the Premier stated. He said that loans to the Allies of Britain and the Dominions showed a substantial increase since November, and that the growth in the rate of expenditures was entirely due to loans to the Allies from the vote of credit. These by no means represented the total advances to the Allies. They simply represented advances from the vote of credit. In addition to those advances there were advances made by the Bank of England at the request of the Government. Expenditure under this head, he said, would probably reach £423,000,000. The vote of credit for the remainder of the financial year allowed an ample margin for contingencies, such as the purchase of American securities, he added. The vote of credit of £300,000,000 raised the total vote of credit for the war to £2,022,000,000. The Premier emphasized the steps taken to secure economy in expenditure. The financial committee of the Cabinet had appointed a special committee of business men to bring about economy and efficiency. He did not think that the system could be improved on. The war, said the Premier, is being conducted under rigorous conditions, which prevented any money voted by Parliament from being devoted to any other purpose than the vigorous prosecution of the war. The Government is still confident of the justice of the cause, and that the just cause would prevail. Asquith said he was uncertain what sums must be spent before the end of the financial year in purchasing American securities. He anticipated that the extra credits now asked, with the ones still in hand, would last until the end of May. The

WOMEN TAKE THE PLACE OF MEN

LONDON, Feb. 21. Over 100,000 women, up to now, have taken the places of men in British industrial life, thus releasing 250,000 men for service in the Army. These figures have been compiled by the Statistical Department of the Board of Trade. They fall short of the correct total, as many firms have not yet made returns. Women predominated in factories which they never entered before the war, and work metal lathes and drills like old hands.

WAREHOUSE DESTROYED.

TORONTO, Feb. 21. Fire in the Seed Warehouse of the William Rennie Company here, damaged the firm's stock of seeds to the extent of \$200,000, it is said. The damage to the building was comparatively slight, but the large stock of valuable seeds gathered for the spring delivery was almost totally destroyed, by fire and water. The blaze was caused by defective electric wiring.

BEAUPORT CHURCH DESTROYED

QUEBEC, Feb. 21. Sensational talk is going about a fire to-day, which completely destroyed the \$400,000 Beauport Church, in this city. The editor of the Le Soleil, Quebec's leading daily, admits, this afternoon, that some days ago he received an anonymous letter from Beauport, saying that Pastor Desell of that parish had been threatened by anonymous letters, presumably coming from sympathisers of Germans interned in the Beauport Academy.

THE RUSSIANS ADVANCE.

LONDON, Feb. 21. The Russians have occupied the entire Lake Van district, the Turks retiring southward, and even evacuating Bitlis, according to a Petrograd despatch received in Rome and given out here. On the other wing, according to the despatch, Russian advance guards have arrived within a short distance of Trebizond on the Black Sea coast.

NICHOLAS CONGRATULATED.

LONDON, Feb. 21. Field Marshal Kitchener telegraphed Grand Duke Nicholas, Commander of the Russian forces on the Caucasian front, congratulations on his brilliant feat of arms at Erzerum. The Grand Duke replied, thanking the Field Marshal, and his brother comrades in the British army.

FRENCH DESTROY ZEPPELIN.

PARIS, Feb. 21. A Zeppelin airship was brought down by French guns in the vicinity of Brabant Le Rol, on the Meuse, today, according to an official announcement made this evening. The Zeppelin was flying from St. Menchould towards the south, and was attacked by cannon from Revinny, and hit by an incendiary shell. The Zeppelin fell in flames in the vicinity of Brabant Le Rol.

REVIVAL OF DISCUSSION.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. Copenhagen reports a revival of the discussion on the proposal that Danish West Indies be sold to the United States. These reports were said by the State Department officials today to be their only knowledge of the subject. The story attracted the atten-

tion of Congress and brought out a wide range of personal opinion, particularly among the Senators. Chairman Stone, of the Foreign Relations Committee, said he had no knowledge of such a plan.

COUNT VON BERNSTORFF.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21. A despatch to the Herald from Washington says, a high official of the State Department stated today that the administration felt it necessary to discipline Count Von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, for his improper propagandist views. When the Ambassador calls at the State Department he will be officially informed that the intrigues he is habitually promoting against the United States Government, through the medium of publicity, must cease. Whether he will be allowed to retain his residence in Washington depends upon his future conduct. It does not take to heart the admissions of the administration he recalled. It is asserted of Count Von Bernstorff that he has violated his pledge given to the Secretary of State that he would keep the exchanges in the Lusitania negotiations in entire confidence. Facts regarding these exchanges have been made public, which were known only to Bernstorff and Mr. Lansing. Mr. Lansing knows full well, when he says these facts are presented in the press in a light calculated to promote the German cause, who is responsible for the reports. Furthermore, responsibility is placed at the door of the German Ambassador for the reports, asserting that the German proclamation announcing that the submarine campaign was begun March 1st was issued as a "logical development" of the American proposal for the disarming of the merchant ships of the Entente Powers. The State Department knows that the German submarine campaign was decided upon before the American proposal was submitted to the Entente Powers, yet the impression was spread broadcast throughout the United States that Germany has declared this new warfare because of the action taken by the United States.

THE SENATE'S RESOLUTION.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. The Senate to-day adopted a resolution, introduced by Chairman Stone, of the Foreign Relations Committee, asking President Wilson to submit the correspondence between the United States and Korea, when Japan occupied the hermit kingdom, during the Russo-Japanese war. Administration leaders, it was said, want to see the information in reply to Ellhu Root's attack on President Wilson, because no protest was made against the occupation of Belgium.

REPRESENTATIONS MADE BY THE GERMAN EMBASSY.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. Representations against the presence of a United States Deputy Marshal on the captured British liner Appam, the German prize in Hampton Roads, were made today to the State Department by the German Embassy. Prince Von Hatzfeldt, Counselor of the Embassy, discussed the whole subject with Counselor Polk. It was said that while the Embassy realized that the feature was out of the hands of the State Department and in the Courts, it was anxious to know when some decision might be expected. The presence of the Marshal was objected to, it was said, because it was feared some friction might develop. Counselor Barclay, of the British Embassy to the great dismay of officials, was shown by mistake into the room where Prince Hatzfeldt was waiting. If the British Counselor and the German Prince recognized one another, as they sat on opposite sides of the room, neither betrayed that he felt he was in the presence of an enemy. The situation was relieved by the departure of Counselor Barclay to Polk's office.

THE BULGARIANS.

MILAN, Feb. 21. News received here throws new light on the reason why the Bulgarians abandoned their plan to attack Salonika. At a council of war recently held in Sofia, the Bulgarians complained of the wholesale withdrawal of German troops from Macedonia and the Balkans, and declared it would be impossible for them to undertake the campaign alone against the Allies. The Germans replied that they had given sufficient assurances to the Bulgarians, that the fall of Serbia had not left the Balkans field entirely to them and the Turks, and that they (the Germans) would guarantee a sufficient supply of guns and material for the campaign. The Bulgarians then declared that if they were to make another great effort

with the scant assistance from the Turks, they would do so only if they would guarantee large compensations in Greek Macedonia, in other words, possession of Salonika, Kavala and all the Hinterland. The Kaiser, however, in consideration of his promise made to King Constantine, put a halt on Bulgarian ambitions for the possession of Salonika, with the result that the Bulgarians resolved to remain in their trenches. Germany, seeing that the Balkan campaign had come to a deadlock, withdrew still more troops, declaring that she had need for them elsewhere.

ACTIVITY OF GERMAN AEROS.

BERLIN, Feb. 21. An official statement issued here today, says a German aeroplane on Sunday, dropped a large number of bombs on the aerodrome and camps at Serres, west Flanders, and returned safely.

BRITISH STEAMER FLOATED.

LONDON, Feb. 21. The British steamer Cymric Castle, which went ashore last week on a reef off Mombasa, British East Africa, has been re-floated.

GENERAL SMUTS REPORTS FROM EAST AFRICA.

LONDON, Feb. 21. An engagement in East Africa, resulting in the repulse of an attacking German force, is reported in an official statement given out here today, as follows: General Smuts states that on February 16th an enemy force of four Europeans and 200 native soldiers attacked the post of Kachumbi on the Uganda border, 15 miles north-northwest of Kyaka. The strength of our post was two Europeans and about 36 native soldiers. The enemy were driven off with the loss of four Europeans, fifty-three natives, a machine gun complete, 45 rifles and a quantity of ammunition. Our casualties were nil.

SCHOONER WRECKED.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Feb. 21. Six members of the crew of the crew of the schooner Anne Lord, of New York, were brought into port today by the fishing schooner Flora L. Oliver, which rescued them off Minerva's Light yesterday. They suffered from cold. The Lord was bound from Windsor to Fall River, and had been nearly a month on the passage. Early yesterday, when off Cape Ann, she was found leaking with decks awash. The crew were almost exhausted when the other schooner saw the distress signals and took off all hands. The Oliver made an effort to tow the Lord across the bay, but the hawsers parted and she was abandoned.

ALPINE DISASTER.

BERLIN, Feb. 21. It is considered probable that all persons who were hurled into an avalanche carried away the Alpine shelter, have perished. Late reports from Salzburg said that already there were 55 known dead as the result of the snow slide, 49 injured and about 30 still missing.

RESIGNATION WITHDRAWN.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21. The Rev. Dr. Chas. A. Eaton has withdrawn his resignation as Pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist Church. The announcement to this effect was made today by the Rev. J. W. Brougher, of Los Angeles, who occupied the pulpit in place of Dr. Eaton. It was urged that the urgent plea of the congregation induced Dr. Eaton to stay.

New Church Progress.

The new church on Cochrane St. is fast nearing completion, and it is hoped to be able to open the Sunday School department of it next month. The church is a spacious one inside, of artistic design, and has all up to date appointments necessary to the sacred edifice. The seating capacity has not yet been arranged, but it is expected that the committee will look after this matter immediately. A new organ to be imported from England will be installed in the spring, and the instrument will be of the best.

The Quick Lunch Counter.

In the United States time is very valuable, because we have only had 135 years of it, while European nations have succeeded in using up more than 1,000 years apiece without getting anywhere in particular. In our 135 years, we have had to eradicate Indians, buffaloes and rattlesnakes from 3,000,000 square miles of territory; build houses equipped with steam heat and pianos for upwards of 100,000,000 people; construct 200,000 churches and 10,000 libraries; farm 50,000 square miles of forest into cornfields and potato patches and bring 10,000 baseball teams to their present state of perfection. Because he has been busy at all these tasks, the American citizen has not had much time to waste on lunch. This accounts for the quick lunch counter, an invention by which a man is able to engulf four varieties of food and a toothpick in less time than it takes to flag a waiter in a European restaurant.

The quick lunch counter is as big a time-saver as the telephone, the automobile, the packing house and the lynching bee. With its aid, a man can lower enough food into his digestive in two minutes to keep it busy until evening and perhaps all night. It is coming into a panting and breathless nation as a long sought-for boon and only the loiterer and the dilettante now sit down in a chair and pat napkins on their vests before eating two-in-the-water-easy on a raft, with a raw one, and a stack of wheats on the side.

The lunch counter is manned by a crew of deft jugglers who can deal sandwiches right and left handed and cut a plate of pork and beans from under the deck without spilling so much as a bean. Judiciously concealed by a partition, a sad-eyed cook prepares five orders at once on a gasoline stove. In a gold plated restaurant, a chef will take half an hour to prepare an order, and then get half of it wrong, but no one makes mistakes in a lightning luncheon. Time is money at noon, if not at night, and the cook who murdered 1½ minutes of \$10 an hour time wouldn't last long enough in a fast foodery to walk out by himself.

The lunch counter man makes his patron sit on high stools, so they will go away quicker and give some one else a chance. He can prepare a full meal in two minutes and three minutes later, another man will be ordering from the same stool, while the waiter is hurrying the ironstone dishes used in the last meal at the washer twenty feet away. Marvelous feats are performed by lunch counter patrons, some of whom are able to eat half a pie in thirty seconds with the aid of a knife alone. Men who eat rich dinners, lasting from 8 to 11 o'clock p.m., and women who live on chocolate candy look upon the lunch counter with horror. However, it is a great blessing to the business man. It gives him digestion, spots the eyes and blind staggers and compels him to retire from business and take up civilization at the age of forty-five.

"Cold Sunday"

Dear Sir,—On this date twenty ago (Feb. 21st, 1904) was one of the hardest snaps of frost in forty years, and perhaps the longest longer period. It is known as "Cold Sunday," and the temperatures last week in many of the registers may be of interest just now.

The cold wave struck on the midnight on the Saturday, and at noon on Sunday the temperature was at its worst. It was accompanied by a gale of N.W. wind, and the most comfortable clothing made it impossible for anyone to remain on the streets for any length of time. The police doing their duty had a hard time, and said they had a hard time with the wind and when daylight dawned a blizzard was raging, making it possible to see for any great distance through the whirling drift. The mercury ran very low in the meters exposed at different places. People who were caught about early, suffered from intense cold that they have never violently felt. The records of registering thermometers on that night were as follows:

Monkstown Road (Mr. H. H. Higgs) 23 below.
Mount Cashel (Prescott) 23 below.

Mrs. Higgins, 8 a.m., 15 below.
Rennie's Mill Road, 9 a.m., 15 below.
Portugal Cove Road, 8 a.m., 15 below.
St. Bon's College, 8 a.m., 20 below.

The keepers at Signal Hill Cape Spear believe it may have at least 25 below at the height of the night, as no such severe frost had ever been felt in the collection.



"Cold Sunday."

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—On this date twelve years ago (Feb. 21st, 1904) was experienced the hardest snap of frost and cold for forty years, and perhaps for a much longer period. It is known in history as "Cold Sunday," and in view of the temperatures last week, a summary of the registers may be of interest just now.

The cold wave struck the city at midnight on the Saturday preceding, and at noon on Sunday the storm was at its worst. It was accompanied by a gale of N.W. wind that pierced the most comfortable clothing, and made it impossible for anyone to remain on the streets for any length of time. The police doing night duty had a hard time, and said it was more than human flesh could stand. They could not leave their faces exposed long as they would be badly frost bitten. The wind blew with great force and when daylight dawned a regular blizzard was raging, making it impossible to see for any great distance through the whirling drifts. The mercury ran very low in the thermometers exposed at different places, and people who were compelled to be out early, suffered more from the intense cold than they had ever previously felt. The records of self-registering thermometers during the night were as follows:

St. Francis (Christian Bros.) 23 below.

Monkstown Road (Mr. W. Harris) 13 below.

Mount Cashel Orphanage, 18 below.

Mr. Harris who had been keeping constant records for half a century, said this was the coldest day in forty years. The records of ordinary thermometers made after daybreak, when the blizzard was raging furiously, were as follows:

Signal Hill, 7.30 a.m., 19 below zero.

Cape Spear, 8 a.m., 19 below zero.

Cape St. Francis, 8 a.m., no glass, coldest for years.

Mount Cashel 8 a.m., 12 below zero.

Dry Dock, 8 a.m., 16 below zero.

Sea Island (now Bowring Park), 19 below zero.

Mrs. Higgins, 8 a.m., 16 below zero.

Hennie's Mill Road, 9 a.m., 15 below zero.

Portugal Cove Road, 9 a.m., 17 below zero.

St. Bon's College, 8 a.m., 20 below zero.

The keepers at Signal Hill and Cape Spear believe it must have been at least 25 below at these points during the night, as no such severity of frost had ever been felt in their recollection.

happened to keep a diary for a few months of the year referred to, which included "Cold Sunday" and may say I suffered from frost bite on that and also on the occasion of the burning of the Wool Factory, where I went with hundreds of others to witness the blaze.

Perhaps some of our old weather-wise inhabitants may be able to give figures to beat these records. Anyway, it was on account of reading in one of our dailies last week that the glass registered 15 deg. below zero, and that on a night which I didn't think it went as low as one deg. that prompted me to forward the foregoing notes, which I hope may be of sufficient interest to find a place in the columns of the Evening Telegram.

Capt. Paterson At Wandsworth.

London, S.W., January 22nd, 1916.

Sir W. E. Davidson, Lieut. Colonel 1st Wtd. Regiment, St. John's, Nfld.

Sir.—According to your instructions I delivered the draft of 100 men from "H" Company to Major Whitaker at Ayr, Scotland. The discipline and health of the men in transport were excellent.

I proceeded to London, reported at the Pay and Record Office, and saw Sir Edgar Bowring there. With Lady Morris, Sir Edgar and Major Shea, I visited the 3rd London General Hospital at Wandsworth, where we have about 100 men. Sir Edgar took with him cigarettes and chocolates which he presented to all the men of our Regiment whom he saw. We went through all the wards and succeeded in seeing most of the men. They were all naturally delighted to see us, and to hear the last word from home.

Next day Sir Edgar put a car at the disposal of the men at Addington Park (Convalescent Home) and went there and saw the men. All speak very highly of the treatment they receive at these Hospitals. I cannot imagine how they could do otherwise. They are all very anxious to be sent to the enemy again. The Officers in charge of the Hospitals give them an excellent character for behaviour, etc. I made inquiries from C.Q.M.S. Oke and C.Q.M.S. Kerslake and other Sergeants and Privates in the Hospitals re the accusations about the clothing, comforts, etc., at the Dardanelles. All deny that they were neglected in any way; in fact they said they were better off than most other regiments. They secured their long cuffs and mufflers on the 6th November. They had their ordinary khaki uniforms with them. They said that if anyone complained about lack of clothing, etc. it was his own fault, and he should have inquired from the proper officer for the things he wanted. There are certain grumblers in the Regiment whose opinions should be heavily discounted.

I visited Wandsworth again to-day with Capt. Walter Rendell. We saw all the men, among them being Private Martin, who was operated upon for appendicitis and abscess. He is progressing favourably; in fact all the men are on the mend, and as far as I could judge there is no necessity for anyone to worry about those at Wandsworth as they are getting the very best of attention.

Saw Mr. Batterbee, and through him Mr. Steel-Maitland, who gave me every facility to visit the various hospitals, etc. Mr. Butler was also very kind, and offered to do anything possible that I might want.

Captain Rendell reports himself for duty on the 25th, if passed by medical board. Lieut. Ross had a nasty wound just below the shoulder; the surgeons are very hopeful about his total recovery, however, and he will have full use of his arm, no nerves being affected. He was at the Record Office yesterday, his first day out.

Private Mervant had the bullet extracted from his chest yesterday. He is also on the mend. A number of other men with frozen feet and trench foot are all progressing, being treated, and all dysentery and enteric cases are doing well. Judging from the look of the men they are all happy.

I will see the men at Wandsworth again to-morrow and on Monday go to Netley, where we have fifteen or more.

I saw Lieut. J. CHIFF on leave from France. His 1st Lieutenancy was confirmed at the front, and he seems to be doing well. I also saw 2nd Lieut. Penny; he has qualified for promotion, being now attached to his Brigadier's Headquarters.

The Pay and Record Office appears to be the rendezvous of all Newfoundlanders in London, military and otherwise. There are over 250 men back in this country from the front, most of whom are in and around the various hospitals. The men apply at the office either personally or in writing, for the balance of their pay, procure railway warrants, etc., when proceeding on sick furlough, preparatory to joining the Depot. They are also given invaluable assistance by the War Contingent Association, who help them to procure comfortable places where to spend their furlough, and render many other services. It is very patent that the office are in the right place.

My dear Mother,—I received the parcel with the socks all right, but don't send any more as the postage costs too much and we are pretty well supplied. We spent our Christmas at sea and enjoyed it fairly well. Each mess had a turkey. We had rough weather nearly all the trip and, have been at sea quite a long time. It was December 8th when we left Glasgow and we expect to get back to-morrow, when I shall post this letter. I am very well, and hope you are. Please say when you write if you can manage on the money I am leaving you. If not, I can manage two more dollars per month. I am getting a few days holiday and am travelling to Liverpool to see some friends. I have there.

Two Xmas's I have had at sea, but I hope by next Xmas to be home with you and this dream will be over, please God.

I must be thankful that I've got my health and strength and that God has preserved me from the dangers and perils of the deep, and I trust he'll bring me safely through, and that I may be spared to come home to you once more by and bye. With much love
