Teeming With Food.

What We Know About Denizens of the Deep Said to be Startingly Lim-

Washington, D.C., May 25. - Now hat the seas are open to the pursuits of peace, and the world is sorely in need of food, many problems of ocean geography are likely to be solved in

"The ocean literally teems ood," says a bulletin issued by the National Geographical Society. "The nan who declared that humanity is race of herring catchers might have over-stated the case, but that the sea abounds in food flishes and fishes fit for food is well known. As soon as we begin to study the subject of ocean fisheries, however, we come up short against the fact that what we really know about the inhabitants of the sea is startingly limited.

Whale are Lure for Herring.

"Many fishermen of the North Sea believe that whale bring the herring in toward shallow water-a conclu sion they reached from the observation that schools of herring are frequently found in the vicinity of spouting whales. In 1906 there was a failure of the herring fisheries, and the fishermen blamed the situation on the Norwegian whaling vessels oper ating in that region.


"Likewise, it is still a moot question whether or not modern fishing methods tend to deplete the supply and whether artificial propagation of sea fishes is a sufficient counter measure. A few years ago a British commission measured the intensity f fishing operations in the North Sea. "Trailing bottles were set adrift. and it was found that more than half of them were recaptured. In certain localities they were captured at a rate that indicated 90 per cent retaken

each season. "Marked fish yielded largely similar esults and the conclusion was that foodfish of adult size had at least three to one odds against its getting through the year uncaught.

How Ocean Fish Multiply.

"And yet there is so little race suiide in the ocean that even such inensive fishing probably has no effect upon the available adult supply. For instance, the female turbot lays 8,-500,000 eggs a year, and the cod has 4,500,000 to her credit. The female flounder lays 1,400,000, the sole 570,-000 the haddock 450,000, and the platce 300,000. The poor herring must be content with a meager 31,000.

"Much remains to be learned about the migration habits of the world's food fishes. The problem of life in the ocean is one full of interest and pregnant with valuable lessons for mankind. Even at the botton of the deepest trench in the abyssmal region of the sea's botton, where no ray of the sun ever penetrated, where Stygian night is perpetual, where freezing temperatures never, cease and were inconceivable pressure prevail, the miracle of life still goes on."





The Third Act.

Peace was the draft Constitution of the League of Nations; the second comprised the settlement of terms to be imposed on Germany; the third opened with the summoning of the German delegates to Versailles-to assent or to take the consequences of refusal. The hours are tense. President Ebert, Herr Scheidemann and Count Brockdorf Rantzau have declared that a dictated peace will be a peace of violence, and that Germany will risk all rather than be a party to any such humiliation. She abates her pretensions when she understands that the Allies mean business. She proposed to send representatives to Versailles to receive the Treaty, and take it to Weimar for consideration. The Allies' answer was instant and unmistakable: she must send men with plenary powers. Her acquiescence was equally prompt. Wisely, no doubt, the actual terms decided upon by the Peace Conference were kept secret till they could be communicated to the German delegates. The necessity was made clear by Mr. Lloyd George in his great speechgreat, notwithstanding certain things which perhaps were better left unsaid, however keenly felt. The Press. of course, objected to secrecy. It wanted to know. Valuable "copy" was being withheld. Rumour has sought to supply the deficiency. True to its ancient role, it has "stuffed the ears of men with false report." So far as they have been outlined

by intelligent anticipation, the terms are severe but just. They include payments in reparation amounting to £11,000,000,000; the surrender of the Saar coal fields to France for a long enough period to enable her to get her own coal fields going again, and compensate her for the damage done to them; the occupation of the left bank of the Rhine, the destruction of the Rhine fortifications, and the limitation of the German army and navy to numbers which will suffice for defence. Will Germany sign? The question is the almost daily heading in papers of all shades of opinionthose which think that the utmost pfennig should be exacted, as well as those which would almost be satisfied if Germany were let off with a caution, on undertaking to become a loyal and peaceful member of the League of Nations. "I would sooner have a good Peace than a good Press," said Mr. Lloyd George. Good Peace or bad Peace the Council of Four have got through the first part of their colossal and delicate task regarding Germany without the differences or the delays of which we have heard much. It is unfortunate that Italy has taken up an attitude with regard to Fiume which is irreconcilable with the claims of the Jugo-Slavs. Ther problems still unset-tled are Turksy, Russia, and Eastern Europe generally.-United Empire


