





#### Tests for 'Phone Girls.

MACHINE TO MEASURE "AWARE-NESS."

A suggestion that telephone operaors should undergo psycho-technical tests, with a view to improving the elephone service, is made by Mr. E. 5. Hodgson, of Coventry, who writes that a number of telephone operators in Berlin have been tested in this way

The faculty of attention or "awareess" was tested on an instrument designed for that purpose, which enabled the authorities to weed out girls unsuited for this work.

"Although we made no tests of that kind, our operators have to pass through a number of trials," an official of the Telephone Service told a Daily Mail reporter. "Operators are medically examined and are tested by an expert staff of women. The tests include speaking, hearing, and general education. After passing the tests the operators attend a school for a month. One cannot become an operator in a few weeks or months. We do not get the best work from an operator until she has been two years at the work."



"This was the first Union Jack, as it is generally termed, though, strictly speaking, the name of the flag is. 'great union,' being a jack only when flown from the jackstaff of a ship of war. James I. always signed his name 'Jacques,' and it is believed in many quarters that the jack and the jackstaff of the navy derived their names from that fact. Others contend that 'jack' was used as early as the close of the sixteenth century, Lord Howard's ships in their attack upon the Spanish armada, in 1588, are described as carrying a 'jack' on the jackstaff, their jack being a small edition of the red cross of St. George.

"That St. George's cross was placed over St. Andrew's was distressing to the Scots, who made it the subject of an appeal to the King. But even a king cannot solve all the problems of heraldry. That art has no way of making two devices on a flag of equal value. If they be put side by side the position next the staff is more honorable than the one remote from it, just as the upper portion of a flag is more honorable than lower. After the death of Charles I., the union of Scotland and England was dissolved and the ships of Parliament reverted to the use of the simple cross of St. George, while those of Scotland took up the cross of St. Andrew again. When Cromwell became protector he restored the union flag, imposing the Irish harp upon its center.

"After the Restoration, Charles II removed the harp, and so the original union flag was revived and continued in that form until 1801, when, upon legislative union of Great Britain and Ireland, the cross of St. Patrick was incorporated. To combine these crosses without losing the characteristic features of each was not easy. Each had to be distinct and at the same time retain a border which would denote its original ground. To place the red cross of St. Patrick on the white cross of St. Andrew would have olbiterated the latter, and vice versa. Therefore it was decided to make the white border more on one side of the red than the other. This breaks the continuity of direction of the arms of St. Patrick's cross, but permits the Irish and Scottish crosses to be distinguished from one another.

"The familiar and inspiring tricolor of France dates from the year H. J. STABB & CO. that gave the United States its Constitution-1789. The best authorities are doubtful as to the story of its origin, but there are three principal theories as to the derivation of its combination of colors. The first of these, and the most authentic, is that after the taking of the Bastille, when Lafayette had been appointed by acclamation commander-in-chief of the

#### The Mad Marriage.

It was in 1876, when overwork had wrecked his nerves and he was bor dering on insanity, that Tschaikovsky wrote to her brother, "I have resolved to marry, with whomsoever it may be-the resolve is beyond recall"; and in July of the following year Kashkin was amazed to find that he had carried his resolve into effectan event of wihch he gave the following explanation to his friend and patroness, Frau von Meck:-

"One day I received a letter from a girl I had known for some time. learned from it that she loved me. The letter was couched in such warm, frank terms that I decided to see her. At our meeting I assured her that, in return for her love, I could give her nothing but sympathy and gratitude But later I reproached myself for the carelessness of my action." Then, realizing that his refusal to marry her "would make her unhappy and possibly drive her to a tragic fate, he called again on her, frankly de scribed to her all his faults of temper and character and his financial cor dition, and asked her again if she wished to be his wife. "Naturally," he continues, "her answer was 'yes. The fearful agonies which I have ex perienced since that night are not to be expressed in words."

#### An Impossible Spouse

Within a month Tschaikovsky was running away from his impossible pouse and was writing to Frau von Meck: "I leave in an hour. A few days more of this and I swear I should have gone mad." After ten days' absence he screwed up courage to return to her; but within a week he was driven to an attempt at suicide -"standing up to his chin in ice-cold water, afraid to drown himself and yet hoping to catch a fatal pneu monia." Again he ran away-this time to St. Petersburg, where, on arrival, he "went into hysterics and was unconscious for forty-eight hours." And this time he lacked courage to face his purgatory again. He abandoned his wife for ever, and sought refuge and oblivion in foreign

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
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

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

#### Another Columbus.

Over thirteen hundred years passed before any further contribution of consequence was made to the theory of the circulation of the blood. Then Realdus Columbus, a professor at Padua, established the fact of the pulmonary circulation. He showed that venous blood passes from the right ventricle through the pulmonary arteries to the lungs, where it is aerated and returned, through the pulmonary arteries to the lungs, where it is aerated and returned, through the pulmonary veins, to the left side of the heart.

It was left to Harvey, a few years later, to establish the further truth, that the aerated blood, received into the left side of the heart through the pulmonary veins, is distributed over the body through the aorta and its numerous arterial branches, being again collected in the small branches of veins, which unite and re-unite, ultimately joining into the great veins that lead to the right side of the heart, whence the blocd is again pumped to the lungs and the circle thus completed.

#### A Frog Discovery.

The connection between the finest branches of the arteries and the smallest branches of the veins Harvey assumed, but was never able to demonstrate. Seven years after his death, however, an Italian naturalist -Malpighi-showed, in the foot of a living frog, by means of a magnifying glass, the actual junction of the tiny arteries and veins by fine capillary

The significance of Harvey's dis covery, simple as it seems, is enormous. Modern physiology and medical practice are largely based on it. But, though it is his name almost alone with which this discovery is popularly associated, we must not, if we would be just, forget, any more than did Harvey himself, the debt which we owe to those equally earnest archers after truth who preceded

him, and contributed to the final arch those parts without which the keystone which he was privileged to place would have had little meaning.

#### Champion Snake-Swallowers

After a lapse of five years, the annual convention of the snake-eaters of Northern Africa has lately been held. Seventeen of the most renowned reptile consumers from various parts of Tunis and Algeria took part.

An extraordinary feature of the convention was that most of the snakeeaters served in the French Army during the war many of them wearing the medals they won in France.

More than four hundred small

snakes of various sizes were carefully measured and dustributed to the competitors. A score-keeper watched each man, and the spectators cheered the "eaters" at the top of their voices. The "eating" consisted of forcing a snake into the mouth as quickly as possible, but no bunching or rolling up of the reptiles was allowed. The snake had to be forced in head first, and as soon as the tail had disappeared, which it usually did with extraordinary rapidity, the competitor quickly snatched it out of his mouth and inserted another.

The man who finished his twentyfour snakes first was adjudged the winner, and was presented with a prize consisting of a round ball studded with brass nails and hung with brass chains, to which were attached silver and gold coins.


