Grocers should handle package goods if at all possible, beuse the invoice cost of package goods is their actual cost and the difference between cost and selling price is actual profit.

Shopkeepers who have carefully figured the retailing costs of sugar are selling package sugar, because package sugar pays a definite, certain profit—a profit that can be seen; whereas the profit on bulk sugar can only be estimated or guessed at.



Over and over, in a shrill, falfresh broth and sweet milk of almonds, and temper it all; and take the yolk of eggs. Boil it a little and set it down and mess it forth with fat veni-




