**The Revolt in Spain.**

The tottering throne of the last of the reigning Bourbons seems about to receive another and yet ruder shock. Queen Isabella, who has been seeking the good offices of Napoleon, is suddenly recalled to her disloyal Capital by a dissolution of her Cabinet—fresh menace from her irrepressible enemy, Gen. Prim, and the sign of a general rising against her hated rule. The recent exiled Generals—among whom was one of the royal family itself—seem to be cooperating with Prim. The revolution is daily spreading, several provinces having already pronounced in favour of it. Gen. Prim, who is at the head of the whole movement, is marching upon Madrid, and, according to one account, the capital itself has risen against the Government. If successful the insurgents will appeal to the nation and call a Constitutional Assembly. Already a Provisional Government has been established in Seville. Cadiz has been occupied by the insurgents, and the important provinces of Galicia, Andalusia, and the country from Malaga to Carthage, are completely under their control. Altogether the news is very unfavourable to the Queen, and indicate a speedy triumph of the revolution.

The reign of Isabella II. is among the most unfortunate which Spain has witnessed. She is the oldest daughter of the late King Ferdinand VII. and could ascend the throne only because her father had changed the ancient law of succession prevailing in Spain, and according to which the brother of Ferdinand, Don Carlos, should have succeeded. Don Carlos naturally raised the standard of revolt, and for five years (1834-1839) valiantly but unsuccessfully, fought for his rights. The disturbance caused by this war had hardly ended when Espartero, the Regent and the Queen Dowager Christina began, the contest for the supreme power during minority of the Queen. Espartero was successful from 1840 to 1843, but was compelled to flee before O'Donnell and Narvaez, and was not restored until 1847. Frequent changes of the Ministry, occasional revolts, and the banishment of Queen Christina, were marked events in the history of the following years. A number of political parties were disputing among each other the ascendancy. The Carlists, even after the end of the war remained a numerous party, especially in the Basque Provinces, and had the sympathy of a large portion of the clergy. The Moderados or Conservative party were for a strong royal power and but few rights of the Cortes. The Liberal Union advocated a more liberal law of suffrage. The Progressistas favored the introduction of radical reforms. The Democrats openly professed republican ideas. The New-Catholic School counselled a complete submission to the Church. Hardly a year had passed in which one or the other had caused some disturbance. In 1854 the Progressistas had a majority in the Legislative Chamber, and introduced a number of salutary reforms; but their power was soon broken, and the chief contest has since been between Marshal Narvaez as leader of the Moderados, and Marshall O'Donnell as the leader of the Liberal Union. The leaders of both these great parties are now dead. Since 1866 the Moderados have been in power at first under Marshal Narvaez, and after his death (1868) under Gonzalez Bravo. The administration of the Moderados has been noted for despotism and violence. They have repeatedly changed the constitution itself. The Democrats and Progressistas have, therefore, for several years, taken no part in the elections. They have several times tried to conquer their rights by a revolution, generally under the leadership of Gen. Prim. Thus far the Government had succeeded in suppressing every one of these movements before it had time to spread, but the present one seems to have a prospect of success. In such a case, Gen. Prim would naturally become the head of a new Cabinet, and the next move will be an appeal to the nation, and the convocation of a Constitutional Assembly.

The London Daily News expresses the opinion that there will be a fall of wheat in England, of from 4s. to 6s. per quarter, before the end of September. If the fall should be 5s., it would leave more than \$4,000,000 to be paid out for other articles of use by the inhabitants of Great Britain, in the course of the ensuing year.

**Sir John Young.**  
It turns out that our newly appointed Governor General is a Liberal and not a Conservative as first stated. He occupied the office of Chief Secretary for Ireland in a liberal administration—and is himself a liberal in politics. The Ottawa Times (Conservatives) put him down as a Liberal as will be seen by the following extract from its columns:

"His selection by the present imperial Ministry may be regarded rather as a tribute to his high personal merits, than as a mere party appointment, and should the fortunes of the impending political contest in England be adverse to the Conservatives, notwithstanding the brilliant leadership of Mr. Disraeli, the only party that can come into power is that led by Mr. Gladstone; with whom, from old personal and political associations, it is reasonable to expect that Sir John Young's influence would be very great. Our newly selected Governor-General is, therefore, one whose personal merits have given him claims superior to considerations of party politics; and no matter which of the great parties now struggling for power may obtain the mastery at the polls in November next, Sir John Young's influence is likely to be equally powerful at the Colonial office."

**THE RAILWAY COMMISSIONER FOR QUEBEC.**—Speaking of the appointment of Mr. Brydges as the Intercolonial Railway Commissioner for Quebec, the Toronto Telegraph says: "These is no doubt, we believe, that Mr. Brydges has been named as the Railway Commissioner for Quebec. Will Mr. Brydges continue in his position of Managing Director of the Grand Trunk at the same time that he accepts this Commissionership? The question is one of practical interest. The Grand Trunk will have control of the Western connections of the Intercolonial. Unless the Government bargain beforehand for the terms of carriage for passengers, freight, and mails west of Riviere du Loup, will they be able to make fair terms after the Road is completed, with a Grand Trunk Manager acting as the controlling spirit of the Commission? Will there not be a new set of Grand Trunk claims sprung upon us—with costly arbitration and all that? Let us have light. Mr. Brydges is an able and a good man; but he cannot serve two Masters."

**Mechanics' Institute Association.**  
The Mechanics' Institute Association of Ontario held its first annual meeting in the Board Room of the Hamilton Mechanics' Institute on Wednesday evening. The chair was taken by the President, Dr. Beatty, of Cobourg, and W. Edwards, Esq., of Toronto, acted as Secretary. The Institutes represented were: Hamilton—Thomas McIlwraith, Judge, Legie, Toronto—W. Edwards, Cobourg—Dr. Beatty, Thos. Morrow, Galt—John Young, M. P., John Allan, Guelph—D. McCrae, Whitby—John Shier, Stratford—Jas. Redford, M. P., John Grand, Ottawa—W. Porter, "Ayr—W. Oliver, Berlin—John Fernel. The minutes having been read, Mr. Shier submitted a draft of the Constitution of the Association, which was discussed at length. It provides for an Executive Committee of seven members, the President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer to be of that number, and the meetings to be at the call of the President. Each Institute is to pay into the Association \$1 for every 100 members, annually, as the affiliation fee. The Constitution was amended. Blanks filled up and adopted. The election of officers resulted as follows:—Dr. Beatty, Cobourg, President; John Shier, Whitby, Vice-President; W. E. Edwards, Toronto, Secretary and Treasurer. Executive Committee: J. J. Withrow, Toronto; T. McIlwraith, Hamilton; D. McCrae, Guelph; Jas. Young, M. P., Galt.

**A STRANGE HISTORY.**—A certain house-breaker was condemned in the latter part of the last century in France, and under peculiar circumstances, to a hundred years in the galleys, and strange to relate, this man recently made his appearance in his own province at the advanced age of one hundred and twenty years, he being about twenty years of age when the sentence which condemned him to such a dreadful punishment was passed. It is difficult to conceive what the feeling must have been with which he returned, as soon as emancipated from the shackles which had enthrallled him for a century, to breathe once more the cherished air of the scenes of his infancy. Bour, in the department of Ain, was his native home, but time had so much changed the aspect of the whole, place that he recognized it only by the church of Bour, which was the only thing which had undergone no alteration. He had triumphed over laws, bondage, man, time, everything. Not a relation had he left, not a single being could he hail as an acquaintance, yet he was not experiencing the homage and the respect the French paid old age. For himself he had forgotten everything connected with his early youth; even all recollection of the crime for which he had suffered was lost, or, if at all remembered, it was a dreary vision confounded with a thousand other dreary visions of days long gone by. His family and connections for several generations all dead, himself a living proof of the clemency of heaven and the severity of man, regretting, perhaps, the very iron which had been familiar to him, and had wish himself again among the wretched and suffering beings with whom his fate had been so long associated—well might he be called the patriarch of burglars.

**ROBBERY AT GLENCOE.**—On Tuesday night a daring robbery was perpetrated in the neighbourhood of Glencoe, by three armed men, who drove to the house of Darius Michel, when two of them knocked in the door. After getting in one of them fired off a revolver, at the same time crying out, "your money or your lives." The flash from the shot revealed to them an open door, where they saw two men in the act of getting up; the second shot was then fired at the two men, which fortunately missed them, and doing no more harm than tearing up a little of the floor by the ball from the pistol. The robbers succeeded in carrying off a trunk containing one hundred dollars in gold some distance from the house, where they broke it open and took off the contents. They have not been heard of since.

Despatches to the Evening Mercury

American Despatches.

Washington, Sept 24th.—Robt. T. Lincoln, son of the late President, was married this evening to Nelly Harlan, daughter of Senator Harlan.

Paris, 24th.—The Montreal announces officially that the Government proposition lately granted in favor of Erlanger and Reuter of the Franco-American Telegraph Company, authorizing them to lay a submarine telegraph cable between France and America under certain reserved conditions has become definitive and complete, capital to the amount of 27,500,000 francs, the main condition, having been subscribed for the undertaking.

Nashville, 24th.—The constant rains are seriously damaging the cotton crop of middle Tennessee and the prospect now is that a third less will be produced than was expected the first of the month.

New York, 25th.—The Steamer Hibernia from Europe has arrived.

The Tribune's Atlanta, Ga., special says an official investigation of the Camille massacre shows that it was even more bloody and atrocious than at first reported. Captain Pierce and Mr. Murphy saved their lives by making Masonic signals. The negroes were hunted with dogs and when caught they were butchered in cold blood.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

The Revolt in Spain!

REPORTED ATTACK OF MADRID. Gen. Prim marching on the Capital with 20,000 men.

Defection of War Ships!

PER ATLANTIC CABLE. London, Sept. 23, (evening).—Despatches received here this evening state that the insurgents have issued a proclamation which says that when they are victorious, their future course relative to the government of the country will be decided by universal suffrage. The insurgents are reported to have attacked Madrid, which is defended by barricades, but no particulars have been received.

The city of Saragosa is actively preparing defences against an anticipated attack by the rebels. Dublin, Sept. 23.—The Aldermen and Councilors of this city have passed a resolution setting forth that as all danger from the Fenian movement has passed away, the time has now come for the release of imprisoned Fenians.

Paris, Sept. 24.—The French government will immediately strengthen its posts on the Spanish frontier. The Paris says that the Spanish army is loyal, and that the insurrection is confined to the province of Andalusia and a few seaports.

The following is the latest news which has been received from Spain: The Government at Madrid has declared all Spain in a state of siege. Gen. Izquierdo was sent out with a detachment of Royal troops against the Province of Santander which has joined the insurgents. A desperate skirmish took place in Santander between the opposing parties, in which several persons were injured. The reports that Gen. Prim is marching directly on Madrid are reiterated. He is accompanied by Gen. Soriano, the Duke de La Torre, and it is estimated that the force under his command now number 20,000 strong. The Duke de La Torre is said to be acting as provisional president and civil head of the revolution. He has refused a compromise made by Gen. Concha from Madrid. The Spanish ships of war in the port of San Sebastian have declared against the Queen and joined the rebel fleet. The revolutionary leaders have issued a decree declaring that any officer who orders an attack on the people or patriot soldiers shall be adjudged a traitor to his country.

Paris, Sept. 23, (evening).—The report that the Queen of Spain had crossed the frontier into France, was premature. She still remains at San Sebastian, but it is rumored that she will soon leave for Bon, in the department of the Lower Pyrenees.

Official despatches from Madrid make the following statements: The insurrection has been suppressed in the city of Granada. A battle was fought which lasted two hours and resulted in the defeat of the rebels. The disloyal movement is confined to the Province of Santander and the cities of Malaga and Seville.

Letters from Cadix say the citizens there have taken no part in the rebellion, and business has not been interrupted.

THE BRAND OF CAIN.—A remarkable fact is reported from Servia. The father of the four men named Radovanovitch, who were shot for complicity in the assassination of Prince Michael, was ejected every commune in Servia, and ultimately found his way into Hungary. There he was refused the privilege of residence by no fewer than twenty-six Hungarian towns; he was driven from one place to another, and on several occasions could not procure bread even by payment. The unhappy man has asked the Servian Government for a passport to Roumania.

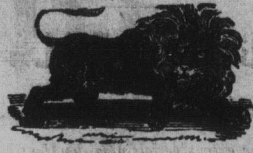
