

RECIPROCITY .- The Hon. George Brown attended a Privy Council meeting on Tuesday, at which His Excellency was present, and placed before it a full report of his negotiations. It is understood that the draft of the Reciprecity Treaty submitted by him was satisfactory in its main features ; but our Government object to some of its details, and in order to have these modified he will return to Washington immediatiely.

Tuesday the 2nd was the eighth anniversary of the battle of Ridgeway, when our brave volunteers con fronted the Fenian scoundrels who came over from Buffalo to plunder and kill. We well remember the terrible excitement which prevailed that day, when suspense and fear for the fate of our young soldiers took possession of all hearts, and when every syllable of news from the scene of conflict was eagerly watched for by the thousands who crowded about the newspaper offices.

JUDGES APPOINTED .- We learn that George W. Burton, Esq., Q. C., and W. Proudfoot, Esq., Q.C., both of Hamilton, have been appointed Supreme Court Jutiges in accordance with the new arrangement of the Judiciary. Mr. Burton becomes Junior Judge in the new Court of Appeal, while Mr. Proudfoot becomes Vice-Chancellor in the place of Mr. Strong, who becomes Senior Justice of the Court of Appeal. The Hamilton Times says that Mr. Burton was called to the bar in 1842, and Mr. Proudfoot in 1849, so that they have both had long experience in the profession.
