

THE CHINESE QUESTION. A correspondent in British Columbia sends us a long letter about the Chinese invasion of that province, and the care that was taken at the citizens' banquet to the governor-general, to avoid all mention of the evil. He says: "We are told in very convincing language, that the employment of Chinese was a necessity for the construction of the railway, and that white labor could not be procured, and that the infliction of Chinese residents in the province would only be temporary; that all the machinery of the law would be put in motion after the completion of public works to rid us of their presence. What ho! when not a politician has advanced a legal idea for their exclusion. What wonderful wisdom the government displays when it has the unblushing effrontery to tell intelligent men that it will provide a remedy after the evil has been done. If incompetent to prevent their ingress into the country, how much more incompetent will the government be to drive them out of the country, for no other reason than that they are Chinese."

"To entertain the belief that railways cannot be built without the aid of this degraded race is as wicked as it is absurd; it is the rapacity and greed of railway magnates which foster and encourage their employment, and the plausible arguments advanced by them to uphold their policy are not only timely and transparent but are an insult to an intelligent people."

A POSSIBLE COUP DE MAIN. From the day of Sir John's speech at Yorkville during the recent election campaign, the belief has more or less prevailed that the few words he uttered on that occasion with reference to provincial powers over the liquor traffic, were no more than a prelude to some grand scheme, and that he was thrown out purposely to give indication of something coming. And that belief has since occurred. That the liquor dealers are expecting something new to turn up is evident enough, and they are looking to Ottawa for it, too. Supposing him to have in view any action of great importance with regard to liquor and license legislation, it is still highly improbable that he has let out the secret of it to any of them. It would not be like him to do so. He may have given hints to one or more of the leading government organs, in order to prevent them from blundering on the question, if for no other purpose. However, from what has been said on the question by Sir John and his friends, and still more from what has not been said by them in the premises, we may venture to guess that what is in all probability on the cards.

Let it be observed, first, that the constitutionality of the Scott act, passed by the dominion parliament, has been affirmed by the highest authority. And this means a good deal more than most people appear to have thought of until very recently. It means that the dominion parliament has power to legislate regarding the liquor traffic, and of course that the dominion government has the power to initiate such legislation, and when duly enacted to cause it to be put in force. Now, suppose that Sir John should take action accordingly, and get a uniform liquor law passed for the whole dominion, would this dominion law then override all provincial laws, would conflicts of jurisdiction arise, and, if they did, how would they be decided by the courts? Would it be possible for him to frame a general law so sweeping in its character as to render the various provincial laws of little account? We do not pretend to answer questions which may yet puzzle even our learned judges, but that the dominion parliament has power to legislate with regard to the liquor traffic is something that it no longer needs a lawyer to tell us. The Scott act was passed by Mr. Mowat's friends at Ottawa, with the approval of temperance people everywhere, whose only objection to it was that it did not go far enough. We fancy, however, that had Mr. Mowat then foreseen the present situation he would greatly have preferred that the dominion parliament should let liquor legislation severely alone and not meddle with it at all. The Scott act has proved something concerning which Mr. Mowat and his friends here may now wish that it had never been thought of, but that has remained in obscurity. We say again that it has laid down by the highest authority that the parliament which Sir John controls actually can legislate on the liquor traffic, and that its legislation will stand, is a fact of great and far-reaching significance—a fact of the importance of which will grow upon us as the more we consider it.

Some people talk as if Sir John would be sure to pass a law throwing the traffic open to almost everybody, and abolishing the present Saturday night and Sunday restrictions. But the Mail protests against such a change, and feels sure that its protest would not be in vain; which may mean that Sir John has no intention at all of meddling with this very wholesome and necessary restriction. On the subject of the number of licenses to be granted within the bounds of any particular municipality, again, some well-meaning people fall into a curious mistake. They imagine that a deputation of the Licensed Victuallers' association interviewing Sir John would eagerly press him to increase, by a hundred or two, the number of licenses available in Toronto for instance. This is great simplicity. The members of the L. V. B. A. are men who want to make money, each for himself. They do not want more people to get into the same trade with themselves, and thereby to share the profits of it. Far rather would they see a great many of the existing number knocked off, so as to leave the more numerous and the more profit for each one of the favored few who would remain. Here is where our well-meaning friends referred to make a pro-

found mistake, from which a like consideration of what human nature and of what business competition may be thought to save them.

Suppose, then, that Sir John were to make a regular coup de main in the fight over the liquor question, pass a fairly good law for the whole dominion, and so throw all the provincial legislation in the shade, what would follow? We do not prophesy at all, we merely hazard a guess; but it is worth remarking that Sir Leonard Tilley, unquestionably the most prominent temperance man in the dominion to-day, is an influential member of Sir John's government. Let our guess be taken for what it is worth. Time will tell. ARGUS

THE NEW PARTY.

SIR: The announcement of the existence of a new party has aroused the ire of the Tory organ, which affects to treat it with a degree of contempt by branding it with the epithet of "donkey engine to gritism." If the irascible editor of the Mail cares to look over the principles laid down in the constitution of the new party he cannot fail to be convinced that the spirit that breathes in every word and line is the spirit of the greater part of the people of this country, and that it is as much opposed to gritism as it is to Toryism, both of which have become as obnoxious to the people as the old party known as the "family compact" and as the new party freed from the old-time prejudices of both Toryism and gritism is likely to rise into strength and prominence. It is not to be wondered at that the Mail should endeavor to belittle its principles and to round its president with a cloud of falsehoods and misrepresentation by saying that Mr. McMurich has set himself about to revive "Canada First" under the name of the "National Liberal Union," purely out of personal motives and aspirations. As a matter of fact, however, as the mayor himself stated in his address, the "National Liberal Union" was ushered into existence before the country adopted and endorsed the national policy a second time, and the reason it was not brought into prominence then was that it was not a proper time to place its principles before the country. We are a party in position now however to announce its principles to the country and to defend them, if required so to do; but if the only opposition they are to meet with is the coarse vituperation of the editor of the Mail, the mere enunciation of them is quite sufficient. The new party now stands before the country as the inaugurator of a national movement calculated to build up in our midst a feeling of national unity and good fellowship and to bind the Canadian people more closely together by ties of a national interest and affection. If the tendency of all metro-politan governments ever has been to further independence, and if such is to be the outcome of the political contest now at work among us, the principles of the N. L. U. are such as will give definite expression to the advancing spirit of the times. There need not be any over-straining to accomplish the end, for the natural course of events will secure that soon enough. A national spirit peculiarly Canadian will prove a powerful influence towards keeping our young men in Canada by kindling a spirit of love for the land of their birth, and materially help to assimilate the nationalities which are to make up our future population. The Canadian people are tired of party government, weary by monopolies and a sham of the degraded state to which our political morals have been reduced. The new party knows no creed or faction. It seeks to open the gates which have in the past hindered the growth of a national feeling among us; and to bury the differences which have in the past distracted the body politic. If Toryism stands against and criticism is its ally, the party's principles go much the better, for the day is not far off when it shall prove a powerful factor in the work of our Canadian politics. No wonder the Tory organ shrieks at the announcement of a determined opposition to monopolies. Its party are now the "ins" but it remains to be seen how long the Canadian people will submit patiently to the high handed measures recently resorted to, to curb railway enterprises. The popular cry has gone forth and in the future will give no uncertain sound. Let the members of the union prove faithful to their high and patriotic principles and set vigorously to the work of organization and the living issue of the day will drive Toryism and gritism to the four winds UNIONIST.
